PEEL 4X4 CLUB BYLAWS

- 1. The trip leader will delegate the position of Safety/Recovery officer to another member prior to trip departure.
- 2.All members and visitors are to follow the Safety Officer's instructions at all times
- 3. No pets allowed on club trips.
- 4. Each club member is to be responsible for the safety and whereabouts of their own children.
- 5. Trip Leader responsibilities and Tail End Charlie role to be read out before each trip.
- 6.After 2 trips you must have adequate front and rear recovery points fitted to your vehicle and must have a UHF CB radio.
- 7. Vehicles without adequate front and rear recovery points are limited to scenic/social and easy rated trips.
- 8.All trips are to be rated scenic/social; easy; medium; hard and extreme. Visitors are not permitted on hard and extreme trip. Membership of the WA4Wd Assoc is required for attendance on hard and extreme trips.
- 9 Proceeds from fundraising will be used for club purposes.
- 10.A limit of 15 vehicles per trip will apply. Trip leader has the discretion to increase or decrease this number.
- 11. First in best-dressed, if in excess of 15 vehicles wish to attend a trip, based on prior confirmation.
- 12.Club bank account to hold a minimum of \$1000 balance. A portion of this amount may be used to purchase urgent items at the committee's discretion.
- 13. Whilst every care is taken, no responsibility is accepted.
- 14. Visitors must attend at least 2 trips, rated easy and/or medium, to qualify for membership. Scenic/social trips will not be counted.

PEEL 4X4 CODE OF ETHICS

- 1. Keep to the laws and regulations for 4wd vehicles. They may change from state to state.
- 2.All vehicles must have either comprehensive or third party fire and theft insurance.
- 3. Keep the environment clean. Carry your own and, maybe, other people's rubbish home.
- 4. Obey restrictions on use of public lands. Respect national parks and other conservation areas.
- 5.Obtain permission before driving on private land. Leave livestock alone and gates as
- 6. Keep your vehicle mechanically sound.
- 7. Take adequate water, food, fuel and spares on trips. In remote areas travel with another vehicle.
- 8. Respect our wild life. Stop and look but never disturb or chase animals.
- 9. Respect other recreationalists rights to peace and solitude in the bush.
- 10. Obey all fire restrictions. Extinguish your fire before leaving. Don't let your exhaust emit sparks.
- 11. Help in bushfire emergences and search and rescue but only if you are properly equipped and able.
- 12. Support 4WD touring as a responsible and legitimate recreational activity.
- 13. All members should behave in a socially acceptable manner at all times.

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PEEL 4X4 CLUB TRIP RATINGS



SCENIC / SOCIAL: Sealed roads & some good unsealed roads or tracks.

Road tyres are acceptable.

No 4WD experience required.

EASY: Unsealed roads or tracks. Expect some corrugations.

Road tyres are acceptable. Little or no 4WD experience required.

Front & rear recovery points at the Trip Leaders discretion.

MEDIUM: Off road tracks, with some obstacles expected (rocks, ruts, mud, etc...).

All Terrain tyres are preferred.

Low range may be required, with a snatch strap recovery possible.

Front & rear recovery points are required, along with basic recovery gear.

Tracks may be a little bit scratchy.

HARD: Steep terrain and / or rutted tracks.

All terrain tyres are acceptable; however mud tyres are preferred. Road tyres are not acceptable.

Snatch strap and / or winch recovery may be required.

Front & rear recovery points are required, along with basic recovery gear.

A winch & full recovery gear is preferred.

Some scratches to panel should be expected.

EXTREME: Very steep, deeply rutted tracks or rock hopping will be encountered.

Mud terrain tyres are essential, with appropriate driver training preferred.

Adequate front & rear recovery points, and full recovery gear required.

Winching will be expected, and a winch is compulsory on all vehicles.

Expect scratches to body work, along with panel damage.

Basic Recovery Gear: Snatch strap, 2x rated shackles, and gloves.

Full Recovery Gear: Snatch strap, rated shackles & gloves, tree trunk protector, winch extension.

PLEASE NOTE

Whilst every attempt will be made to accurately describe & classify all trips, weather & other conditions can alter a trip significantly.

The Trip Leader may alter the trip classification at any time, depending on the prevailing weather conditions.

Please confirm your attendance by contacting the Trip Leader a few days prior to the trip. This also gives them the opportunity to advise you of any last minute changes.

Vehicles without adequate front & rear recovery points are limited to Social / Scenic & Easy rated trips.

Visitors are always welcome on Scenic / Social, Easy & Medium rated trips.

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CONVOY PROCEDURES

- 1. Trip leader is to call a group meeting prior to start and remind members of convoy procedure.
- 2. Leader is to appoint a tail end Charlie and safety officer for each trip.
- 3. Observe road rules at all times.
- 4. Leader to appoint a trip reporter.
- 5. All drivers are responsible for their passengers at all times.
- 6. All vehicles are responsible for the following vehicle when turning off the road and at cross roads.
- 7. Vehicles leaving convoy for any reason wave on the remainder of the convoy and inform the Tail End Charlie of their intentions.
- 8. Keep a safe distance behind the vehicle in front of you. Drive within braking distance especially when wet.
- 9. When off road allow the vehicle in front of you to get over the crest of a hill before you attempt to follow. Wait for the all clear.
- 10. No vehicle is to pass the trip leader unless directed or in an emergency.
- 11. Drive with headlights on at all times. Daylight run lamps are not sufficient as tail lights are required to be on to aid visibility
- 12. All cars to maintain position/order in convoy at all times.
- 13. Collect magnetic numbers at designated point of dispersal.

TAIL END CHARLIE RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Assists trip leader with convoy as directed.
- 2. Advises when Convoy is mobile

Change in direction is completed

Member leaves convoy

- Stays with a vehicle that may leave the convoy for a short stop. Advises trip leader when mobile again.
- Closes gates etc if advised by trip leader.
- 5. Ensures cleanliness of area at all stops before leaving.

