She was proud of the fact that during World War II, she worked for the Atlantic Oil Refinery (the only woman) and could change tires as fast as the men. She and her husband were owners of Al's Diner and then the Robin Hood Diner, Robbinsville, N.J., and always had a regular crowd of truck drivers who would make these their favorite stop while enroute. After 25 years in the restaurant business, both she and her husband, Bill retired to Frackville, her birthplace. She worked in the kitchen of the Elks providing great meals for the members. Oh, the crab cakes were heavenly.

After retiring from the Elks, a wonderful senior citizen program afforded her the opportunity to work part-time in the Vocational Technical School photocopying, filing and doing work to support the teachers. She finally retired at age 89.

In 1999, she left Frackville for Maine to live with her granddaughter, Karen and her husband, Pat and their son, Mike. Her days were filled with crocheting, sewing projects for gifts, a daily crossword puzzle (to keep her mind sharp), visiting with friends, and as a lover of all animals, she enjoyed Max the family's golden retriever. Additionally, her energy allowed her to volunteer at Eliza Libby School, Buxton, one day a week in kindergarten and first grade in Judy Lewis classrooms. Children gravitated toward her and loved reading with her. She was able to draw out the best in everyone. Two special young people who touched her life were Tom and Emily. In 2002, the Maine State Legislature recognized her as one of Maine's Important Senior Volunteers making a difference in children's lives. Each year she attended Bonny Eagle's Senior Citizen Dinner and donated a gorgeous handmade afghan as a door prize.

After her stroke in 2005, she moved to North Carolina to stay with granddaughter, Erin, her husband Jack, and their son, John.

Erin's positive nature and excellent care bolstered Gram's spirits and gave her the opportunity to watch the beautiful sunsets from their living room high atop the mountain for almost two years. Each day Erin would sing and tell jokes continually making her smile. As the end drew near, Erin never left her side reassuring her and continuing to support her.
