
Pastor's Corner: Everything You Know About Revelations Is (Probably) Wrong

One of the least studied and yet supposedly best known books of the Bible is the Book of Revelation. Many people have heard of the "spooky" stories this book supposedly contains. I know that when I was in seminary, we spent absolutely zero time studying the Book of Revelation. It wasn't until many years later when I was looking for a Bible study topic at my church in Pennsylvania that I became truly interested in what this book contained.

My interest had been piqued by an article about Lutherans in East Germany during the time of the Communist domination. It seems that little groups of Christians would gather together for worship and study. They had to gather together like that because the Communist government virtually shut down all churches, turning their buildings into museums of archaic times gone past.

What really intrigued me was that Revelation was the book these Christians chose to study the most. I would have expected them to study one of the Gospels, or Proverbs, or anything but the Book of Revelation. Still, the article's author claimed the Book of Revelation was the one section of the entire Bible that helped them sustain their faith, their community, and their hope for the future.

I started doing some research. And the more I read about the Book of Revelation, the more my own



interest grew. The four-session Bible study I eventually put together on the book was well received by the people in my congregation. They were amazed, as was I, at the wonderful message of hope contained in the Book of Revelation – a message visible only once you learn how to break the code.

Beginning 22 October, I am offering our parish, and anybody else you may choose to invite, the opportunity to study the Book of Revelation. We will gather together at 6:00 p.m. for a quick dinner and begin our study at 6:30. Our classes usually last about an hour, sometimes a little more. Of all the Bible studies we've had, or will have, I really encourage you to attend this one. I have several reasons for doing that.

First, I am almost certain most of you have never read or studied the Book of Revelation. I mean no offense by that, especially as I had not delved into the book myself (except for a very cursory reading) before that article chanced to catch my interest.

Second, you'll find that what you think you know about the Book of Revelation is totally wrong. Over

the years, eerie and often disturbing stories about what goes on in the Book of Revelation have developed, many of them ending up in B movies and as pop culture references.

Yet the Book of Revelation is actually a great message of hope, written to a people who were severely oppressed by a government trying to destroy them. By understanding their struggles with depression in their time, and how the good news of Jesus Christ could help them, we begin to see how that same wonderful message can create hope for us today.

Maybe we're not dealing with a government trying to exterminate us, but each and every one of us faces our own struggles. Whatever the source of those challenges – family, work, a culture increasingly hostile to people of faith – the solution is made quite clear in the Book of Revelation: Turn to Jesus Christ and make that faith part of our daily existence. This fall's Bible study will give us new ideas about how to accomplish that.

I do hope you will join us as we journey through the Book of Revelation into a new experience of living and loving our Lord.
