Great care should be taken to affect this, and to prevent unfair, partial, and corrupt elections."

John Adams offered this description of the ideal Representative Assembly in his *Thoughts on Government* (which was published in the Spring of 1776). It remains as useful and relevant today as it was then. Congress and state legislatures in America, however, have fallen far short of Adams' ideal.

Common sense and observation tell us, and research confirms, that "economic elites and organized groups representing business interests have substantial independent impacts on U.S. government policy, while mass-based interest groups and average citizens have little or no independent influence." Implementing systems of Proxies for Citizens will shift power to senators and representatives who most accurately reflect the will of the people. That will shift power from economic elites and corporate interests to Politically Active Citizens and make Missouri a true democracy.

The Missouri Constitution opens with a powerful statement of democratic ideals:

"All political power is vested in and derived from the people.

All government of right originates from the people,
is founded upon their will only,
and is instituted for the good of the whole."
