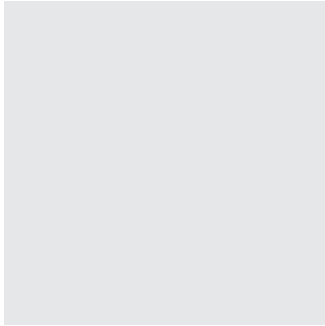

CLUB HISTORY

New Challenges

In 1968 the Club accepted the challenge of becoming a Founder Member of the Northern Premier League. However, the 1970's were not kind to Netherfield as they languished around the bottom of the Northern Premier League for most of the decade.

In 1980 Netherfield and Bridlington Trinity set a record for Cup Tie Replays that will likely never be broken, when they played each other seven times in the first round of the FA Trophy. After a total of thirteen and a half hours match play Netherfield won 2-0 to go through to the second round. However, the cost to both clubs was dire, a total of £1,800 and it depleted the finances of Netherfield causing the Club to move down into the North West Counties League Division I in 1982.

In 1987 the Northern Premier League expanded into a new division, League Division I which provided a route back for the Club to play at a higher level as they joined the new Division and in 1998 the Club changed its name to Netherfield Kendal.

The New Millennia

In 2000 with the demise of shoe making in the town, and with the Netherfield site now a shopping complex, K Village, the club decided to re-brand itself as Kendal

Town to reflect its relationship with the town. Although in recent years times have not been easy for Kendal Town there has been some success on the field, in 2003 they reached the final of the Marsden Cup and over 400 fans travelled to Accrington to watch them lose 2-0 to Conference side Leigh RMI. New state of the art floodlights began a slow process of gradual ground redevelopment in 2004 and 2,500 fans turned up to watch the lights switched on and a visiting Manchester United XI Squad.

Tony Hesketh returned to the club for a second spell as Manager in 2004/5 steering them to fifth place in the League. In the ensuing play-off final the club travelled to AFC Telford as underdogs. Although Kendal could not overhaul the favourites they won much respect from the 4,250 Telford fans watching as they narrowly lost 2-1. Later that year the club entered into partnership with the Westmorland FA and Bolton Wanderers in an effort to improve youth football and coaching.

The club achieved Charter Standard status from the FA shortly afterwards and subsequently formed a new youth club in conjunction with local club Wattsfield FC and achieved full Community Charter Standard status in an effort to improve football for boys and girls in the area.

2005/6 saw Kendal's most successful season for 40 years as they achieved a promotion for the first time in their history to the Unibond Premier League. The run-in to the

end of the season was a nail-biting one and Kendal missed automatic promotion on the last day of the Season by a single goal difference. A packed Parkside Road witnessed a pulsating Play-Off Final won by Kendal Town in the last minute when former Manager Peter Smith popped up to score the winning goal against Gresley Rovers to seal a famous promotion resulting in one of the biggest pitch invasions witnessed in Kendal!

The highpoint of the 2006/7 season was off the field, when a long-standing friend of Kendal Town, John Richardson persuaded Preston and England football legend Sir Tom Finney to come to a home game.

After a fine start to 2006/7 season in the Unibond Premier League, reality kicked in for Kendal Town. After a series of poor results, both in the League and in Cup competitions. Manager Tony Hesketh resigned and was replaced by Club Captain Lee Ashcroft. The Club hovered around the relegation zone for some time but managed to avoid relegation.

The high point of the season was when Preston and England legend Sir Tom Finney OBE was persuaded to become Club President: Sir Tom recounted he had as a teenager been turned down by Netherfield as a player by the Club.

The 2007/8 season saw the club finish in mid-table. The following two seasons were Town's best in the Unibond Premier League where they secured two Play-Off places in a row losing in the Semi-Finals each time. Longstanding Chairman David Willan was replaced by Haydon Munslow in 2010.

Manager Lee Ashcroft left to join

Northwich Victoria half way through the 2012/13 Season taking many of the playing team with him. Steve Edmondson took over as Manager but despite winning many of the remaining games with a new hastily formed Squad was unable to prevent the club being relegated. In 2013 the Club House which still runs in private ownership was taken back by the club and renamed by supporters as Finney's (after Sir Tom). In the same year Kendal Town Ladies was formed and a local Youth Development Centre established.

The 2013/14 season was one of consolidation in the Evo-Stik First Division North.

