That was the Dean Andersson I knew. He was a smart, gifted starperson who gladly, quietly shared what he had with those around him. In this, Dean walked lightly on the earth and left it a better place than he found it.

If you missed getting to know C. Dean Andersson while he was here, it is not too late for you to get to know something of him now. He left behind some wonderful novels for you. Read them and meet the writer who was Dean. When you do, I know you'll be glad you took the time to get to know that smart, quiet, amazing, kindly starperson whom I knew as Dean Andersson.