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TIPS TO BECOMING A TRIP LEADER

- 1. A Trip: If there is somewhere you would like to go and would also like to drag the club along with you, why not approach the trip coordinator or another club member and discuss your ideas. Failing that, choose a trip from the club's varied range of notes and maps available.
- 2. What Experience Must I Have? This depends largely on the grade of trip (scenic/social, easy. Medium, hard, extreme) and area you wish to conduct you trip in. As a rule of thumb, if you, the trip leader feel confident in your abilities, yet realize your limitations, you're in.
- 3. Should I Have An Assistant? YES. An assistant is invaluable in helping to bridge the gaps in your experience and to help balance the decision making, someone who is experienced in 4WD is a good choice. They would normally fill the position of tail end Charlie, providing backup from the rear.
- 4. How To Plan A Smooth Trip: Your trip will only run as smoothly as you plan it. Your pre trip briefing should include convoy procedures, identify tail end Charlie, safety officer, allocation of magnetic numbers, give brief description of what the group may encounter, (the element of surprise doesn't enhance the element of a good trip) and any safety tips eg use of flag.
- 5. Flexibility: At some stage during your trip, things may go wrong such as running behind time, countless recoveries, trapped or lost. Don't despair, things are never as bad as they seem. Don't be afraid to come forward and consult with the group as they are in it just as much as what you are. Pool your ideas and something always comes of it. Flexibility is the key, never be afraid to change your plan.
- 6. How To Get Started: Formulate your intention on paper where you want to go, time and date and any special features of land marks you wish to include. See the trip coordinator who can help out with maps and advice or give you the name of someone who has been there before. You may also need to contact relevant authorities', eg DBCA, caravan parks, road conditions and property owners for further information. The trip coordinator will place your trip on the calendar and organize a sheet to go out at the meeting.
- 7. What's The Hardest Task? Giving It A Go!!: con, bribe, coerce or draw straws to pick some unfortunate soul to write up a trip report for the magazine (definitely the hardest part). So when you reflect back on your trip your hearsay adventures and yourself, umpteen grueling hours up to your neck in mud and leeches, grueling hours of gut wrenching recoveries and those dribble sessions around a campfire. A trip report ending in the words, "Good time had by all" is well worth giving trip leader a go.

NOTE - If you have ever been a trip leader, you will know how frustrating it is when people put their name on the trip sheet then don't turn up! If you put your name down to go on a trip make note of it and if you are unable to attend for any reason (or no reason at all) let the trip leader know so they are not waiting for you. Be punctual too as you being late can cause frustration when we have to meet up with other people along the way or set tour times! If you are running late phone the trip leader.

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

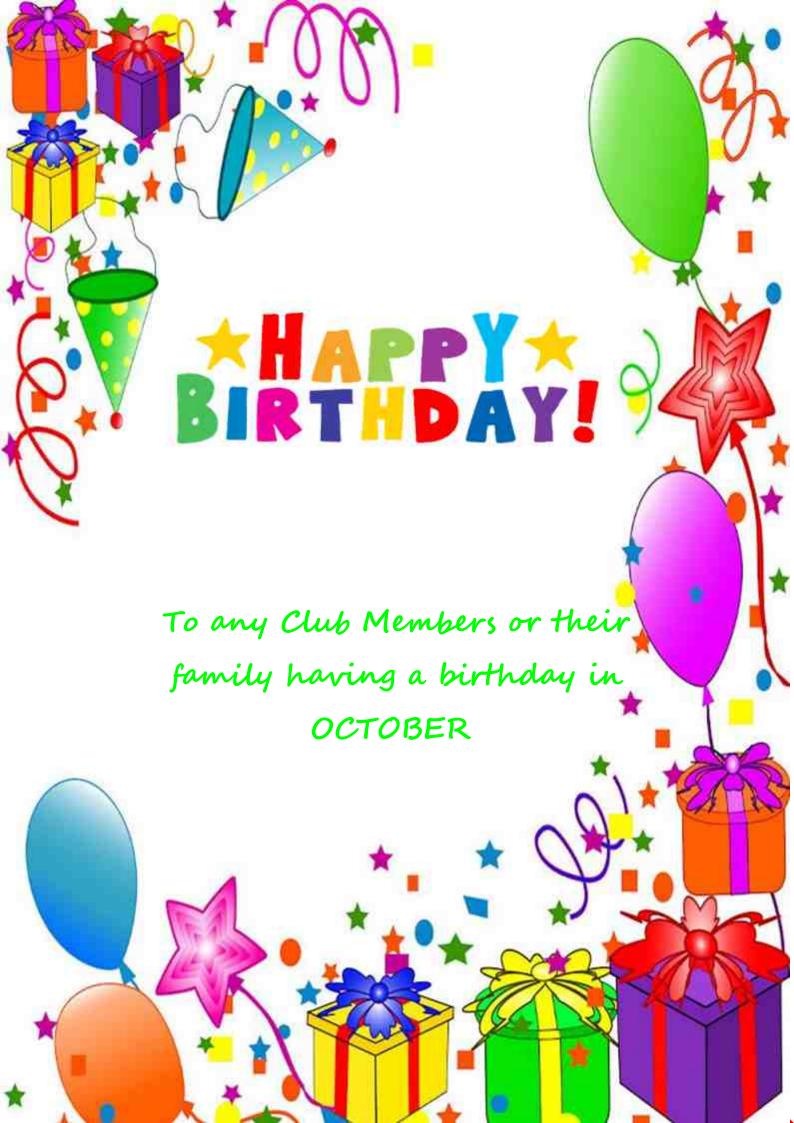

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

Hi Brian:- Myself and Garry Raffaele did some testing on an UNRATED TEMU soft shackle with some amazing results. Don't know if its worth putting in magazine but your opinion after reading this would be appreciated as there will be a few negative comments on how we tested this item.(safety etc).I saw these on TEMU for A\$8.00 ea . I thought got to try them out to see when they fail.

Test 1:- We used chain and soft shackle to pull 10 tons of truck with brakes locked on. On a gravel driveway. Dragged it No problem.