Former club striker David Foster replaced Steve Edmondson as Manager. The Season opened with hopes of a Play-Off place, but after a series of indifferent results David Foster departed and his assistant Michael Stringfellow stepped up as his replacement. He was able to produce a number of exciting home wins against highly rated clubs but couldn't find a consistent run of results. The 2014/15 started well for Michael Stringfellow with good results. A troubled period then followed with an outside Lancashire based business consortium trying hard to take over the Club. Internal friction amongst the Club's members was mirrored by increasingly poor results on the pitch. Chairman Haydon Munslow resigned and was replaced by George Gudgeon.

Michael Stringfellow resigned and was replaced by a new coaching team led by Gary Fawcett and the returning David Foster. The consortium withdrew. Results started to again improve leading to a mid-table finish. Further consolidation has continued since.

During the last 3 seasons, In order to reduce inherited debt and reduce bills has seen the chairman having to make unpopular

decisions, such as reducing/removing player wage bill, recruiting players from in and around the surrounding area, causing continued criticism and protests for him to resign. In early 2019 a 10 point strategy plan laying out the plans to move the club forward was revealed to the supporters. A majority of the players refused to play for the club and manager Dave Foster was relieved of his duties. Former manager Steve Edmondson took over as caretaker manager and the team avoided relegation although fortune favoured them, with the resignation of Colwyn Bay from the league. In the 2019-20 season Steve Edmondson was appointed manager on a full-time basis, with Keith Singleton his assistant.

Season 2018/19 marked the Centenary of the Mintcakes but the Club struggled on the field and only avoided relegation because Colwyn Bay opted to transfer to the Welsh Pyramid.

Season 2019/20 will be remembered more for the Covid19 Pandemic than the football, the season being curtailed in March. George Gudgeon stood down as Chairman prior to the start of the new Season due to ill health with his wife Linda also resigning as Secretary. A much changed Committee has been formed to take the Club forward. Chris Humphrey the former Jamaican International, Preston North End and Motherwell player has been appointed Player/Manager with John Foley as First Team Coach.

PLAYER PROFILES

1 – Keeper Tomas Holy

signed for the Blues on a two-year deal during the summer 2022 transfer window. Born in the Czech Republic, Holy started playing his football with Hradlec Kralove before joining Sparta Prague as a teenager. He gained valuable experience whilst with Sparta with loan spells at Graffin Vlasim, Viktoria Zizkov and Fastav Zlin, where he amassed over 75 first-team appearances. A move to England followed during the January 2017 transfer window when he signed a two-and-a-half-year deal with Gillingham. He established himself as first choice between the sticks with the Gills, with scouts from the Premier League and Championship shadowing his every move as he kept 15 clean sheets in his 52 outings through the 2018/19 campaign. A switch to Ipswich followed in the summer of 2019, with 65 appearances in all competitions complemented by a half-season loan stay with Port Vale through the second half of last season, after his contract had been triggered to keep him at Portman Road for a further year. A renowned shot-stopper with an incredible physical presence, he has represented his country at U16, U17 and U18 level.

2 – United signed right-sided defender

Joel Senior from National League outfit Altrincham on an 18-month deal for an undisclosed fee at the beginning of the January 2022 transfer window. Senior, 22,

cut his teeth as a youngster with Oldham Athletic, but was released as a 15-year-old. He settled in the North West Counties League with Maine Road FC, where he gained valuable experience in men's football at the tender age of 16. FC United of Manchester snapped him up, and he spent 18-months at Broadhurst Park before making the short hop to Curzon Ashton. It was whilst with 'The Nash' that scouts from Premier League and Championship clubs really started to take notice and, following a series of trials, he opted for Burnley. The onset of Covid and a battle against injury restricted his opportunities at Turf Moor and he joined former Nantwich gaffer Phil Parkinson at Altrincham in the summer of 2020. Initially having to be patient, he worked his way into the team and became an ever-present, making 67 appearances in total for the Robins. His only goal for the club was a stunner – a rifled volley against Chester in the FA Trophy in December 2020 – but he netted nine assists from 26 games in all competitions during that campaign.

3 – Former-Preston defender

Jack Armer joined the Blues on a one-year deal in August 2020. An impressive first season earned him a new two-year deal in May 2021 which keeps him with the Cumbrians until the summer of 2023. Armer, a Scotland under-19 international, came through the ranks with his hometown

club where he went on to captain the under-18 side. Renowned for having a solid left foot, he has been utilised as a left-sided centre half and as a left back, and he enjoyed a fruitful loan spell with Lancaster where he earned a regular starting place in the team.

