




Dear TFEA/Freedom Team Partner,

ment. We have been given Government approval to show Prisoners of Pain.... Video and start churches. Thank you, TFEA partners and supporters for your continued financial support and prayers that



TFEA Evangelists given Government Approval to Evangelize in Nakivale Refugee Settlement!

The Nakivale refugee settlement stretches for 184 sq km (71 sq miles) and covers rolling hills, fertile fields, a lake and many streams. Dotted around the landscape are small brick or mud houses, some with corrugated irons roofs.

It is home to tens of thousands of refugees from various countries, particularly the Democratic Republic of Congo and Burundi, and is one of Africa's oldest refugee settlements. While it provides essential services, refugees face challenges like food insecurity, limited access to resources like firewood, environmental degradation, and insufficient infrastructure.



It was built in 1958 in order to host all Tutsis fleeing early stages of the conflict in Rwanda. It currently hosts over **171,000** refugees from the Democratic Republic of Congo, Burundi, Somalia, Rwanda, Ethiopia, and Eritrea.

Now our Teams are sharing the Hope and Salvation of Jesus Christ and have baptized over 300.



Evangelist Bryan Report:

Our outreach continues to expand rapidly across our coverage area. We now minister to a total of 410 WAY house churches across our seven centers, with 27 new clusters added recently. Notably, the new Nakivaale center already has 8 WAY house churches in operation. The new churches in the Nakivaale camp are conducting impactful 'Prisoners of Pain' events under the supervision of Ambassador Peter Mpaka, a respected former inmate. The churches are alternating use of equipment, and the people of Nakivaale are showing remarkable ownership by willingly buying fuel to power the generator and covering the cost of oil service. We celebrate the powerful reports coming from the camp, indicating that over 300 respondents were baptized in the month of October.

Regarding the School: The agricultural class continues to produce a sufficient supply of both long-term and seasonal food for the school. This vital work, particularly the planting of banana trees during

the current heavy rains, will continue throughout the holidays. During the graduation ceremony scheduled for November 20th, Jackline and Caroline will be thrilled to receive the tailoring machines you donated, having successfully passed their **National Examinations with distinction, along with 13 other students.**

Finally, we request your urgent prayers for the political atmosphere in Uganda, which is currently volatile as we approach the campaign and election period in 2026.

Much appreciation to all our partners and prayer warriors. May God bless you abundantly.

17 Prisons 934 Prison Cell Churches 203 Prison Events 9,151 Salvations 1,406 Rededications Planning is underway for the major outreach at Kigezi Government Prison in November and for navigating regulatory limitations anticipated during the December Christmas season. The continued dedication of the Mobile Team and inside prison inmate teams remains paramount to the TFEA vision of covering all prisons in Uganda by the end of 2028.

We give praise to God for the unique and profound privilege of being entrusted with the prison ministry mandate. As 2025 draws to a close, we reflect with gratitude on the unprecedented doors God has opened, the establishment of new centers, and the impact of released prison ambassadors who are establishing

new churches in their home communities—a demonstration of the gospel's transformative power.

As the Christmas season approaches, accessibility to the prisons is expected to become regulated, which may limit out-reach activities to certain days in December. **Discussions have been held with the wardens**, and we are awaiting official guidelines regarding access during the holidays. Our prayer is to maintain full access, particularly for the new prisons recently occupied for ministry work.

Regarding Bibles: The visible joy upon distributing boxes of Bibles attests to the deep hunger for the Word of God. The resulting impact is evidenced by the powerful testimonies collected and shared with Evangelist Loice for translation. The Mobile Prison Teams are actively engaged in training new teams and duplicating their efforts.

<u>Superintendent Report:</u> 410 WAY Church Clusters 33,210 First-time Salvations 1,000s Attending We are incredibly grateful that God has granted us good health and strength to serve Him throughout 2025, and we are bringing this year to a close in greater victory!

