

From the Desk of Pastor Marvin Herman

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

I know most of us had an art class or two when we attended middle and high school. I remember an eighth-grade art class where each of us received about 10 pounds of gooey wet clay. After several class periods of instructions on how to prepare the base and foundation of our future clay creation, each of us were then given the opportunity to use a pottery wheel to shape our formless blob into a small pot or bowl. Whether we were successful in forming the clay into a pot or bowl, our teacher took our tiny masterpieces and placed them into a kiln. We were told kilns would put our creation under extreme heat and would become solid pots- sure enough that is exactly what happened. Our once flimsy blobs of clay were transformed into glass like masterpieces.

What's interesting about these clay pots is although they were hardened under temperatures, which exceeded 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit, I noticed they were still incredibly durable yet fragile. If you bumped them against a hard surface they would chip, and if you dropped them onto a hard surface they would explode into a million pieces.

What seems so durable on the outside- even when refined by Fire! - was actually incredibly delicate and weak. In Paul's second letter to the people of Corinth, Paul uses the example of the clay jar. He tells in his letter that we are all like the clay jar; seemingly durable on the outside, yet incredibly delicate and frail and weak on the inside. These typically aren't words we want to associate ourselves with. If I told you I was weak and frail and fragile you'd probably wonder what is wrong with me. Humans, especially males, are supposed to be strong and tough and unbreakable. We're expected to do it all and have all the necessary skills to take on any challenge. But this is a fool's errand- we can never hope to be anything more than helpless sinners at the feet of God

But that's where God steps in. We each have been given an amazing treasure. We each have been given the gift of grace and mercy and new life in Jesus Christ. This gift lives in us through the Holy Spirit. This spirit empowers us and gives us strength even in our darkest moments when God steps in and says "You can find rest in me. True power comes from me through the my Spirit and you will be strengthened."



For if we think we can do everything on our own, we could never hope to be stronger than God.

It is truly in our weakness that God loves and strengthens us. It is when we lack that God provides and answers our prayers. It is when we ask that the door is opened for us. When we admit to ourselves and God that we are clay jars - delicate, weak, and fragile- when we admit we cannot do it on our own and are powerless to ourselves. This is when God wraps his arms around us and gives us the greatest treasure we could ever hope for: New life in our risen Savior, Jesus Christ.





Remembering Reverend David McCall Liscomb January 24, 1933 - April 6, 2021

Rev. David McCall Liscomb of Crystal Falls, MI. passed away at the age of 88 on April 6th, in Glendale AZ, after gallantly battling a long, debilitating illness. David knew "whose he was and where he was going" and passed from this earth with grace and peace to the arms of his Lord.

David was born on January 24, 1933 in Romeo, MI. On October 15, 1955 he married Arlene Steffen of Centerline, MI. Together, they raised four children. Rev. Liscomb was a charter graduate of Oakland University in Rochester, MI. Where he earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree and a Master of Divinity Degree from Bexley Hall. He was a strong, and loving role model to his kids and grands, always encouraging that they could do anything in life of their choosing if they committed to the work to achieve their dreams. He truly did. An Ordained Minister of the United Methodist Church, he served a number of churches in Michigan, retiring in 1998 after 43 years in the ministry. He was a trye servant of the Lord, spreading the gospel of Jesus and how he lived and loved on a daily basis. As a retired pastor, he was happy to be in the pew and singing (quite loudly, and unashamedly off-key) all his favorite hymns. Fellowship with his "pew-pals" was a treasure.

He is survived by his loving wife Arlene, an identical twin brother Robert, son Steven, and daughter Candice, Senegal, 5 grandchildren, and 3 great grandchildren. In addition to his parents, Rev. Liscomb was preceded in death by his son Andrew, his beloved cat Calvin, a sister, Roberta, and a brother, George.
