
David Goff

LC won the VICA Championship during his senior year and David was named MVP, NAIA District 29 First Team Outfielder, and VICA First Team Outfielder.

For more than fifteen years baseball had been David's passion. He lived to play the game. His junior year at ACHS, Coach Berry and the football coaching staff tried to get a youth league football program started in the county. David's brother, Paul suggested they coach the team. He agreed and the rest is history. This was the start of Bruin football. David served as coach, board member and president of the organization. His leadership, the support of the parents, the hard work and dedication of the coaches and great players bought much success to the Bruins teams. The Bruins had many undefeated teams and won numerous championships. Many of the Bruins players went on to play high school and college football. The Amherst Lancers football teams were much stronger because of the talented players that came out of the youth league football teams, all because two brothers had the vision to build a strong youth football program and be positive role models for hundreds of young athletes in Amherst County.