The launch of our newest center in Nakivaale is a powerful reminder of the early days of starting our very first center. We are simply **following God's leading** as He does the work through us. We are seeing amazing growth in **Nakivaale refugee settlement**. In October alone, we established 8 WAY house clusters, led by eight former inmates. These new leaders are conducting powerful 'Prisoners of Pain' events and ministering to congregations composed primarily of refugees from the DRC, Congo, Rwanda, and Burundi. A significant number of attendees are former political prisoners who fled their home countries with large families and relatives. Because their small houses cannot accommodate the large groups, they prefer to hold services outdoors. This open-air approach has been strategic, allowing passersby to sit and watch,

increasing our outreach. They have deeply embraced the **WAY House Church system as a source of peace and comfort**, bringing their families together for unity in their foreign country.

We visited Nakivaale about five times in October to monitor the progress of God's work. It was a privilege to attend and participate in two incredible baptism events near the camp's water source, where more than 300 respondents were baptized in October alone!

We extend our deep gratitude for your commitment to repairing our 30 worn-out bicycles. This vital assistance has directly enabled our heavy workload, allowing God to advance the gospel to hundreds of home cluster churches. These new fellowships are now holding daily services and enjoying vibrant fellowship. Furthermore, our evangelists are reporting powerful accounts of notable miracles, healings, salvations, and the deep move of the Holy Spirit.

TFEA to give WAY of Jesus Community School to Rwenjeru Community!

When we started building the WAY of Jesus Community School 3 years ago it was out of the great need to educate and equip the students academically and give the older students vocational skills where they could have a better life and future.

Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans that I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans for prosperity and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope". NAS

When we decide to build the school for the community we knew we would give it to the community when it was meeting the goals. Now the school has achieved those goals and the students are learning through both the Academic Classes and the Life Skills



Classes. The School Board has assumed the leadership and is doing a very good job of setting the guidelines and standards for the school.

Evangelist Bryan writes: As we begin to officially hand over the school to the community, this transition includes strict restrictions to never tamper with the school's mission or its Christian values. The board members have unanimously agreed that any teaching that would undermine our Christian values will not be acceptable. Keeping the core values of the Christian community—the way Jesus would want them—is paramount. We are currently preparing a foundation stone, which will serve as a permanent reminder to the community that the school will only operate "THE WAY OF JESUS."

The school has over 600 students in varying learning levels and will be given to the local community on January 1st, 2026.

School Headmistress Report:

As the year draws to a close, we celebrate the completion of our third and final term with great anticipation. This term culminates in a graduation ceremony for the tailoring class. Fifteen students who passed with distinction will be awarded official government certificates.

This term has been particularly challenging due to its short duration and high costs associated with preparing students for the national final exams, covering examiner facilitation, and providing student identity cards. Many students were unable to raise the necessary funds for exam registration and to help sustain staff and examiners. To meet this need, students demonstrated tremendous initiative: they sold food produced by the agricultural class, as well as their own products like soap, to support their studies and siblings. We are now set for the graduation ceremony, scheduled for the 20th of November.

Our agricultural program continues to thrive. They have advanced their planting to include bananas. We are grateful that a local Member of Parliament has promised to donate agricultural tools to the school. As the number of agricultural students has now outgrown our existing tools, the board has decided that every agricultural student will be required to report with their own tool starting next term.

The school board is currently preparing for the official laying of the foundation stone. A location for the stone has been chosen, and work is already underway as we prepare to officially hand over the school to the community through the board.



Miraculous, powerful, life-changing testimonies from Life Skills Classes!

Turyahebwa Julius, male, 20 years old

I joined the WAY of Jesus Skills Centre this year, Cutting and Tailoring course, I am doing it alongside short courses of jelly making and liquid soap making, I attended liquid soap and jelly making class for two months and begun working at Kakariki home made goods, we are producing for the whole of Kakariki, a range of homemade products which include, soap, pan cakes, buto kakyokoli, butter, yogurt, appetisers etc, the WAY of Jesus opened my mind to hands on skills then I went out to discover that there are more skills than those being taught at the WAY of Jesus, I have come back as a teacher in less than a year and am teaching students on how to make yoghurt and sell it in big markets, the key is cleanliness and hygiene, the product is easy to make, they will only need standard seal that authorises them to supply or work under a company to supply and increase on production, I have trained about 30 students freely at the WAY of Jesus school to give back to my community. I receive many calls to go and train others and I am still student of cutting and tailoring at WAY of Jesus because I have always had a passion for making clothes and believe it is essential for these traditional skills to be passed on to others, so I will receive so much and I will give so much. I gave my school a free table for cutting because most of our students have been cutting from the floor which makes the fabrics dirty. I thank you for giving me an opportunity and am forever grateful.

