EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Do you know what to do when someone's heart stops? How about if someone starts to have a severe allergic reaction? Or what to do during a seizure? Fret not! The following infographics from the American Heart Association, CDC, and Epilepsy Foundation have some very informative guides to help you during these situations.

The first infographic from the AHA gives you a simple guide on what to do when an adult's heart stop and you are worried about COVID-19.

The second infographic from the CDC teaches you how to recognize the signs of anaphylaxis or also known as a severe allergic reaction. While this infographic was created specifically for post Covid vaccination, these signs still apply in other situations such as food allergies or bee stings, etc.

And finally, the last infographic from the Epilepsy Foundation goes over how to help someone having a seizure.

I hope that you have found these guides informative and will hopefully you prepare you in the event of a medical emergency.—Kelly

COVID-19 and Adult CPR

If an adult's heart stops and you're worried that they may have COVID-19, you can still help by performing Hands-Only CPR.



Step 1



Phone 9-1-1 and get an AED.

Step 2



Cover your own mouth and nose with a face mask or cloth.



Cover the person's mouth and nose with a face mask or cloth.

Step 3



Perform Hands-Only CPR. Push hard and fast on the center of the chest at a rate of 100 to 120 compressions per minute.

Step 4



Use an AED as soon as it is available.

Recognizing and Responding to Anaphylaxis

How to recognize anaphylaxis

Healthcare personnel should consider anaphylaxis when patients present with generalized signs or symptoms such as **hives**, **serious or life-threatening symptoms** (e.g., hypotension, respiratory distress, or significant swelling of the tongue or lips), or **symptoms that involve more than one body system**.



Respiratory:

- sensation of throat closing
- stridor (highpitched sound while breathing)
- shortness of breath
- wheeze, cough



Gastrointestinal:

- nausea
- vomiting
- diarrheaabdominal pain



Cardiovascular:

- dizziness
- fainting
- tachycardia (abnormally fast heart rate)
- hypotension (abnormally low blood pressure)



Skin/mucosal:
generalized hives

- itching
- swelling of lips, face, or throat



Neurological:

- agitation
- convulsions
- acute change in mental status
- sense of impending doom (a feeling that something bad is about to happen)

What to do if you suspect anaphylaxis



Assess airway, breathing, and circulation



Administer epinephrine



Call Emergency Medical Services (EMS)



Place in supine position

Seizure First Aid

How to help someone having a seizure

1

STAY with the person until they are awake and alert after the seizure.

- ✓Time the seizure ✓Remain calm
- ✓ Check for medical ID



2

Keep the person SAFE.

✓ Move or guide away from harm



3

Turn the person onto their **SIDE** if they are not awake and aware.

- √Keep airway clear
- ✓ Loosen tight clothes around neck
- ✓ Put something small and soft under the head



Call **911** if

- Seizure lasts longer than 5 minutes
- Person does not return to their usual state
- Person is injured, pregnant, or sick
- Repeated seizures
- First time seizure
- Difficulty breathing
- Seizure occurs in water

Do **NOT**

- X Do NOT restrain.
- X Do NOT put any objects in their mouth.
 - √ Rescue medicines can be given if prescribed by a health care professional
