Our Plenary Speakers:



Dr. Gabriela Kleckova, Past president TESOL International Association, USA

Dr. Gabriela Kleckova, Ph.D. started her professional career as a lower secondary school English teacher. She currently chairs the Department of English at the Faculty of Education, University of West Bohemia, the Czech Republic where she also teaches second language teacher education courses to pre-service and in-service teachers. She frequently presents at national and international ELT conferences, conducts workshops for English language teachers, and provides her expertise to various educational and governmental institutions. Her professional interests include visual design of ELT materials, teacher education, innovation in education, and leadership. For TESOL's 50th anniversary, she was named one of 30 emerging leaders shaping the future of the profession. Gabriela Kleckova served as TESOL International Association president for 2021-2022.

Session Title & Abstract: "Navigating the Dynamic Landscape: Adapting to Change in Second Language Teaching and Learning"

We live in a complex, disruptive, and fast-changing world. The field of English language teaching and learning is marked by omnipresent and rapid evolution. Moreover, language learners' needs constantly change. Amidst all this, we are often expected to innovate, perform our best, and align with the most recent educational trends. We mediate between an enormous number of demands of the profession and face the challenge of creating adequate language-learning opportunities for our learners. In this talk, I look at the current state of the field and discuss how, as individuals, we can navigate these dynamics and endure, safeguarding both our emotional and intellectual energy and our well-being.

Dr. Gabriel Diaz Maggioli, Past President, IATEFL, UK

Dr. Gabriel Díaz Maggioli is an educator and researcher in language teaching and teacher education. With over 40 years of experience, he has been fortunate to contribute to the professional development of teachers in the Americas, Europe, the Middle East, and Asia. Gabriel has authored numerous books and articles on language teaching methodologies, teacher leadership, and professional growth. He sat on the Board of Directors of the TESOL International Association (2006-2009) and was President of IATEFL (2020 - 2024). He is an Academic Advisor to the Institute of Education at Universidad ORT Uruguay. Gabriel's work is characterized by his commitment to empowering educators to become effective professionals, leaders, and advocates for their profession.

Session Title & Abstract: "What if there were an effective framework for language teaching?"

All over the world we hear complaints about students not learning English, despite the efforts of their teachers. In this presentation, I will explore six key concepts from general education that can empower language teachers in promoting their students' learning. Participants will learn about these six key factors for developing language lessons that promote active learning, student engagement, teacher mediation, and outstanding pedagogy. The six factors focus on students' various emerging learning needs and help teachers respond by teaching at the point of need.

Dr. Youcef Hdouch, Professor of Linguistics & Discourse Analysis, Ibn Tufail University, Morocco

Hdouch Youcef is a professor of linguistics and discourse analysis. Currently, he is the Head of the Department of English Studies, based at the Faculty of Languages, Letters and Arts, Ibn Tofail University, Kenitra, Morocco. He is also the coordinator of the research team on discourse analysis of the laboratory Language and Society. He is also a member of the Educational and Islamic Sciences Studies, a research team of the Danish-Arab Academy. As a researcher, he is interested in the multidimensional functions of language: structural, social, political. He is the author of many books and articles on Amazigh phonology, and political and advertising discourses. He has participated in the conception and coordination of many Tempus and ERASMUS PLUS projects: SWING, PACES, INSIDE, Dial@angues. Currently, he is the coordinator of Virtual Tabadul, an exchange program with Florida International University, funded by the Stevens Initiative and sponsored by the U.S State Department.

Session Title & Abstract: "Virtual Tabadul: Creating Language-learning Community through Virtual Reality"

My presentation describes a multi-institution project that explains the design and development of Virtual Tabadul, an Arabic and English foreign language exchange program amongst 1,200 U.S. and Middle East and North Africa (MENA) college-aged youth over a three-year period, utilizing the latest theoretical and empirical advancements in the fields of applied linguistics to maximize second language acquisition. We did so by embedding virtual exchange in virtual reality spaces for Arabic and English, following a task-based language teaching approach. The exchange program is a unique experience that showcases how we designed and developing a new method to help those working at the pedagogical and technological edges of virtual exchange to bridge obstacles to innovation.

