Corner Chronicle for June 2025

An Inclusive, Open & Affirming Church



As most of you know I was away all winter enjoying the beauty of the ocean and the slightly warmer temperatures of the Virgin Islands. I looked forward to each Sunday morning as I signed onto Zoom to do the soundcheck with Rob and the choir. As we know Zoom is not the same as being there in person but I loved seeing and knowing my church community is there on Sunday morning. It is still an important ministry to those who cannot get into the church.

As we left the island in mid-April we had an exciting three week adventure ahead of us with some friends visiting Greece, Turkey and the Lake District of England and finally the Isle of Man. I am sure I will reference something about these travels in a future sermon, but I wanted to share about one of the more spiritual experiences I had in Istanbul, Turkey.

I did not know much about the Muslim religion before arriving in this huge city. I awoke the first morning at 5:00 am to a loud, chanting type sound I had never heard and soon learned it was the predawn call to prayer coming from one minarets nearby. (it took me several days to get this word clear in my mind as I kept calling in a minuet). A minaret is a tall spire-like tower attached to a mosque. Some mosques have one and some have more, as in the Blue Mosque, which has six. I will share about the mosque another time. The call to prayer is also called adhan meaning "to listen." This happens five times in a day; at pre-dawn, noon, midday, sunset and night. A practicing Muslim must also wash their hands and feet before entering the mosque in an outside water trough. It all was so interesting and each time I heard a minaret, I did

pause and give thanks to God for all that I had at the moment. Listening to God can happen anytime but the sound from the minaret helps with the intention to listen for God. It made me reflect on how we as Christians could use a reminder to pray. June 8 is Pentecost Sunday where we are called to begin listening for the voice of God through the Holy Spirit and celebrate the birthday of the Christian church. Maybe this Pentecost can help remind us to pause and pray more often.

The call to the adhan prayer is translated as this;

The English translation of the adhan is:

God is Great! God is Great! God is Great! God is Great!

I bear witness that there is no god except the One God.

I bear witness that Muhammad is the messenger of God.

I bear witness that Muhammad is the messenger of God.

Hurry to the prayer. Hurry to the prayer.

Hurry to salvation. Hurry to salvation.

God is Great! God is Great!

There is no god except the One God.

For the pre-dawn (fajr) prayer, the following phrase is inserted before the final repetition of Allahu Akbar (God is Great): Prayer is better than sleep. Prayer is better than sleep.

From the Treasurer

We continue to be in a very strong financial position, with no debt and greater income than expenses.

- Ordinary income: Our total income as of May 16, 2025 year-to-date is \$37,380. However, this total income includes \$6,525 in donations and matching grant to the Building Fund. So our ordinary income year-to-date is \$29,254. This is comparable to our ordinary income at this time in 2024 of \$30,939 (that is, total income of \$31,939 minus Building Fund income of \$1,000).
- Ordinary expense: Our total expense as of May 16, 2025 is \$31,103. However, this includes \$307 in interest on our Cornerstone Fund loan paid in January and the first half of February, and \$1,542 in one-time building expenses (basement cleaning, parish hall storage). So our ordinary expense year-todate is **\$29,254**. This is significantly less than our ordinary expense of \$32,761 at this time in 2024 (\$34,039 in total expense minus \$1,278 in loan interest). The lower expense in 2025 year-to-date is largely due a decrease of \$5,552 in ministry expenses in 2025 year-to-date compared to 2024 year-todate (substitute ministry expense of \$5,106 in 2025 versus total ministry expense of \$910,658 in 2024, including settled pastor and substitute ministry).

Our net total income year-to-date is \$6,277. Our net ordinary income year-to-date is **\$1,849**. We currently have total assets (excluding building, property, etc) of **\$36,388**, including Primary Checking of \$8,569, Building Fund of \$1,251 and Vanguard portfolio of (as of March 31, 2025 \$26,559. Our positive cash flow is enabling us to move toward the \$45,515 in assets we had at the end of 2024, before we paid back \$15,000 on our Cornerstone Fund loan.

The value of our Vanguard portfolio decreased by \$834 in Q1, excluding the \$15,000 withdrawal to repay the Cornerstone Fund loan. We had dividends of \$118 in Q1, but the value of the portfolio decreased by \$952. Given the volatility of the market, we are not making any changes to the portfolio at this time.
