Myself and a few other club members attended the Portland show and we saw a lot of homeless camps and garbage throughout the neighborhood of the expo center. The amount of trash and filth was much worse then I had ever seen in past shows for the area. I go to Portland every year and for the last 10 years it has become worse and it's badkinda sad really. I love this show.



The dog show and its venders have been one of my favorites, but I must say, I really will think hard about whether to go next year. We heard and talked to a number of people who had real trouble attending this year's show. Although we all understand that things can go wrong, and they sometimes do, this year seemed exceptionally bad. Two people's cars had been broken into with all their show stuff robbed at the host hotel. In addition, we heard of two more stories from vendors who had there vans broken into and items taken. We saw a very intoxicated man at the grooming building doors, leaned up against the building, and talking jibberish. Not only did he scare some people, but a homeless looking lady was going through the trash bins making a mess of the parking lot. When we were ready to check out of our hotel, we went downstairs and talked to the front desk about break-in's at the hotel and the front desk lady said nothing has happened in the last couple of weeks. This was due to the hotel having added more lighting outside, more cameras, and more hired security officers at night to combat the increase in crime. Prior to those changes, she said car break-in's were a weekly occurrence. Well at least this hotel had made some improvements for the issue, but she also expressed another concern about people breaking into empty rooms for a place to sleep which has been a very alarming problem for the cleaning staff. # Fast Cat & Sanctioned B Match will be held on May 7th, 2022 in Tri-Cities

### FAST CAT:

Well, you no longer have to wonder how fast your dog can run. Fast CAT® – which stands for Coursing Ability Test – is a timed 100-yard dash where dogs run one at a time, chasing a lure. It's over before you know it — and it's nothing short of awe-inspiring to watch your dog run at top speed, ears back, eyes focused, legs strong. All dogs can participate in Fast CAT, whether purebred or mixed breed. Although it is a relatively new sport, its popularity has spread like wildfire. No wonder. According to one AKC official, "The Fast CAT® provides a terrific opportunity to introduce new participants to the world of AKC sports as one of the few events where all that is needed to compete is a dog's natural instincts."

### Sanctioned B Match:

A sanctioned B match is an informal event at which neither Championship points nor credit towards any title can be awarded, they are events at which dog clubs, judges, stewards and exhibitors and their dogs gain experience for the breed ring, and licensing for upcoming new clubs. Sanctioned matches are great for brand new puppies to gain positive experience and prepare them for upcoming show careers in what ever sport you choose to follow. We will be offering a 4-6 puppy and regular puppy classes and for dogs the open class, you can not enter any dog that is a champion, we will be offering prizes. We will have entry sheets available at the match location and no advertising may be done until we get approved for both the fast cat and the Sanctioned Match from AKC..any questions on fast cat please contact Stacey Davis or for the match contact

## Annual Health Check-Up Time

Just like humans, it is recommended to schedule your dog for an annual health check up with their veterinarian. If your dog is anything like mine, the minute they smell the outside of the clinic or the smell of the waiting room inside, the trembling begins. Dogs have a keen memory for the sting of a shot and the discomfort of a rectal thermometer. So, here's a few tips for easing your dog's anxiety at their next veterinary visit.

- Coordinate the scheduling of your dog's annual physical with required immunizations to reduce number of visits and increase efficiency.
- Write down concerns or questions you have about changes in your dog's health and/or behavior since their last visit.
- Do your research. Look up symptoms or concerns in advance and have solid questions ready to pose. Veterinarians are well trained professionals who will take a greater interest in your dog's health when they see that you have knowledge and serious interest in your dog's health.
- Take photos or videos at home of symptoms or behaviors that are of concern and present that information during your visit.
- Be sure to bring medications or medical records from other veterinarians who have seen your dog while on vacation or living at a second residence.
- Use a calming pheromone spray, like Adaptil, to help reduce your dog's anxiety on the way to their appointment. Spray your car, their dog seat, dog carrier, harness, and lead 15 minutes before departure.
- Capitalize on COVID protocols and request staying in your car until your dog is ready to be examined in order to shorten time spent getting anxious in the waiting room.
- Give treats before and after your visit to associate a positive experience for having been cooperative with the veterinarian.
