From the Desk of Pastor Marvín Herman

As summer begins, the church will enter into the Season of Renewal

As we move beyond the Easter season and celebrate Pentecost, the church will transition into a new season—the Season after Pentecost, often referred to as Ordinary Time. But there's nothing "ordinary" about it. It is a sacred time of *renewal*, represented by the color green that adorns our sanctuary. Green symbolizes growth, life, and hope—things we all long for, especially during the slower, more reflective pace of summer. In the coming months, I encourage you to embrace this season as a time to set aside daily

worries—the things we carry that weigh down our minds and hearts. Let it be a time of spiritual realignment, where we remind ourselves that no matter what the world throws at us, **God is in control.**

Do Not Worry – A Word of Encouragement

"Therefore, I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink, or about your body, what you will wear... Look at the birds of the air... Are you not of more value than they?... Consider the lilies of the field... If God so clothes the grass of the field, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith?" (Matthew 6:25–30)

We all know how life can feel overwhelming. Problems pile up, nights get long, and assurances from friends—even the best-intended ones—can feel empty when you're walking through a hard season. I remember one such time vividly. It was the summer of 2005. I was on a mission trip with our youth group in the hills of West Virginia. We encountered poverty in ways I had never seen—families living in an old school bus, repurposed as a home for ten or more people.

The need was overwhelming, and our work, while meaningful, felt like a drop in the bucket.

One day, after five long days of serving, the weight of it all hit me. A fellow youth leader from Ohio pulled me aside and asked, "Why are you so down?" That was all the invitation I needed. I shared my burdens—not just about the trip, but everything else going on in my life at the time.

After listening patiently, he said something I'll never forget:

"Let's rate these problems. If something is like needing gas in your car, it's a 1. But if it's about life and death, that's a 10." One by one, we walked through my list. And you know what? Most of what I was stressed about barely ranked above a 2. That day, I was reminded how easily we can turn molehills into mountains when we lose perspective.

Navigating Life's Forks in the Road

A few weeks ago, I read a devotion that stuck with me. It said: "Every day offers us forks in the road—choices that shift the direction of our lives." It got me thinking: how often do a few wrong turns—small but significant—lead us far from where we intended to go? Add to that life's unavoidable challenges, illness, financial strain, relational

pain, or cultural turmoil—and we can quickly find ourselves feeling lost in the dark.

But here's the good news: We are not alone.

Jesus closes the Gospel of Matthew with this powerful promise:

"And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:20)

Let that truth carry you through. Whether the problems are big or small, known or unknown, Jesus is present. We may not always feel it in the moment, but His love is constant, and His care is unshakable.

Sing in the Darkness—Hope is Coming

The gospel reminds us: "Look at the birds of the air... your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?" (Matthew 6:26)

Yes, consider the birds. They don't worry. They trust their Creator. And so can we. Even in your darkest nights, dare to sing—because dawn is coming. Christ is our light, and the darkness will not last. Let your faith rise, and remember: God is with us. Christ is providing. And we are never alone.

A Final Word

As you go about your summer—whether traveling, gardening, spending time with family, or simply soaking in the slower rhythm of the season—may you carry these truths in your heart. Don't let daily burdens cloud your joy. Breathe. Rest. Trust.

John "Jack" Louis Dalton

The Man, The Myth, The Legend John "Jack" Louis Dalton, devoted husband, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, and lifelong public servant, passed away peacefully on April 3, 2025.

away peacefully on April 3, 2025. Born on July 2, 1941, in Detroit, Michigan, Jack's life was defined by unwavering faith, deep love for family, and steadfast service to his community and country.

Jack proudly served in the U.S. Coast Guard for four years, rising to the rank of ET2. His service him from Belle Isle and nearby lighthouses to Rhodes Greece, where he was stationed the assassination President Kennedy in 1963. After his military career, Jack embarked on a distinguished journey in law enforcement - first with Oak Park Public Safety, where he became Chief of Detectives, and later as Police Chief of Auburn Hills. He concluded his career at the Oakland County Sheriff's Department before retiring.

A passionate community leader, Jack served on the Rochester Hills City Council and spent more than 20 years as President of the Older Persons Commission (OPC). A master woodworker, he found joy in OPC's woodshop, creating gifts for loved ones and sharing his skills with others. He also tended the OPC garden, growing vegetables like tomatoes, cucumbers, and basil. His love for service extended to the Auburn Hills Boys and Girls Club, where he mentored local youth with humility and heart.

Jack's devotion to community was also reflected in his long-standing membership with the Masons, where he held the honored title of Worshipful Master, and his active participation with the Shriners supporting charitable causes across the region.

Jack shared 62 beautiful years of marriage with his high school sweetheart, Patricia Ann Nasser. Together they raised daughters, Diana Lynn (Tim) Atkins, and Teresa Ann (Chris) Papadelis. He was a loving brother to his late sister Joyce Ann Varga, and late brother, Jerry Burgess Dalton. He took immense pride in his grandchildren - Megan (Atkins) Perkaj, Hailey (Atkins) Grady, Zachary Cecil Atkins (fiancée Ciara Sramek), Cross Dalton Papadelis, Cashton Cruz Papadelis, and Saylor Rayne Papadelis. Jack cherished his role as "Papa" to his great-grandsons. Frankie Johnny Perkaj.

Jack found peace and joy at Chateau ODI, the family's cottage in Gladwin, where he built an addition, a garage, and a second unit across the road to host treasured family gatherings. His creativity and craftsmanship left a lasting mark-just like the love he poured into every project and relationship every day.

A dedicated blood donor, generous volunteer, and tireless example of integrity, Jack's life was rich with purpose and kindness. He was a mentor, a role model to his sons-in-law, and a friend to all who knew him.

Jack was so much more than these words can articulate. He lived by example and lived life to the fullest! Jack will be remembered not only for what he accomplished-but for how deeply he loved and corved.

Just a few of the things they supply to impoverished food are countries; chickens for families in Kenya; pigs for families in Tanzania: household latrines for families in Cambodia; rainwater harvesting systems; just to name a few. 25% of all money raised stays in our community. It goes to LOVE, INC and FISH (food pantry) in Lake Orion/Oxford.

At the information meeting for the annual CROP WALK, our representative from Paint Creek UMC, Gail Stoner, found out that we had won the "Wooden Shoe" award. Our church won the "Wooden Shoe" award for outstanding walker participation in 2022 and 2024. In 2023, Paint Creek, one of the twelve participating churches, won the

Golden Shoe award, which is for the 10-year best funds that the church has raised. We have won awards for three consecutive years! The "Wooden Shoe" award is displayed in our church sanctuary.