4 – Midfielder

Owen Moxon joined the club on a two-year deal during the summer 2022 transfer window. Carlisle-born Moxon started his career across the border with Queen of the South, where he made 10 appearances, having left United's academy as a 16-year-old. He enjoyed a loan spell with Gretna whilst with the Doonhamers, bagging three times in 10 outings, and was snapped up by Annan Athletic in the summer of 2017. A haul of 15 goals in 148 games for the Galabankies brought outside interest, with his 46 appearances during the 2021/22 season culminating with the play-off double-header against Edinburgh City. He was voted into the PFA Scottish League Two Team of the Year and also scooped the Supporters' Player of the Year and Players' Player of the Year for his efforts.

5 – United signed defender

Morgan Feeney on a short-term contract in January 2021. This was extended for a further 12-months at the end of that campaign. A string of excellent performances brought the activation of a trigger which keeps him at Brunton Park until the summer of 2023. Bootle-born Feeney came through the Everton youth system and was loaned to Tranmere for the second half of the 2019/20 system. That had to be cut short as he suffered a hamstring injury in his first appearance. He left Everton to join Sunderland in the summer, and he scored his first senior goal in the 8-1 Papa John's trophy group game victory over Aston Villa.

6 –

7 – Winger **Jordan Gibson** put pen-to-paper with the Blues on a two-year deal from Sligo Rovers, for an undisclosed fee, at the end of the August 2021 transfer window. Birmingham-born Gibson was with Wolves and Bromsgrove as a youngster, and he joined Glasgow giants Rangers in 2015, and was part of their under-20 squad until he secured a move to Bradford City in the summer of 2017. He played 29 games for the Bantams, scoring once, and also enjoyed a loan spell with Stevenage through the second half of the 2018/19 campaign. A move to Ireland and St Patrick's proved to be a good one, and he was snapped up by Sligo, where he featured in every league fixture and scored in seven successive games through the first part of 2021.

8 – Midfielder **Callum Guy** initially penned an 18-month deal with the Blues during the January 2020 transfer window. A triggered clause secured his services for a further 12-months at the end of the 20/21 season. He then agreed a new contract in September 2021 which keeps him at Brunton Park until at least the summer of 2023. A box-to-box midfielder, he started his career with Derby County where he quickly became a regular in the club's under-23 side. He had loan spells with Port Vale and Bradford whilst with the Rams, where he gained vital league experience, then spent the first half of the 2018/19 campaign at Bloomfield Road, where he made 21 appearances. His performances secured him a permanent move and he made just under 50 appearances for the Tangerines, including 22 through the first half of the 2019/20 season. His first full season with the Blues earned him a raft of player-of-the-season nominations, many of which ended up on his mantelpiece.

9 – Striker **Ryan Edmondson**

arrived on a transfer from Leeds United on a two-year deal in June 2022 which keeps him at Brunton Park until the summer of 2024. Harrogate-born Edmondson cut his teeth as a youngster with York City, becoming the club's third ever youngest player to play for the first team at the tender age of 16 years and 140 days. He was snapped up by Leeds United, then in the Championship, in 2017 and has enjoyed loan spells with Aberdeen, Northampton Town, Fleetwood Town and most recently Port Vale during his five seasons with his parent club. He bagged three goals for the Valiants, as they booked promotion into League One via the play-offs last season, and has also represented England at under-19 level.

10 – Striker **Omari Patrick** was welcomed back to Brunton Park on an 18-month deal during the first week of the January 2022 transfer window. He initially signed for the Blues for an undisclosed fee from Bradford City during the January 2020 transfer window. He scored seven goals in 47 appearances before leaving to join Burton Albion in June 2021. He made 11 appearances in all competitions for the Brewers. Patrick started his career in non-league with Beaconsfield SYCOB and made a step up in levels when he was just 21 when he signed for Kidderminster Harriers. He was spotted by Barnsley, who snapped him up on a one-year deal, and he impressed with the development squad at Oakwell which caught the eye of Bradford City along the way. An initial one-year deal took him to Valley Parade in May 2017 and he hit the ground running when he bagged the winning goal against Blackpool on his debut in the first game of the 2017/18 season. His contract was extended to a three-year deal with the Bantams in August 2017 and he spent the first half of the 2018/19 campaign on-loan with Yeovil Town. The 2019/20 term saw him team up with Wrexham for a

loan spell where he scored five goals in his seven starts for the Welsh outfit.

