BUILDING & GROUNDS

April is upon us. Hello everyone. Have you operated your dishwasher lately? You need to run it at least once a month so the hoses don't dry out. Once they dry out and crack, you've got a water leak. Thank You, Bill Rowe, bringing up the questions regarding the L/S Fitness Center. I will be putting it on the April Agenda.

Anyone and everyone is welcome to attend our committee meetings.

When it's time to make changes in your unit, please fill out the required "Work Order" and explain what you are intending to do. It's available in the library. Leave it at the office, and they will see that the Buildings & Grounds Committee reviews it. It will then be sent to the Board of Directors for approval.

March 22nd, we hosted a meeting with Richard McCoy, City Engineer for Robbinsdale and Jenna Wolf, City Water Resources Specialist for Robbinsdale regarding our inquiries to lower our water bill, improve our irrigation system, utilize many options for gathering rain water for irrigation, and possibly obtain grants to subsidize our costs. One option is to use all the manholes on our property, placing underground cisterns for rainwater collection and distribution. We were also informed it is possible to obtain a water efficiency grant regarding our usage of toilets, washing machines and dishwashers.

Future possibility for either Rain Gardens or Prairie Strip Planting partnered with U of M for adding deeply rooted plants needing less water. Discussions and updates to follow as the months go by. Please provide your feedback at our meeting or to any of our members.



Lee Square Tornado and Severe Weather Policy

PUBLIC WARNINGS FOR TORNADO/SEVERE WEATHER WILL BE GIVEN THROUGH RADIO ANNOUNCEMENTS, TV BULLETINS, AND SOUNDING OF CIVIL DEFENSE SIRENS.

Tornado and Severe Storm "WATCH" -

A "Watch" is issued by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) when conditions are right for a tornado or severe storm to develop.

When a tornado or severe weather "Watch" is issued by NOAA all Lee Square Members should take the following actions:

- 1) Remain Calm
- 2) Return from common areas to your own apartment so you can shelter in place if necessary.
- 3) Close all apartment windows.
- 4) Close all curtains/drapes to help prevent flying glass.
- 5) Close all apartment doors to prevent wind circulation.
- 6) Monitor the weather on a weather radio, a public radio station (like WCCO), or a local TV station, and listen for Civil Defense Sirens to sound in case a Tornado or Severe Storm "Warning" develops.

Tornado and Severe Storm "WARNING" -

A "Warning" is issued by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) when a tornado or severe storm is in the immediate area and will be accompanied by lengthy sounding of Civil Defense Sirens.

When a tornado or severe weather "Warning" is issued by NOAA all Lee Square Members should take the following actions:

- 1) Do not leave the building under any circumstances.
- 2) Sheltering in place in your unit is the best option. The safest place is the bathroom with the door shut.
- 3) If you are unable to get back to your own apartment other safe places in the facility are: any small room without windows, public restrooms, or in the garage storage locker area, fitness center or the workshop area. Alternately, interior hallways as far away from any windows as you can get are good.
- 4) Continue to monitor radio or TV for storm information if you are able to.

Lee Square Smoke and Fire Alarm Policy

IN UNIT SMOKE ALARM -

Individual apartment smoke alarms are not connected to the fire alarm system.

If the smoke alarm in your apartment goes off while you are cooking check your stovetop, oven, toaster, or other cooking appliance(s) for something burning. Turn off whatever you have on. If there's only smoke turn on your bathroom fan and open windows to help remove it.

If you see fire close all doors and windows and get out of your apartment. Go out in the hallway and pull the nearest fire alarm (Red Box). Call 911 or ask someone else to do it. Move away from the area and do <u>NOT</u> go back into your apartment under any circumstances. Your life is more important than your stuff!

FIRE ALARM -

REMAIN CALM! DO NOT USE THE ELEVATOR AFTER THE FIRE ALARM IS ACTIVATED! DO NOT COME DOWN TO THE FRONT DESK DURING A FIRE ALARM!

Either smoke or fire in any and all facility common areas will activate the alarm system.

Laundry Room and Commons Area access doors will close automatically upon activation of the fire alarm. They do not lock when they close.

If you are anywhere in the first-floor commons or in the garage, go outside immediately through the nearest exit door.

If you are in your apartment when the fire alarm sounds stay there and shelter in place. Close all doors and windows. Never open a door without touching it first with the palm of your hand. If it's hot DO NOT open it. Fire is on the other side of the door. If smoke begins to seep under your door put a wet towel on the floor in front of the door to stop it.

Stay in your apartment until you get an "ALL CLEAR" or evacuation instructions from rescue personnel.

If ordered to evacuate put your safety first. Do not waste time gathering personal belongings, getting fully dressed, putting hearing aids in etc.

Vegetable Garden Update

Hello everyone. I hope you're looking forward to some great vegetable and flower growing this spring and summer. We will be bringing in some garden soil some time in April to add some depth to the existing gardens. We are going to raise the price of all gardens to \$20 for this year only to cover some of this cost. Next year we will go back to \$10 for all gardens.

We don't want anyone to plant until May 15. So, I can get the gardens tilled and ready for planting and all chance of frost is gone.

Many thanks to Tom Carlin for helping me put the garden framing and setting the patio blocks in place. A little more work will be done to level up some of the block to make a level and solid base for them.

Thanks to Gary Huse for moving the water connections off to the side and placing some good hose hangers in place. He's excited to get started on this year's growing experience.

There are at least 3 gardens open for anyone who wants to sign up. The gardens are quite large now. You might think of getting together with a friend to partner with to help with keeping the garden clean of weeds and sharing the bounty.

Thanks to Don Fries for pulling out old timbers and sending up to cabin country.

Gardening rules and sign-up sheets will be set out toward the end of April. One garden to a person until June 1. After that, first-come-first-served for a second garden.

BLACK COMPOSTING BINS

These bins are open to place your table scraps in. They are emptied in the beginning of May and again around October 1, and the compost placed into the vegetable gardens.

DO compost: Kitchen scraps, indoor plants and garden plants (must be chopped into small pieces) leaves and grass clippings, old bread as long as it is cut up into small pieces.

DO NOT compost: Fish, fats, bones, meats, dairy products, milk products, polluted liquids, wood ashes or soot, aggressive plants (weeks, poison ivy), waste, plastic, trash, pet droppings.
