pastor's column



A message from Pastor Marv Herman

I have been asked why I follow the United Methodist Revised Common Lectionary. Well, to begin with, the Common Lectionary, which I refer to and use every week, is 3-year rotations of the major themes and readings in the Bible. As you journey through your year, you can be assured that you are doing so with Christians across the world in hundreds of different denominations and settings who follow the same Lectionary readings.

I find it ironic that Christian movements which speak loudly about the authority of scripture will, in practice, often read very little of it in public worship. That is why I feel we need Biblical responsive readings on Sunday for those of us who might not get the chance to open their Bibles during the week. Though it is left up to the appointed minister to use the lectionary or not, I feel it is important to observe the Christian church calendar and colors throughout the year also.

I have visited larger nondenominational churches over the last couple of years and found their worship time filled with large praise bands and media driven services. Contemporary services though well done, lack prayer, (sadly they shun the Lord's Prayer) and the only Bible I heard came from a passage the worship team or pastor shared during the message. Even though the worship services were wonderful, I found most churches had based their worship around familiar passages, purchased programs, videos, books, or proof-text points with verses out of context. I sat through several services without once hearing any reading of scripture. Gone also in the larger churches are the crosses, the altars, and very few observe Advent, Lent, Good Friday and other themes of the year. In this day and age, many people are unfamiliar with the stories and cadences of God's word. That is why I feel it is important to do the Psalm, Gospel and New Testament readings for the week as a way to improve the church's scriptural

'diet'. Consider using the posted readings each week in the bulletin and use them as devotional readings too.

Also, I will include the following information about the Christian Church calendar to let us brush up on what we at Howarth and Paint Creek UMC observe throughout the year.

Advent - celebrates the coming or birth of Christ and is the beginning of the church new year (any day between November 27 and December 3; always contains four Sundays; ends Christmas Eve). The traditional liturgical color is purple (violet) but blue is gaining popularity.

Christmas- celebrates the anniversary of the birth of Jesus which begins on Christmas Day and lasts for 12 days. The liturgical color is white.

Epiphany - celebrates the

manifestation of the divine nature of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi and begins the first Sunday in January and varies in length depending on the date set for Easter. It lasts until Septuagesima Sunday, 64 days before Easter. For the first and last Sundays, the liturgical color is white, for Ash Wednesday, it is purple, and for the other days, it is green.

Lent – observes a season of penitence (fasting and praying)

Lent is the season lasting forty-six days (not counting Sundays) beginning Ash Wednesday and ending the eve of Easter. The liturgical color is purple (violet). Good Friday, all colors, banners and flags are to be removed. Within the Lenten Season, we observe the following sacred events:

Ash Wednesday – addresses sin and death. The day ashes are rubbed on foreheads symbolizing that we are dust, and to dust we shall return, but with God's grace we can learn to live this life more fully, embracing our sinfulness, allowing God to transform us.

Palm Sunday – signals the upcoming end of Lent and the beginning of Holy Week. The day commemorates the spreading of palms and clothing in Jesus' path as He entered Jerusalem prior to His crucifixion.

Holy/Maundy Thursday – the word "Maundy" comes from the Latin word for 'command' (man datum) The command Jesus gave His disciples to love one another. The day, on which Jesus celebrated the Passover with His disciples, sharing a meal with them, which we call the Last Supper.

Good Friday – a day of mourning. The holy day of meditation for Christians, celebrated the Friday before Easter. It commemorates the suffering and death on the cross – the Crucifixion of Jesus at Calvary.

Easter – celebrates the commemoration of the Resurrection of Christ. Easter begins on Easter Sunday and continues for fifty days until Pentecost. The liturgical color is white and/or gold.

Pentecost commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and women followers of Jesus, fifty days after Easter, and ten days after Ascension Thursday. After the ascension of

Jesus, the apostles having retired to a house at Jerusalem, they there waited for the Holy Spirit, which Jesus had promised. (Read Acts 2:1-3) The Season of Pentecost celebrates that first Pentecost when all those who believed in Jesus Christ were gathered awaiting the coming of the Holy Spirit filled all who were present on that special day was the beginning of the Christian Church.

I hope you found this useful and I pray all of you will consider worshipping often and inviting others to join us for our upcoming services.