11 – Midfielder

Brennan Dickenson joined the club on a two-year deal in August 2020. Dickenson was in the youth system with Southampton before he joined Dorchester, where five goals in just over 20 appearances caught the eye of Brighton, then in the Championship, who secured his services for an undisclosed fee. He had valuable loan spells with Chesterfield, Wimbledon and Northampton whilst with the Seagulls, and he was on the move again in the summer of 2014 when Gillingham snapped him up, again for an undisclosed fee. A total of 78 appearances for the Gills preceded a move to Colchester, where he would go on to be named in the 2016 EFL Team of the Year, having established himself as a left wing back with the U's. He bagged 15 goals in just over 90 appearances with the Essex club, but he chose to turn down a new contract offer in favour of a move to MK Dons. A call from Exeter in January 2020 saw him join the Grecians for their play-off push, where he scored twice in 13 appearances.

12 – Fulham midfielder

Sonny Hilton joined the club on a season-long loan deal ahead of the 2022/23 campaign. Hilton joined Fulham as an under-16 player from Tranmere Rovers. He has also represented England at under-16 level and captained Fulham's under-18 side as he continued his progression at his parent club. He enjoyed a loan spell with Finnish side TPS Turku between April and July 2021 and returned to skipper the under-23 squad during the 2021/22 season. Playing on the right of midfield, and in the middle, he was part of the team that clinched the Premier League 2 Division 2 title, securing their promotion in style.

13 – Keeper **Gabriel Breeze** is

another who signed a two-year professional deal whilst still just halfway through his scholarship programme. The local lad was a teenager when he entered the academy system but he progressed quickly to earn his place in the first-team dressing room.

14 – Striker Kristian Dennis signed for the Blues on an 18-month deal during the January 2022 transfer window, which keeps him at Brunton Park until the end of the 2022/23 season. Dennis began his career at Macclesfield Town, but left the club in 2010 going on to play for Woodley Sports, Mossley and Curzon Ashton. His impressive spell with Curzon saw him bag 72 goals in two seasons, which earned him a three-year spell with Stockport County. A return to Macclesfield on loan brought him 27 goals in 44 appearances, and that caught the eye of Chesterfield, who secured his services in the summer of 2016. Two seasons with the Spireites added 31 goals in 90 appearances to the tally, and there was more to come with 22 goals in 64 outings for Notts County. He moved north of the border to play for Scottish Premier League outfit St Mirren in the summer of 2020, and he leaves the Saints having registered six goals in 40 appearances.

15 – Midfielder Taylor Charters earned himself a two-year deal just two months into the second year of his YTS scholarship with the club in August 2019. Having trained with the first team squad, and with a number of pre-season friendly appearances to his name, he settled quickly and notched up nine appearances during the 2019/20 season. A triggered clause extended his stay until the summer of 2022. A half-season loan spell with Gateshead saw him play his part in their National League North title-winning campaign, and he was rewarded with a further one-year deal with his parent club upon his return.

16 – Forward Tobi Sho-Silva joined the Blues on an 18-month contract from Sutton United for an undisclosed fee during the January 2022 transfer window. The London-born striker began his career as a youth player with Charlton and had loan spells with Welling and Inverness Caledonian Thistle before joining Bromley in 2016. Having netted 11 goals that season, he made the switch to Dover, where he spent two seasons, before heading north to Halifax. He bagged eight goals in 30 outings for the Shaymen, and that attracted interest from Sutton, who captured his signature in the summer of 2020.

17 – Defender Corey Whelan signed a two-year deal with the Blues in the summer of 2021. He was in the Crewe academy system as a young boy but was snapped up by Liverpool at when he was still just nine-years-old. The Republic of Ireland U17 and U21 international went on to become a regular in the U23 side with the Reds, where he often wore the captain's armband. He enjoyed loan spells with Yeovil and Crewe, gaining good league experience, before making the move to the USL in the summer of 2019. A return from America two-years later saw him sign for Wigan where he helped the club to avoid the drop, despite them going into administration.

18 – Midfielder Josh Dixon joined the club's academy as a nine-year-old and worked his way through the groups to earn his first one-year deal at the end of the 2018/19 season. An attack minded midfielder, with an eye for a pass, he battled back from a cruciate ligament injury to earn a new two-year contract in July 2019. He suffered another setback when he picked up another knee injury during training that month, but his hard work was further rewarded when he penned a new two-year deal in the summer of 2021.