Test 2:- We loaded 6 ton of sand in the truck (Now 16ton) and did same test. Chain broke. Shackle OK.

Test 3:- Used a heavier duty chain and dragged on gravel 16ton truck with brakes locked on . No problem.

Test 4: Did a snatch of 16 Ton truck .No problem.

We couldn't break this shackle . Not every thing is rubbish from China. However I must remind anyone using these THEY ARE NOT RATED.

Tyre-Pressure-Guide

One of the simplest – and most important – things you can do to keep your tyres in good shape is to make sure that they are correctly inflated. Failure to maintain correct tyre pressures may result in fast and uneven treadwear, improper vehicle handling, and excessive heat build-up, resulting in tyre failure.



REGULAR TYRE PRESSURE CHECKS

You should check your tyre's pressure at least once a month, before each trip, and each morning you drive during a trip. Ideally, tyre pressure should be measured when tyres are cold, that is, before doing any driving on tyres. Only "bleed" or reduce air pressure from a hot tyre when you need to lower pressures to drive on particular terrain but remember to re-inflate your tyres when you reach your destination or return to terrain that requires higher pressure.

MEASURING TYRE PRESSURE

It's essential to be accurate when inflating your tyres. Don't try to "eyeball" the pressure – a tyre can lose half its pressure without looking flat. Instead, use a reliable tyre pressure gauge. It's a good idea to have your own gauge.

UNDER-INFLATION

If your vehicle's tyres are under-inflated by as little as 6 psi, it could lead to tyre damage. Additionally, the tyre's tread life could be reduced significantly with tyres wearing more on the outside shoulders. Lower inflation pressure allows the tyre to flex more as it rolls, causing internal heat to build up, which could lead to tyre failure. Also, low pressures increase rolling resistance and cause a reduction in fuel economy. You would also find a significant loss of steering precision and cornering stability. While 6 psi doesn't seem excessively low, remember, it usually represents about 20% of the tyre's recommended pressure. You should also be aware that the load capacity of your tyres is reduced at lower pressures.

OVER-INFLATION

If your tyres are over-inflated by as little as 6 psi, they could be damaged more easily when driving over potholes or debris on the road. Overinflation also causes tyres to wear in the centre of the tyre's tread, which will reduce the tread life; higher inflated tyres will also give you a much harsher ride.

IMPORTANT FACTORS WHEN SELECTING TYRE PRESSURES

There is no universal "right" pressure for all tyres. The proper inflation level is dependent on many factors such as what tyres you have, type of vehicle, amount of load, how the vehicle is being driven and condition of the road, to name a few. The important thing to remember is that as load increases, you will need to increase pressure but never exceed the maximum pressure stamped on the tyre's sidewall. For harsher road surfaces, a lower pressure with lower speed may be needed to avoid tyre damage. This could mean the difference between an empty tray in a UTE vs. a loaded tray.

WEAR PATTERNS OF AN UNDER-INFLATED, PROPERLY INFLATED AND OVER-INFLATED TYRE

THE 4 PSI RULE APPLIES TO BITUMEN ROAD USE ONLY

As a rule, the following can be used (for road use only): For passenger tyres, inflate your cold tyres to the recommended tyre pressure on your vehicle's tyre placard*. Then to determine if you have the correct pressure for your current load, note down the cold tyre pressure reading. Drive for at least 20-30 minutes to ensure they have reached operating temperature and check again. Ideally, they should be 4psi above the cold pressure. For Light Truck and 4×4 tyres, use 6psi as a guide, but rough and corrugated roads cause more flexing, and your tyres may rise more than 4 or 6psi. In which case, applying this "rule" is not recommended.

*Beware of vehicle placards with recommendations below 30psi. Some older vehicles may still

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have lower pressures on the placard, which were used to "enhance" ride but resulted in poor tyre life and, in some circumstances, are dangerous.

EFFECT OF ADJUSTING TYRE PRESSURES ON THE SIZE OF A TYRE'S FOOTPRINT This diagram illustrates the effect of reducing your tyre pressures on the size of the footprint of your tyres. Reducing pressures and increasing the size of your tyre's footprint spreads the weight of your vehicle over a larger area, so when driving on sand, for example, your tyres will drive 'over the top' of the sand. If you maintain high pressures and a small footprint, your tyres are more likely to 'dig down' into the sand and even get you stuck. Reducing the pressure and increasing the size of your tyre's footprint also increases traction in off-road conditions. Remember, whenever you lower your tyre pressure, re-inflate to the proper levels as soon as you drive back onto the bitumen or increase speed.

PSI-Guide

PRECAUTIONARY NOTICE:

*DISCLAIMER: This is a guide based on an average range of sizes, NOT a specific size or tyre. Narrow commercial-style tyres require higher pressures. You must consult your specific vehicle's weight and tyre size. Lowering pressures may be necessary to get your vehicle through an extreme section of terrain or reduce tyre damage in off-road conditions. However, lowering tyre pressures below the manufacturer's recommended pressure for your vehicle is at your own risk and judgement. Doing so could cause overheating and long-term tyre damage. So, you must drive slowly over obstacles and re-inflate your tyres to proper levels once your vehicle is returned to normal applications and conditions. All pressures are suggested for light truck construction tyres only and should not be advised to anyone driving on passenger construction tyres. Consult the manufacturer for recommended tyre pressures relevant to that brand.

BITUMEN 32-38 PSI*

For standard size tyres, use pressures specified on your vehicle's placard. Higher pressures will be required when carrying heavy loads.

SAND 18-26 PSI*

This depends on the depth and coarseness of the sand and the grade. Lower pressure increases the size of your tyre's footprint, increasing its ability to stay on top of the sand instead of digging in, or its flotation characteristics. You want enough momentum to stay on top. Higher pressures will be required when carrying heavy loads. Sudden or heavy movements of the steering can be dangerous and speed needs to be appropriately reduced depending on the depth of the sand.