JUSTINE NAYEBARE, female, 17 years old

When I was first welcomed here early this year, I had just left my marriage, and was breastfeeding my son of 1½ years, my husband almost killed me during our daily fights when he hit me with an iron bar on my back and I blacked out waking up the next morning, and well-wishers brought me to the big church and Mama Prosy brought me to the WAY of Jesus Skills Center to rebuild my life. I had nothing to use in class but I was willing to learn, Mama Prosy supported me with her old clothes to learn from and use them as fabrics, thank you so much Mama for loving me. On my first day here, I felt young again, and I was hopeful that life has begun afresh again, I could hear, the sound of sewing machines, and see my agemates learning, I determined to change my life. Now I have two months to finish my course I am going to start my workshop in Biharwe trading center while I work for Madisen fashioners as a tailor, until I am established. One thing I will never do is, I will never get married again, thank you for rescuing me from that marriage.

ERINA MARY KAKYETENONKORA, female, 15 years old

Hello everyone! I have been here for 6 months now and I am the best at making male garments, my teacher says it's a unique gift in me since I am female, I feel blessed to be able to study from WAY of Jesus skills center. This week I am working on a male shirt model, with short sleeves, buttons on the front and a nice collar, that makes it very good for a hot day. After observing teacher Rosette going through different steps and creating it, I picked my fabric and started working on my own. Thank you, teacher Prosy for the close and serious supervision. When I graduate, I will pay for my sisters to do the same course so we can later open up our own shop as three sisters.

MUGYEMA IVAN, & NINSIIMA GLORIA, 17 and 18 years old.

When we came to the WAY of Jesus skills center, we thought they would not take us in since I was already married to my wife Gloria, and we had two children and she was also breast feeding at that time, but we talked to Mama Prosy in the tailoring class who helped share our story with the headteacher Rosette, we were later given a chance on condition that we will help with the cooking and kitchen work, Gloria my wife is a good cook. Both of us have been dreaming about becoming a tailor since we were little, Gloria's late mother was a tailor, fascinated by the colors of the fabrics and the beautiful clothes her mother created and eager to be able to sew something personal and unique one day, we encouraged ourselves to try asking for opportunity at the center. Now we plan on opening our own tailoring shop and selling our own style type of clothes, our biggest dream is taking good care of our children, after completing the course and obtaining the certificate, we shall work hard, God bless you Mama Prosy for taking us in.

OKETCH JAMES MAGOBORA, male, 19 years old

WAY of Jesus Skills center has given me and my siblings the chance to achieve our ambition and goal, while our teacher herself has become our role model, a good point of reference to look at, she told us her story as a single mother and how she managed to cope because of the skill of tailoring how she took care of her 9 children and supported them, we are so inspired because she is a living example, she has been working as a tailor since she was just 16 years old, after her first marriage failed, she has taught us to love the job from her testimony. I have fallen in love with sewing. After my training, I will rent a place so that I have my own boutique, and also start to teach classes to young students who as me want to learn the profession, and be able to survive.

MARIA KEBIGYEYIKO, female, 19 years old

My name is Maria, I belong to the Ruhenda community and my family came from Rwanda originally as refugees, we survive on cultivating land to get food for consumption and sell the surplus for basic needs, my husband drinks a lot and we were diagnosed with AIDS virus, so I decided to go back to school and learn a skill and come work for my children our community is very poor, I have 2 children. My husband is working at the forest loading trees on heavy trucks, it's very hard to run the house but after I get the skills, I will be getting business from Ruhenda community because there is no single sewing machine in the Ruhenda forest community. I had no qualifications to work now I am going to be self employed. We are very much thankful to God and to the Life Skills Center for providing the opportunity to learn.

Thank you, TFEA Financial Partners who are making a huge difference in the lives of these many young people who would normally not have an opportunity to learn a vocational trade skill.