19 – Striker **Sam Fishburn** capped off an excellent first year of his scholarship when he penned a two-year professional contract (with an option) in June 2021. He had finished the 20/21 campaign as the highest scoring player in the youth leagues, with over 20 strikes to his name in all competitions. He went on-loan to Lancaster City in November 21 where he exploded on the scene, scoring for fun, and he was recalled to feature for the first team, where he enjoyed a run of starts through December and early January 2022. Plucked out of the north-east local circuit, where he was playing with Wallsend Boys Club, he took to academy football like a duck to water ahead of being offered his deal.

20 – Youth product **Jack Ellis** signed his first professional deal with the club at the beginning of January 2022. The Kendal-born defender was handed the under-18 captain's armband for the 21/22 season and flourished, earning a step up to the first-team training environment. Settling quickly as part of the first-team squad, he signed his two-year deal before the completion of his scholarship programme. He started both of the remaining fixtures of the 2021/22 season, giving him his home and away league debuts.

21 – Keeper **Scott Simons** signed a two-year professional contract at the end of his first season as an under-18 player. Having joined the club at the age of eight, he was rewarded for his hard work with the offer of a deal, which brings him into his first season in the professional ranks.

22 – United initially signed defender **Jon Mellish** on a one-year deal midway through May 2019. Having been converted to a midfield role, he was quickly offered a new deal. October 2020 brought more contract discussions and an agreement was reached which kept him with the club

until the summer of 2022. Impressing once again, yet more contract talks ensued, this time in September 2021, and he agreed a new deal which keeps him at Brunton Park until at least the summer of 2023. Mellish, a Gateshead College graduate, came through the under-19 system with the Heed and also enjoyed a loan spell with Newcastle Benfield as he cut his teeth in the game. Originally a left-footed centre-back, he has since shown he can play a number of positions, and made his first-team debut in the final game of the 2016/17 National League season. From there he was subsequently offered a full contract with the club. He made a total of 58 appearances for his hometown team, scoring twice, and made his debut for the England C squad in a 1-0 victory over the Estonia under-23 side in October 2018. He picked up the National League's young player of the year award for the 2018/19 season at a ceremony in London two days before joining the Cumbrians. He scored a whopping 16 goals from his new midfield berth during the 20/21 season, and the fans voted his stunner against Newport as their goal-of-the-season that year.

23 – Attacking midfielder **Lewis Bell** signed his first professional deal – a two-year contract with a further one-year option – at the end of 2020/21 season. He joined the academy system when he was just nine-years-old, and progressed through to the under-18 squad having impressed at every level through the age groups.

24 – Academy product **Max Kilsby** signed his first one-year professional contract at the end of his two-year scholarship programme in May 2022. An effective left-sided defender, he settled into the first-team environment as he stepped up to train regularly with the squad.

25 – Striker **Tristan Abrahams** agreed a two-year deal with the Blues in

June 2021, keeping him at the club until the summer of 2023. He spent the second half of his first season on-loan at Grimsby, where he helped the club to a National League play-off final triumph. London-born Abrahams started out as a youngster with Leyton Orient and signed his first professional deal with the O's in November 2016. A run of games for the youngster at the end of that season saw him score his first senior goals as he bagged twice in two consecutive outings against Luton and Hartlepool respectively. He enjoyed a four-game loan spell with Cambridge City before making the switch to Norwich for an undisclosed fee in 2017. Loan spells with Orient, Exeter and Yeovil followed whilst with the Canaries, and he left Carrow Road to join Newport County on a two-year contract in the summer of 2019. He bagged 18 goals in 74 appearances in all competitions at Rodney Parade and spent the second half of last season back where it all began, at the Breyer Group Stadium, playing in another 14 games for the Orient.

Midfielder **Jamie Devitt** returned to Carlisle on a short-term deal during the January 2022 transfer window. He was invited back to train with the Blues ahead of the 22/23 campaign kick-off ... Devitt is no stranger to Brunton Park having bagged 22 goals in 130 appearances in a three-year stay between 2016 and 2019. The Dublin-born attack-minded playmaker started his career with Hull City, where he had loan spells with Darlington, Shrewsbury Town, Accrington Stanley, Bradford City, Rotherham United and Grimsby Town before making the switch to sign for Chesterfield in the summer of 2013. He joined Morecambe during the January 2014 loan window and went on to net 12 goals in 98 appearances for The Shrimps. He finished the 2015/16 campaign as League Two's top assist-maker and picked up a

trio of Player of the Year awards. His stay in Cumbria ended when he signed for Blackpool in the summer of 2019, where he had loan moves to Bradford and Newport before penning a deal with Barrow in January 2021. He scored once in 22 outings with the Bluebirds.