Sand can vary rapidly in patches. Sand can also build up a lot of heat in your tyres because you are running lower pressures for flotation and because of friction and wheel spin. So, you may need to rest your vehicle regularly. Out of all terrains and applications, sand creates the most constant resistance to tyres, gearboxes and motors.

TYRE PRESSURE GUIDE FOR DIFFERENT TERRAINS

FAST / SMOOTH GRAVEL 28-32 PSI*

If your tyre pressure is too low on this surface, you'll lose steering response and stability, especially if you are driving fast. Higher pressures will be required when carrying heavy loads; when driving over corrugated roads, you should reduce your speed as heat builds up quickly on these roads.

SLOW / ROUGH GRAVEL 24-28 PSI*

This depends on how slow, how rough and with what load. Keep in mind that the higher the speed, the more heat generated in the tyre according to your load and terrain being covered. High temperature in the belts of the tyre is not something you can always feel by hand either. Higher pressures will be required when carrying heavy loads.

TYRE PRESSURE GUIDE FOR DIFFERENT TERRAINS

ROCKY GRAVEL / ROCKS 20-26 PSI*

This is assuming that the going is very slow, driving in low range, and not generating a lot of heat in the tyre to improve its traction and flexibility over the obstacles without damaging the tyre. Higher pressures can be used, but the trade-off is more wheel spin and less grip. Very low pressures, around 18 psi and below, can create the risk of pushing the tyre off the bead of the rim and therefore, 20 psi is generally an acceptable minimum low-pressure limit for most sizes. Higher pressures will be required when carrying heavy loads.

Malleability or flexibility at low speed is what you want to achieve and improve traction without spinning your tyres and often shredding or chipping the tyres. Lowering tyre pressures will increase the size of your tyre's footprint, which spreads longitudinally along the tyre, which is what you are trying to achieve for maximum traction.

Ever noticed how easy a balloon pops at higher pressures when it hits something, but when the balloon has low pressures, it's harder to damage or pop? Same with tyres on rocks in most slow situations. Sidewall damage can be reduced by careful wheel placement, reducing your speed, and having the right tyre pressure.

TYRE PRESSURE GUIDE FOR DIFFERENT TERRAINS MUD 22-28 PSI*


This depends on what sort of mud, the steepness of the slope and what sort of base you have under the mud. You may not even need to lower your pressures. If it's thick mud, with a loose, deep base, lower pressures and less wheel spin is best, but you will need to maintain momentum. If the mud is watery and has a solid base, you can maintain momentum but never drive fast as you can lose control of the steering, damage engine components and the environment. Mud is the medium where you want enough momentum while maintaining traction without losing steering control and causing minimal damage to the track for others behind you or in the future.





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

STRAIGHT LINE DIAGRAMS AND ROUTE MAPS

What is a straight line diagram?

The diagram is an indicative straight line of a green route and provides travellers with another tool for trip planning. The main features are the easier to read distances from the origin and the road names at each turn off.

What is a route map?

The route map identifies a single main route that leads directly to towns and localities in Western Australia, providing distances along the route at intersecting roads. In most cases these roads are constructed to a higher standard and are maintained by Main Roads Western Australia, meaning that travel on these routes can be completed at a higher safe travel speed.

Start and end of displayed route

- PERTH Route origin: Start point for all displayed routes
- AUGUSTA Route destination: End point for shown route on associated map

Local Government centres, towns and localities

- MANDURAH Local Government (LG) centre access via shown route: Route displayed by green line
- Armadale Other LG centre
- Other town/minor town/locality/roadhouse


Boxed distances




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


IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA - REGIONAL AREAS

A route numbering system has been established within Western Australia to simplify navigation for drivers in both urban and country areas and to aid tourists in search of particular scenic routes.

This comprehensive state route system consists of both Metropolitan and inter-regional routes. The existing National system has been upgraded, and existing National Highways connecting Perth with the Eastern States now have their own route marker to distinguish them from National scenic or historic interest routes.

Each route type has a unique number and is identified by distinctive markers placed on existing direction signs or on steel posts strategically placed along the route as a guide to motorists.



DRIVER AND GENERAL INFORMATION

Rest areas in Western Australia

Driving while fatigued is a major cause of more than 30% of all crashes. When taking a long trip it is important to plan ahead to ensure that you arrive safely without pushing yourself or your family.

Do not drive tired

Main Roads produces a guide listing rest areas and amenities available in WA. This guide, used in conjunction with the Distance Book, enables drivers to plan their breaks effectively to help reduce fatigue. (N.B. Rest areas ARE NOT intended for camping. Overnight stays are only permitted at clearly marked stops).

Rest area brochures are available from any Main Roads office or online. See "Online References" page 62 of this book.

Stop, revive, survive

General travel tips

- Allow enough time for breaks in your journey, plan your stops and rest. Take a ten minute break every two hours and a longer break every four hours.
- Start early in the day when you are well rested and get plenty of sleep before you set off.
- Avoid driving in the very early hours of the morning when you would normally be asleep.
- · Avoid consumption of alcohol before and during the trip.
- Stop if you feel tired. Watch out for symptoms like boredom, restlessness, aches and pains, sore eyes or drowsiness.

Have a safe journey!

FREE coffee for driver

Free coffee for driver is a road safety initiative involving over 100 roadhouses across Western Australia. Stop at your nearest roadhouse displaying a sign and let the driver of the vehicle have a break and free coffee or tea. This service is donated by each roadhouse to help you and your passengers reach your destination alive and well. This invitation is extended to drivers who are on a long journey of two hours of more. There is a limit of one cup per vehicle per stop.

Avoid fatigue

Roads with permits

Travelling on roads such as the Great Central Road and some forestry roads require permits. Roads with permits are often patrolled and fines may result if visitors have not obtained a permit. Permits are essential for travel on Aboriginal lands in Western Australia. When travelling through Aboriginal lands it is prohibited to divert off the main road. Driving on country roads

There are many driving hazards not found in the familiar urban streets most West Australians travel on. Some problems motorist may encounter include fatigue (see left), gravel roads, dust, fog, floods, bushfires and wildlife. Inexperienced country drivers should keep their speed to a sensible level and be wary of how their vehicle can handle unfamiliar terrain. Driving tasks such as cornering and overtaking can be much more hazardous on country roads.

