First Congregational Church of Berlin (FCCB) Annual Meeting Minutes November 9, 2025

Moderator Ellen Moody called the meeting to order at 10:25 am. 28 members were present in the sanctuary; a quorum was declared. Pastor Doug Cameron shared a prayer for the group.

The 2025 Annual Report, which included Team Leader reports, was presented for review by the congregation. Ellen expressed gratitude for all involved with the active life of our church. Two typos were noted. Rob Griffin made the motion to accept the Report, and Gary Isham seconded it. The Annual Report was approved.

The 2026 budget was presented by Treasurer Rob Griffin, who explained the higher projected expenses are due to having a settled pastor. It is a goal, therefore, to limit future expenses to just smaller projects in order to focus on getting an accessible lift installed near the Parish Hall. Rob made the motion to accept the budget, and Cheryl Poor seconded it. The budget was accepted as presented. The Council members' slate for 2026 is keeping the members from 2025, however Ellen encouraged anyone to attend Council meetings and get involved. Judy Cookson motioned to accept the Council slate, and Thanna Adams seconded it. The Council slate was approved.


A discussion about communication efforts was held; the weekly email newsletter has been discontinued. The weekly worship bulletin will contain our Prayer List and a basic schedule of events. Urgent messages for the good of the congregation will still be emailed out as needed. The monthly Corner Chronicle newsletter (which is emailed and hard copy mailed) will contain more detailed information, and our website (www.fccbvt.org) is also a source of information.

There needs to be some people to manage the Zoom service in the sanctuary, especially when Nancy Fowler leaves Vermont for the winter months. Nancy shared that Evan Launderville will take the job most Sundays, but there still needs to be others to help fill in when needed.

Gary Isham reported that the church building has new smoke alarms that are combined with carbon detectors; one for the cellar stairs is still needed. Rob Griffin shared that with help from John Carson and his son Scott, the sanctuary's speaker sound system (particularly affecting the Zoom sound) is being improved.

Hearing no further business, the meeting adjourned at 10:45 am after a motion from Rob and a second from Karen Foote.

Our Advent mission drive again this year is to partner with The Green Mountain United Way (GMUW) and Tatum's Totes to provide gifts for 28 children in Vermont's foster care program to receive at Christmas.

- Please visit the Advent Owl wall hanging located in the Narthex to select a child.
 Please feel free to take more than one child if you wish. I should have the tags and Advent Owl ready for Nov 16.
- Write your name next to the child(ren) you choose on the Master List spreadsheet hanging near the Advent Owl. The tag # is the second printed line on the tag (example GMUW#: B1)
- The pocket numbers on the Advent Owl don't necessarily match the number assigned by GMUW. I have used a blue and pink highlighter in the upper left corner of the tags to designate if the tag is for a boy or girl.
- Please don't lose the child's tag, you will need to attach it to the bag that you place the items in in order for GMUW to identify each child's bag of gifts.

- Please also attach a separate piece of paper with the value of the gifts so we can accurately give a total gifts value to GMUW.
- In order to sponsor a child, we are asking that donors provide age-appropriate gifts from the child's interest and needs list on the tag. The Tag we provide will include details about the child's age, gender, interests and needs. Some include favorite color and preferred clothing style.
- PLEASE don't wrap the gifts, instead place
 in gift bags with the Tatum's Totes Gift Tag
 stapled to the outside of the bag. If you
 don't have access to a gift bag you may use a
 different type of bag as long as the items are
 not wrapped and the tag is on the bag.
- All items will need to be dropped off at the church by Sunday December 7, 2025.

When donating by cash or check please clearly mark that it is for Tatum's Totes and who it is from. You may give your monetary donation to Rob or place in the collection basket or mail to FCCB so that the donation can be accounted for.

When donating goods please include a total dollar value. The GMUW gives us a monthly statement with the estimated cash value of all goods received that month.

Candles That Tell a Story



Lighting its candles each Sunday is a treasured tradition during the four weeks of Advent.

Depending on denomination, churches use different color combinations for the candles. Some place four blue candles around the wreath with a white one in the center, while others use all white. Many light purple candles on the first two Sundays, pink on the third, purple again on the fourth, and then a large white candle on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

Each part of the wreath carries symbolic meaning:

- The wreath: Its circular shape represents the everlasting love of God, having no beginning or end. The green symbolizes eternal life.
- The four candles: Mark the four weeks of Advent. One tradition says that each candle also represents 1,000 years, totaling 4,000 years from Adam and Eve to Christ's birth.
- Purple candles: in ancient times, was expensive and was considered the color of royalty and kings. On Christmas, Christ is proclaimed King of Kings. Purple also symbolizes humility and penitence. The first purple candle represents Hope; the second, Peace; and the final purple candle, Love.
- Blue candles: Blue is another color often used as a symbol of royalty. Some churches use blue candles to symbolize the night sky and the anticipation of the announcement of Christ's birth. Blue also symbolizes the beginning of a new creation as in the waters of Genesis 1.
- The pink candle: Lit on the third Sunday, it represents Joy and marks the halfway point of Advent.
- The white candle: The large white candle in the center is the Christ candle. Its light symbolizes Christ the Savior "the light of the world."

The beauty and brightness from the glow of all five candles is a reminder that Christ's life was the light for all earth's people — "The light shines in the

darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it" (John 1:5, NRSV).

The Advent wreath is more than just greenery and candles—it's a symbol of watchfulness and growing joy as Christmas draws near.

Dear Lord,

You have brought us to Christmastime once more. Help us not to get lost in the glitter and the glow, but to see the true glory of the birth of Your only begotten Son.