Manager – Paul Simpson

Carlisle lad Paul Simpson returned for his second spell in the hotseat at Brunton Park in February 2022, with the club deeply embroiled in a relegation battle. There was an immediate upturn in results, with the club securing league safety with a month to spare. Talks quickly followed and a three-year deal, keeping him with Carlisle until at least the summer of 2025, was agreed. The popular gaffer first became a local hero when he took over a struggling club during the 2003/04 season. He galvanised the Blues, almost saving them from an impossible situation, but led the charge with back-to-back promotions from the Conference into League One through 2004/05 and 2005/06. A man with a wealth of football and management experience - he won the World Cup at the helm of the England U20 squad in 2017 – he has also managed at Rochdale, Preston, Shrewsbury, Stockport, Northwich Victoria and Bristol City, prior to his return to Cumbria.

CARLISLE UNITED

CLUB HISTORY

Carlisle United's origins can be traced back to 17 May 1904 and the annual meeting of Shaddongate United when members of the club voted to change their name to Carlisle United.

In 1905, they joined the Lancashire Combination and four years later moved Brunton Park. From 1910 they competed in the North Eastern League, winning the title in 1922. In 1928, Carlisle United replaced Durham City in the Football League.

20 Carlisle's first fixture on 25 August 1928 saw a 3-2 victory at Accrington Stanley. A week later they overcame Hartlepool 8-0. This is still the record victory although equalled in 1952 when Scunthorpe were also beaten 8-0.

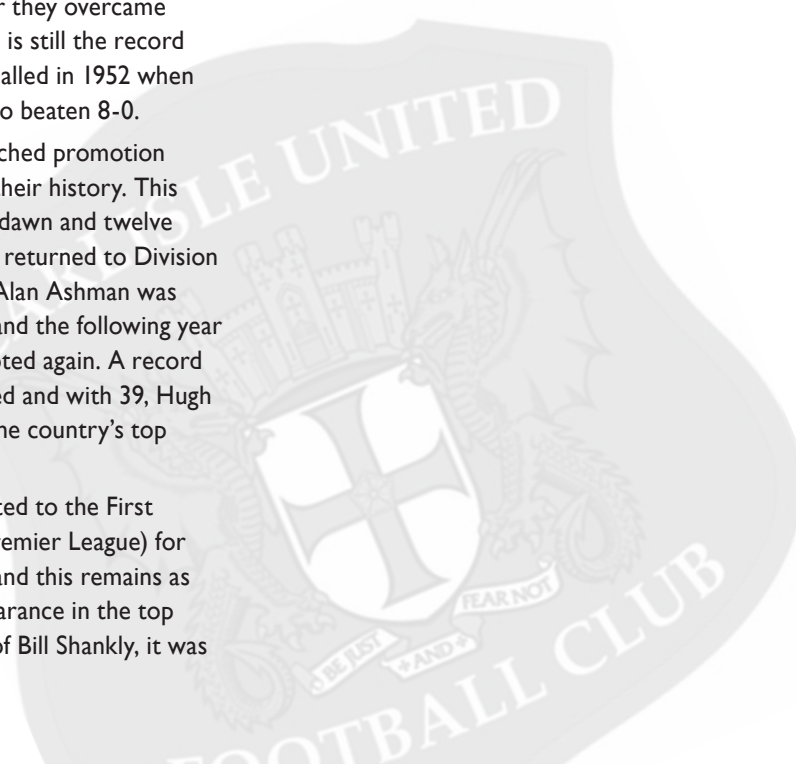
In 1962, Carlisle clinched promotion for the first time in their history. This proved to be a false dawn and twelve months later United returned to Division Four. Early in 1963, Alan Ashman was appointed manager and the following year Carlisle were promoted again. A record 113 goals were scored and with 39, Hugh McIlmoyle became the country's top scorer.

United were promoted to the First Division (now the Premier League) for the 1974/75 season and this remains as their only ever appearance in the top flight. In the words of Bill Shankly, it was

'the greatest feat in the history of the game'.

A club steeped in history and drama – none less so than with one of football's iconic moments when keeper Jimmy Glass scored with the last kick of the season in May 1999 – it spent one season out of the Football League, but won promotion back from the Conference at the first attempt in season 2004/05.

A proud Football League Trophy history saw them make a record sixth appearance in the final at Wembley in 2011 where they secured their second success by lifting the trophy with a 1-0 victory over Brentford.