Gravel roads

The instability caused by rough surfaces and the longer stopping distances are the two main problems associated with driving on gravel roads. Travelling at high speeds on rough gravel surfaces may make your vehicle less stable, increasing the risk of losing control. Breaking distances can increase significantly driving on gravel roads compared to tarmac roads. If you feel you are in trouble, reduce your speed gradually and do not brake suddenly.

Dust

On outback country roads, dust causes visibility issues and is a major problem for drivers judging road conditions and hazards. Also dust raised by other vehicles may effect your visibility, so adjust your speed accordingly and be careful overtaking.

Foo

Fog causes many issues similar to dust. Put your lights on and use your windscreen wipers. Do not use high beam as the light reflects back towards you. If you need to stop, pull off the road and put your hazard lights on.

Floods

Do not cross flood waters without checking carefully first. Use a stick or fence post to judge depth. If a device is not available, walk through the water carefully, if it is safe to do so. If the water depth is above waist level and the current is strong, do not enter the water on foot or in your vehicle. If road is closed by Main Roads do not attempt to cross. Please call 138 138 for the latest road condition reports.

Bushfires

If you are caught in a bushfire, stay in your car, park away from vegetation, close all windows and ventilation systems and turn the vehicle off. Cover yourself and passengers with devices such as blankets and car mats. Get down low under the dashboard or most effectively down low in the back seat of the vehicle. When the fire has passed, leave your vehicle and walk over the burnt ground. For bushfire warning information refer to "Online References" page 62 of this book.

Wildlife

Impacts with wildlife such as kangaroos and stray cattle can cause serious physical injury and damage to your vehicle. Avoid driving between dusk and early morning and please report all crashes. To assist with injured or sick animals, call Wildcare helpline on 9474 9055.

DISTANCES FROM PERTH C.B.D.





DISTANCES BETWEEN CAPITAL CITIES IN AUSTRALIA



A vehicle that alone or together with any load, exceeds a height of 4.3 m is defined as a Restricted Access Vehicle (RAV). A RAV with a height in excess of 4.3 m must operate in accordance with the relevant Class of Notice or Permit issued by Main Roads Western Australia.

The heights listed are the maximum safe clearance and should be used to plan the journey.

Bridges over the Freeways are not included in this list as the Freeways are not available for general use by overheight vehicles or loads.


LOCATIONS AND ABBREVIATIONS

To assist the road users and improve safety many varied types of road signs are used. One common and important sign erected on the principal road network is a distance marker also known as the focal point marker.

These markers consist of a plate fixed to a steel post 1.5 metres high with a reflectorised letter or letters plus numerals marked on the plate. The letters indicate a town or locality at the end of a set section of road and the numerals the distance ahead to it from that point. For example A 50 - Albany 50 km or


PH 180 - Port Hedland 180 km.

Towns and localities across the state selected as focal points are shown on the accompanying map and list of names and abbreviations.



LEGEND

- Indicates routes taken in distance book
- Start and end of route taken
- Town / locality along route taken



Focal points generally occur at the larger centres or at roadhouses or well known features along roads in remote localities. Sections vary in length from about 30 km in settled districts to as much as 400 km in pastoral areas.

Intervals between posts are either 5 or 10 km with spacing determined by the nature of country being travelled/crossed.

Focal Point Markers are placed on the left side of the road and read in the direction of travel. For example between Perth and Northam eastbound traffic approaching Northam will read diminishing distance indicators showing 30, 25, 20 etc. kilometres remaining. Westbound travellers will see markers showing the distance to Perth.



Distances between remote towns can be vast and in some cases conditions can be very hot and dry with limited fuel, water and food available.

We want you to enjoy your journey but more importantly we want you to stay safe.

Look out for warning signs and make sure you know what to do if you feel fatigued.

Early danger signs of fatigue include:

- · Wandering or disconnected thoughts
- Missing a gear, road sign or exit
- Slowing unintentionally
- Braking too late

- Are yawning
- Are blinking more than usual
- Are having trouble keeping your head up
- Notice your eyes closing for a moment or going out of
- Forget driving the last few kilometres

Improvised Repairs to Wheeled Vehicles in the Field

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THESE HINTS ARE EMERGENCY MEASURES AND WILL ONLY BE ADOPTED ON OCCASIONS OF EMERGENCY IN THE FIELD

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FOREWORD

The notes contained in this pamphlet describe emergency measures which may be taken by drivers in the event of breakdown of their vehicles in the field.

These are temporary expedients to keep vehicles on the road until such time as proper technical assistance can be obtained.

These measures will only be adopted in emergency and not during training in the United Kingdom.

They should be considered in the same light as the following simile:

If a man breaks a blood-vessel, you apply a tourniquet as a temporary expedient. If you left it there for long, the limb would-atrophy, so at the earliest possible moment you get the patient to a doctor, who gives the correct expert treatment.

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IMPROVISED REPAIRS TO WHEELED VEHICLES IN THE FIELD, 1943.

1. THE ENGINE PROPER.

(a) Big-End Failure.

(i) If knock is slight.

REMEDY. Remove Sparking Plug in case of petrol engine and earth H.T. of plug. In case of Diesel Engines remove injector and bend injection pipe to discharge fuel oil into a container suitably placed. Ensure that oil in sump is at correct level. Drive on carefully, pressure on particular piston now reduced.

(ii) Complete Failure of Bearing.

REMEDY. Drain engine oil into clean receptacle, remove sump, taking care not to damage sump gasket. Remove connecting rod and piston and seal the oil drilling on crank pin journal by means of a Jubilee clip and small piece of jointing, as fitted to Radiator hose. Alternatively fit a wooden plug with outer end slotted to take wire binding. This step will ensure maintenance of oil pressure. Re-fit sump with gasket, refill with oil to correct level and proceed carefully to destination, keeping engine revs. to a minimum because of "out of balance forces".