Dr. Alice Savage, Teacher Trainer, ELT Writer, TESOL Teacher, at Lone Star College North Harris in Houston, Texas.

Dr. Alice Savage has over 30 years of experience in ELT. The author of several multiskilled, reading, and writing coursebooks, she has also branched out to more creative endeavors, including one-act plays for English learners, extensive reading novels, and teacher support books. Alice holds an MA in English language teaching from the School for International Training in Brattleboro, Vermont, and she teaches ESOL at Lone Star College North Harris in Houston, Texas.

Session Title & Abstract: Using Drama in the Classroom

Drama offers an opportunity to simplify the complex dynamics of real conversations. There is engaging content in the story line, useful vocabulary in fixed expressions, and rich pronunciation opportunities in character motivation. The presenter taps into all three with activities for using scripts and ideas for writing original material.

Abstract: The 6I Framework to leverage GenAI in ELT Classrooms: Students who use AI tutors with no safeguards may become over dependent on the tools and perform worse when access is removed (Bastani, Bastani, Sungu, Ge, Kabakçı, & Mariman, 2024). Hence, there is an immediate need to design and implement frameworks that could ensure ethical practices while leveraging GenAI tools in classrooms, without undermining learners' critical thinking and creativity. The innovative 6I Framework for integrating Generative AI in the classrooms is proposed to have filled the gap. This presentation links the effectiveness of GenAI with educational best practices, offering a roadmap for educators to leverage GenAI more ethically, unlocking its transformative potential. Session Title: From Screen to Skill: Using Movie Subtitles to Improve LSRW Proficiency

Abstract: Movie subtitles have great potential as a teaching tool. In a proper context, subtitles significantly enhance input in LSRW (Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing) proficiency. This innovative approach integrates visual and auditory stimuli, offering an immersive experience that aids comprehension and fluency. Subtitles enable learners to synchronize spoken language with written text, enhancing listening skills by reinforcing word recognition and pronunciation. Additionally, reading proficiency improves as learners correlate dialogue with textual representation, expanding vocabulary and comprehension abilities. By bridging cinematic experiences with language learning objectives, transforms passive viewing into an active tool for skill development using movie subtitles effectively.

This presentation explores the incorporation of movie subtitles as a pedagogical tool in classroom settings through various interactive activities. It aims to provide primary teachers and high-school instructors with practical strategies and lesson plans to effectively utilize subtitles to foster language learning. The session will combine theoretical insights with hands-on demonstrations of how to adapt movie scenes and subtitles into engaging language exercises. Participants will gain

insights into the theoretical framework supporting this approach and leave with actionable strategies to implement in their own classrooms.

Session Title: Research Literacy for Language Teachers

Abstract: Research Literacy for Language Teachers: This presentation will explore several questions that are important to any language teaching professional: (a) What is research in language teaching and learning? (b) What are the types of research, and how can we define research, so it fits our own professional agenda (c) What does it mean to be research literate in our field? And (d) how can teachers become more research literate? Abstract: With the use of modern technological advancements nowadays, a drastic shift can be clearly noticeable in Teaching English as a Foreign Language (TEFL) approaches. This change can be attributed to various factors related to the way learners adopt blended strategies to attain learning and the way tutors adopt blended approaches to develop the teaching/learning processes. This research study investigates the differences between lesson plans developed by Arab Open University (AOU) student-teachers in the light of their own preferred teaching styles and the ones produced by Artificial Intelligence (AI). The study investigates the impact of using Artificial Intelligence (AI) on students' performance in enhancing the developed lesson plans. The data has been collected from previous studies and reviews of literature, the teaching styles inventory, and the in-class presentations of AOU students' lesson plans. The analysis of the lesson plans developed by AOU students, and the ones created by AI app (ChatGPT) has resulted in concluding that nearly all the artificially created lesson plans lack human factor and interactive practices that meet the learners' natural characteristic as being sociable, active, and curious. The researchers are suggesting a midway strategy that aims to aid the student-teachers in developing effective lesson plans by blending the learned TEFL teaching methods with AI tools such as ChatGPT.
