
This is neither controversial, irregular, unethical nor destructive. Many are saying, it's ABOUT TIME that the local GOP get pro-active in local matters!

Solutions Desired, Mediocracy Won't Do

For almost 50 years, either as a visitor or an owner, I have seen most of the major changes in Charlotte County. We bought property in Venice but moved to Punta Gorda in PGI upon retiring in 2011. I felt like a local who had been born here. I had seen the growth of the infrastructure and knew that "If you build it, they will come." It was only when Hurricane Charlie did its damage did I realize that the City of Punta Gorda had no idea of what it wanted to be. It was a blank slate and those who were elected to "be prepared" were not only unprepared, they abandoned their oath of office.

These Part-Time officials succumbed to unelected groups with names meant to pacify, but in the end, sacked those who could not say no. What was worse, the City Council did not have the ability to stand up to the demands made by those who chorused "We need to do something." The something that was agreed to was nothing the public approved. It was done by "the self-anointed" experts who spoke for few at the detriment of many. The idea that after "Charlie" the council was constrained, has never been explained and is, for all intents, gone.

We are consumed with what to do with the empty land in "downtown." Nothing that has been offered is going to work. The owner, content to leave it empty, can by law do just that. We are now part of a contest of two candidates, each with a "vision" of Punta Gorda and how it could be done. Each vision has its benefits and its detriments. Each does not fulfill the wants of a majority and for that, each will suffer. The City Council relies on a city manager who is more than capable of doing what city managers must do, and that is to make sure the city can pay its bills. The city has increased its reserves and cut its budget to be more in compliance with what is necessary by law. No one is pulling their hair out because "all I see is empty space." If they live in the "Bird" section of PGI, their mind is not consumed by empty space. Our downtown is a figment of our imagination, but an increase in taxes is not. Reality, a word few deal with, is in the form of 400 million in investment; something that is needed, if Punta Gorda is to be the Punta Gorda we all want. Should that not happen; should the investment needed to meet our obligations fail to materialize or should our City Council fail to rise to the level needed, the obligation will fall on all those residing in Punta Gorda. That obligation, in the form of a tax, will not stand well with all the taxpayers, including those part of the "We had to do something" group.

While we chew our cud, Sunseeker will come to fruition and those who want to be part of a "gastronomic" experience and enjoy entertainment at the high level, will drive through our streets, park in our garage, take an Uber to the venue and stick us with the bill. In short, the Charlotte Harbor CRA, or its successor, will look to incorporate the area and with Punta Gorda as a lesson in "what not to do," become a thriving, albeit very busy area, collecting tax money that should have been collected in Punta Gorda. I know I will be castigated for an oversimplification of what is going on, but if we use Occam's razor, "the simplest solution is usually the best solution" as a measure, I am close enough for government work.

The Punta Gorda city council needs to jettison all the "advisors" and learn more from their own experience than those who whisper in their ears. Admitting to not being the smartest person in the room shows that a candidate is correct and does not have what it takes to be in the position he represents. I say this, not with animus, but with my skin in the game. I expect expertise at all levels. I know my expectations will never be satisfied, but then, who says "I want a mediocre person to mirror my abilities?" The short form: the "downtown space" is the least of the worries in keeping Punta Gorda something people like. We need to "see" something, models, drawings, Ai-produced videos to get our adrenaline flowing.