Note. If clip has been removed from Radiator hose, bind hose tightly with cord or wire.

(b) Engine Sump.

(i) Slight damage to sump through shot hole or striking by rocks.

REMEDY. Plug hole with wood and/or cloth, turn engine over by hand to ensure that bigends are clear of plug. Check oil level in sump.

(c) Valves.

(i) Petrol engine — Sticking Valves.

REMEDY. Disconnect air cleaner and inject some fuel oil or engine lubrication oil into the carburettor intake, or, remove valve covers, speed up engine in excess of idling speed, and spray valve stems and guides with a mixture of petrol and lubricating oil.

(ii) Diesel Engine — Sticking Valves.

REMEDY. Turn engine over slowly by hand and apply fuel oil to valve stem. The piston will close the valve and the rocker will open it. A few slow turns of engine will indicate if the valve can be made to work. Further, examine valve spring and if valve is sticking owing to broken or weak spring, a separate spring can often be tied on overhead to assist closing of valve and enable cylinder to function efficiently.

NOTE. A stuck open valve would probably result in serious damage to cylinder components. Remedy. Action as in 1 (a) (ii) and remove injector as I (a) (i).

(iii) Valve springs broken.

REMEDY. Remove broken spring and replace with flat ends together. Shortening of spring can be compensated by inserting suitable size plain washer between flat ends. The valve must then be held on to its seat in order to compress spring and insert washer. Method adopted will depend upon type of engine. Generally speaking, a screwdriver or flat bar inserted through plug hole will enable job to be done.

(d) Gaskets, Cutting of.

(i) Inlet or exhaust manifolds.

REMEDY. Smear manifold flange with oil or paint, place jointing over flange and press firmly. Remove jointing and cut away portions not required with scissors or sharp knife.

(ii) Thin Gaskets for any flanges.

METHOD. Press jointing firmly on to a surface to make good impression. Cut away material not required by light taps with hand hammer. Note. Check to ensure that finished joint will not blank off essential openings.

2. LUBRICATION SYSTEM.

(a) Oil Filter.

(i) Outer casing damaged.

REMEDY. By-pass the oil filter from circuit by connecting the filter inlet pipe to the outlet pipe by means of rubber tubing. Bind well with cord or wire. Observe the oil pressure at frequent intervals.

REMEDY. If slight fracture bind with cloth and wire. If fractured, close up pipe end on engine side of fracture by hammering or squeezing in order to seal lubrication system; pressure gauge will now be out of action. Check effectiveness of repair with engine running. Check sump oil level (wet sump system) and oil container level (dry sump system) at frequent intervals.

3. COOLING SYSTEM.

(a) Fan belt.

(i) Clean break.

REPAIR. Drill or pierce a series of staggered holes on either side of break. Lace together



neatly with ends butting by means of thick copper wire or leather bootlace. Refit belt and leave as slack as possible.

(ii) Temporary fan belt.

Use a leather strap. Overlap ends to correct circumference and lace up with copper wire or leather bootlace, or, use an oversize belt, cut out length to leave suitable overlap, which should consist of flat scarf. Drill or pierce holes in scarf and wire up, or, carefully splice a piece of suitable rope to correct length and refit.

(b) Fan.

(i) Blade broken.

REMEDY. Remove damaged and opposite blades to maintain balance.

(c) Radiator.

- (i) Shot through radiator header or bottom tank.
 REMEDY. Plug with wood and cloth.
- (ii) Small radiator leaks.

REMEDY. A handful of fine sawdust put inside radiator will block openings due to expansion. If at hand, pea flour or pea soup boiled up in radiator will exude through small cracks and harden up for an effective repair. Chewing gum applied externally as necessary will make a good temporary repair. Soap should only be applied as a last resort as it makes the ultimate repair a difficult job.

(iii) Shot through Honeycomb Radiator.

REMEDY. Cut two pieces of inner tube and two-pieces of board to suitable sizes. Place over damaged portion, boards inside and out, with rubber next to the radiator and secure with bolt and nut.

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- (iv) Damaged Tubular Radiator.

 REMEDY. Cut out damaged portion and either close open ends of tubes with suitably shaped wooden plugs or close ends of tubes by means of pliers.
- (v) Radiator hose, damaged.

 REMEDY. Bind with canvas or cloth strips.

 Secure with tight wrapping of cord or wire.

 Again bind over if necessary to make effective repair.
- (d) Defective circulation of water-due to:-
 - (i) Insufficient water (leakages in system).
 - (ii) No forced circulation of water due to pump not working (broken pump spindle or faulty fan belt drive.)
 - (iii) Ineffective cooling of water (defective fan).

 REMEDY. Proceed slowly until temperature gauge reads high, stop vehicle, switch off engine and allow to cool opening bonnet to expedite this. After cooling, top up with water as necessary and repeat procedure.

 NOTE. If pump impeller is removed and spindle glands sealed to prevent water leakage, the thermosyphonic action is improved.
- (e) Thermostat.

Faulty action resulting in restriction of water flow.

REMEDY. If possible remove complete thermostat, if not possible to remove, enlarge the circulation hole in its flange to increase quantity or flow.

4. PETROL SYSTEMS

Defective fuel supply to engine may be due to:-

(a) Loss of petrol due to damage to component parts.



REMEDY. Small leaks can often be sealed with chewing gum applied over damaged portion. Soap softened by kneading and then forced into cracks and small holes will effect a temporary repair. Larger holes require suitably shaped wooden plugs.

(ii) Damaged Petrol Pipes.

REMEDY. For cracks wrap pipe with rag and bind tightly with insulation tape, cord or wire. If pipe is fractured badly, kinked or flattened, cut out defective piece with hacksaw or file and slip short length of suitable rubber tubing from windscreen wiper unit or tyre pump hose over butted ends and bind them tightly with wire. Grease or soap applied to outside ends of rubber tube will assist in sealing.

(b) Stoppage of petrol due to dirt in system.

(i) Choked petrol pipe.

REMEDY. If petrol pipe is to the tank, break convenient union and blow back into the tank using tyre pump if possible. If pipe length can be disconnected and above method applied, the dirt can be removed from the system.

(ii) Blocked petrol Tap.
REMEDY. Remove tap and remove obstruction.

(iii) Choked air vent on autovac.
REMEDY. Remove and clear obstruction.

- (iv) Stoppage of petrol due to dirt in filter.

 REMEDY. Dismantle, flush out body and clean filter gauze.
- (v) Choked Carburettor.

 REMEDY. Remove jet and apply air pressure to clear. Do not use needles or wire to clear small orifices.
- (c) Stoppage of petrol due to defective components.



(i) Autovac—Damage to top portion.

REMEDY. Remove and maintain requisite level by pouring in petrol as required.

(ii) Sticking valve linkage.

REMEDY. A light slap by hand on the outer casing often proves effective in freeing.

(iii) Petrol pump.

NOTE. Before disconnecting and dismantling, ensure that the trouble is not due to faults elsewhere in system.

Filter Choked.

REMEDY. Clean and replace carefully.

Starting up of engine after emptying of petrol system should be effected by means of starting handle if possible.

Complete failure.

REMEDY. If vehicle is fitted with a radiator condenser, remove and affix to convenient place above carb level. Connect condenser outlet to carb, fuel intake (or pipe from petrol pump outlet) by means of a rubber pipe. If no condenser is fitted any suitable can may serve the same purpose of gravity feed to carb.

(iv) Carburettor Float Punctured.

REMEDY. Slightly enlarge the hole and expel petrol. This is helped by immersing in hot water. Insert soft wood plug (match stick) into hole and ensure that projection of plug is a minimum. Alternatively, use small piece of chewing gum.

NOTE. Needle valve may need re-adjustment for correct petrol level.

(v) Broken throttle cable on motor cycle.

REMEDY. Remove air slide, disconnect air control and connect same to throttle slide. The



throttle control will now be operated by the air control lever.

(d) Stoppage of petrol due to air-locks.

- (i) Air-lock between tank and pump.

 REMEDY. Disconnect union at pump inlet and blow air through pipe back to tank. The momentary pressure built up in the tank will soon cause petrol to flow back to pump. Connect union and tighten.
- (ii) Air-lock between pump and carburettor.

 REMEDY. Disconnect union at fuel inlet to carburettor and operate pump by means of priming lever. When petrol flows freely replace union and tighten.

5. IGNITION SYSTEM.

(a) Contact breaker.

- (i) Contact breaker rocker arm spring broken.
 REMEDY. Cut a small block of rubber from a tyre and insert behind the rocker arm.
 Ensure that size of rubber will effect closing of contact points.
- (ii) Rocker arm seized in bush.

 REMEDY. Remove rocker arm by unscrewing spring and forcing same off its pivot. Use screwed end of centre fixing as a reamer. When satisfied that rocker arm is quite free on its fulcrum, reassemble, taking care with refitting of spring. The fibre should be perfectly dry and free from oil.
- (iii) Contact breaker points badly burnt or worn.

 REMEDY. Clean properly and change condenser. Application of lead pencil to surface of points will help to provide a metallic surface.

NOTE. Condensers fitted to prevent radio interference can be used to replace faulty condensers.

(b) Distributor.

- (i) Distributor cap spring clips broken.

 REMEDY. Bind cap securely in position with insulation tape.
- (ii) Carbon brush in distributor broken.

 REMEDY. Shape a brush from tinfoil and insert in position or shape temporary brush from lead pencil stub.

(c) Coil.

(i) Switch failure.

REMEDY. Remove wires from switch, bare the ends and tie together, untie ends to stop engine. Leave untied until the engine is again started, or, if the switch is damaged, connect

started, or, if the switch is damaged, connect a wire direct from battery live terminal to coil terminal marked S.W. This wire must be disconnected to stop engine and to prevent the

battery from discharging.

(ii) Ignition coil connection faulty.

REMEDY. If earth connection and ignition coil body is disconnected or broken, tap a small piece of copper wire into the hole and complete the earth return.

(d) H.T. Leads.

(i) H.T. Leads outside of plugs and distributor cap wet.

REMEDY. Wipe off moisture and then wipe with cloth moistened with petrol. Allow a period of time for the petrol to evaporate and subsequent starting will be facilitated.

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Peel 4x4 Club

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(ii) H.T. Wire broken.

REMEDY. Remove defective wires and replace by copper or steel wire of sufficient diameter, making sure that the wire is kept away from other metal components. Tie in position with string or insulation tape.

(iii) Fuses - failure of.

REMEDY. Before replacing a fuse ascertain the reason for blowing of the fuse and rectify the fault before fitting a new fuse. If a fuse is not available insert a suitably wrapped piece of tinfoil or beat out a single strand of wire to reduce cross-section so that only normal current can pass.

(e) Light springs.

(i) Tension return springs broken.

REMEDY. Bands cut from old inner tubes will make temporary repair, or temporary repair may be effected by joining the broken ends with copper wire.

(ii) Compression springs broken.

REMEDY. When the spring is located by a through rod, insert a suitable washer to maintain compression required. Small springs may be replaced by cellular rubber.

(f) Batteries.

(i) Insufficient electrolyte.

REMEDY. Should the battery require distilled water and this is not available top up with radiator or any water with the exception of salty water.

(ii) Cracked Tops.

REMEDY, Seal the cracks by heating the blade of a knife or screwdriver and using a small portion of the battery as sealing compound.



Discharged State. (iii)

> Tow the vehicle to start and providing the dynamo is charging the engine will continue to function. Alternatively replace by good battery until engine is started.

(g) Starter Motor.

(i) Faulty operation.

> REMEDY. Before again depressing the button turn the engine by hand about 1/4 turn. The pinion may now be in contact with the better part of the flywheel ring and easier engagement ensured. The faulty flywheel should be renewed when possible.

> NOTE. The starter pinion is inclined to jam on the flywheel ring when the starter button is depressed.

Starter Motor Spins Freely and Engine does (ii) not Revolve.

> REMEDY. Wash the thread of the pinion with petrol to free pinion on shalt.

Starter Motor Jammed. (iii)

> REMEDY. If there is a square end on the armature shaft apply spanner and turn armature in correct direction for disengagement of pinion. If there is no square on the armature shaft, loosen the bolts securing the starter motor, engage top gear and rock vehicle backwards and forwards.

> NOTE. Rocking vehicle alone is often sufficient to free the starter motor.

(h) Dynamo not Charging.

REMEDY. Gently press together the cut-out points. Observe the reading on the ammeter. It ammeter shows charge and cut-out points will

act remain closed, the cut-out is faulty. Insert thin wooden wedge or rubber under bridge to keep points closed. Do not idle engine unnecessarily as the battery will be discharged through the closed points. Remove wedge before stopping the engine.

(i) Electrical Leads, Joining of.

When it becomes necessary to make a joint between the broken or frayed ends of an insulated lead, strip away the insulation, expose the core at the ends for a length of at least one inch. Scrape the bare ends clean and twist them together tightly, finally binding with several layers of insulation tape. In the case of twin or triple leads care must be taken to ensure that each joint is well insulated from the other. This is facilitated by staggering the position of joints of each lead. Finally bind around all the leads with sufficient insulation tape. If ends of leads are too short for overlapping insert in the gap a suitable length of copper wire and connect the ends. Cover with insulation tape.

6. WHEELS AND TYRES.


(a) Changing of-Jack missing or ineffective.

REMEDY. Pack up the axle with wood blocks or stones at a suitable position. Dig a hole under the wheel to effect change.

- (b) Repairs to tyres difficult to remove.
 - (i) Repairs to Tube-No patching available.

 REMEDY. Use rubber groundsheet.

No solution available.



(ii) Repairs to Cover-Gaiter Missing.

REMEDY. Cut same from parts of web equipment, e.g. Pack or Haversack and inflate tyre before replacing wheel on vehicle.

(iii) Outer Cover U.S.

REMEDY. Remove inner tube and replace by rolled clothing packed into position as tightly as posible. Proceed at slow speed.

(c) Tyre Interchanging.

A 3 ton 10. 50 x 20 C.A.S. wheel and tyre will also fit a Morris 15 cwt. or 3 ton.

A Morris P.U. wheel and tyre will fit a 40m/m Bofors Carriage.

NOTE. Fit tyres in pairs rather than one only.

7. BRAKES

(a) Hydraulic Brakes-Fluid Pipe Broken.

- (i) REMEDY. Blank off the connection to it from the master cylinder, or close the pipe at the break by pliers or hammer blow.
- (ii) Brakes hard on.

 REMEDY. Bleed oil from Screw or pipe for particular wheel.

(b) Vacuum assisted system - Failure of Booster.

REMEDY. Examine ends of the hose connection. If the hose has perished at end, cut off the defective piece and reconnect to manifold. Test repair by driving car and operating the brakes.

8. SUSPENSION

(a) Springs, Main.

Springs, Main Leaf-Broken.

REMEDY. If possible, improvise a splint from a pick head, tyre lever, crowbar, or spanner, place over broken ends and secure with wire or rope, after first jacking up vehicle at broken spring end to enable repair to be carried out with spring in unloaded position. Place a block of wood between chassis and axle and secure firmly. If the vehicle is fitted with cable brakes disconnect cable of wheel adjacent to broken spring.

9. TRANSMISSION

(a) Live Axles.

(i) 6 wheeled Vehicles-Damaged Axles.

REMEDY. Should the rear axle become unserviceable disconnect the drive to it and withdraw the half shafts to allow the rear wheels to roll. Should the centre axle become unserviceable withdraw the corresponding half shafts.

Live axle—Damaged wheel or tyre which cannot be repaired.

REMEDY. Withdraw the half shafts and both wheels of the axle concerned and lash the axle to the chassis. The removed half shafts should always be wrapped up to prevent damage to the bearing portions.

(ii) 4 Wheeled Vehicles with 4 Wheeled Drive. Rear axle failure.

REMEDY. Remove the rear propeller shaft and engage the front wheel drive. If the failure is attributed to a defective or seized bevel pinion of faulty differential gear, both rear axle half shafts should be removed.

Damaged Rear Axle Casing.

REMEDY. Carry on but periodically sluice the working parts with grease or oil.

(b) Gearbox.

(i) Gearbox Casing Damaged.

REMEDY. Carry on but sluice periodically with oil. Should the gear become jammed, declutch drive, start the engine, engage the clutch and drive away.

(ii) Gearbox Lever Broken Off.

REMEDY. Remove broken piece of lever and use suitable bar to lever third gear into mesh. Adopt same procedure as given for jammed gears in order to drive away.

(c) Clutch Slipping.

REMEDY. First ensure that there is free movement on the clutch pedal, adjusting same as necessary. If trouble persists, depress clutch pedal to free clutch plates and inject fluid from Pyrene Extinguisher into clutch casing between plates.

NOTE. Petrol can be used effectively for the same purpose, but care must be taken to remove drain plug in casing, to remove all traces of petrol before starting engine.

10. STEERING.

(a) Steering Arm Ball Joint Broken.

REMEDY. Insert a suitable bolt in place of ball ended screw and lock with a nut at the bottom.



Finally tighten up ball joint adjusting cap. If the taking up of the adjustment in the ball joint does not eliminate slackness, lash down with cord or wire.

(b) Track Rod Bent.

REMEDY. Remove rod and straighten by use of leverage. Replace and adjust for correct wheel "toe in".





Some of our group arrived on the Friday giving them time to have a good play in the 4x4 park before the rest of us arrived on the Saturday.

The 4x4 park Is quite well set up with varying difficulties to suit all levels of competence (and confidence).


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




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



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




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



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
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Westonia Wildflower Wander
