

# **GENERAL STUFF**

#### PEEL 4X4 CLUB BYLAWS

- 1. The trip leader will delegate the position of Safety/Recovery officer to another member prior to trip departure.
- 2. All members and visitors are to follow the Safety Officer's instructions at all times
- 3. No pets allowed on club trips.
- 4. Each club member is to be responsible for the safety and whereabouts of their own children.
- 5. Trip Leader responsibilities and Tail End Charlie role to be read out before each trip.
- 6. After 2 trips you must have adequate front and rear recovery points fitted to your vehicle and must have a UHF CB radio.
- 7. Vehicles without adequate front and rear recovery points are limited to scenic/social and easy rated trips.
- 8. All trips are to be rated scenic/social; easy; medium; hard and extreme. Visitors are not permitted on hard and extreme trip. Membership of the WA4Wd Assoc is required for attendance on hard and extreme trips.
- 9. Proceeds from fundraising will be used for club purposes.
- 10. A limit of 15 vehicles per trip will apply. Trip leader has the discretion to increase or decrease this number.
- 11. First in best-dressed, if in excess of 15 vehicles wish to attend a trip, based on prior confirmation.
- 12. Club bank account to hold a minimum of \$1000 balance. A portion of this amount may be used to purchase urgent items at the committee's discretion.
- 13. Whilst every care is taken, no responsibility is accepted.
- 14. Visitors must attend at least 2 trips, rated easy and/or medium, to qualify for membership. Scenic/social trips will not be counted.

#### PEEL 4X4 CODE OF ETHICS

- 1. Keep to the laws and regulations for 4wd vehicles. They may change from state to state.
- 2. All vehicles must have either comprehensive or third party fire and theft insurance.
- 3. Keep the environment clean. Carry your own and, maybe, other people's rubbish home.
- 4. Obey restrictions on use of public lands. Respect national parks and other conservation areas.
- 5. Obtain permission before driving on private land. Leave livestock alone and gates as found.
- 6. Keep your vehicle mechanically sound.
- 7. Take adequate water, food, fuel and spares on trips. In remote areas travel with another vehicle.
- 8. Respect our wild life. Stop and look but never disturb or chase animals.
- 9. Respect other recreationalists rights to peace and solitude in the bush.
- 10. Obey all fire restrictions. Extinguish your fire before leaving. Don't let your exhaust emit sparks.
- 11. Help in bushfire emergences and search and rescue but only if you are properly equipped and able.
- 12. Support 4WD touring as a responsible and legitimate recreational activity.
- 13. All members should behave in a socially acceptable manner at all times.

Stay safe out on the tracks everyone, and I look forward to seeing you all on Wednesday night, 25<sup>th</sup> October.


# **BRISEY'S BULLDUST**

# TESTED TO DESTRUCTION

As I mentioned in BB we now have an MG4 Excite 52 electric vehicle. We have only had it a few days so these comments are my first impressions.

This is an entry level EV and is the cheapest on the market at the moment (apart from the BYD that is \$100.00 cheaper). There is a good level of safety features including adaptive cruise control, lane departure and driver fatigue monitoring as well as all the things considered standard now such as traction control, ABS, reverse camera etc.


We have only done 150 km so far but the seats are very comfortable with height adjustment and good back support, leg room is good even in the back seats. There are the essential coffee cup and water bottle holders and plenty of storage compartments.

The infotainment system has apple car play and android auto, Bluetooth, USB input and DAB radio. There are heaps of displays and readouts on both screens.

Performance is good with 0—100 in about 7 seconds but obviously driving that way will deplete the battery quickly, driving rage is up to 350 km— not huge but good for being a shopping trolley and for our regular visit to the kids in Harrisdale and Averley. Our first drive around averaged 15 KW/100 but we found the air conditioner was on the lowest setting for the whole trip so with a more moderate setting we should see the range improve a bit. The trickle charger supplied with the car isn't as slow as I was expecting with the first charge from 60% to fully charged overnight but for na full charge I was told it could be as long as 30 hours. I bought a wall charger with the car and have ordered a cable to use at public chargers.

Build quality seems good and road noise doesn't cause conversation with my dodgy hearing any problems. I am very happy with our purchase

# How to Stay Fire Smart While Camping in Summer

Enjoy camping without fire risks this summer. Explore vehicle prep, road safety and campfire care for a worry-free journey.



It's been a hotter than average spring in Australia with bushfires already burning in some states.

With a forecast long, hot summer there is no better time to be vigilant about fire safety as you head off to your favourite holiday destinations in the great outdoors on your next camping trip.

Much of Australia's native flora is designed to ignite, and in many cases, it needs to do so as part of its regenerative process. At home we're aware of the dangers of fire, but in the wilderness it's necessary to be especially careful. And as always, a little planning will go a long way to being safe in the

#### summer months.

As the weather warms up and the landscape dries out, our fire services will be active doing everything they can to reduce the risk of a catastrophic event. Back burning and clearing land of flammable debris are important protective measures; however, it's up to every individual to play their part. When you're on the move keep an eye on the conditions and fire safety ratings, which tend to be displayed on large signs along highways throughout the country.



## Preparation

Your vehicle should be in tip-top condition so as not to be a fire hazard. Keep your undercarriage clear of leaves, small twigs, branches, grass and other fire hazards and be sure that appliances are in good order. Check electrical connections and gas lines, as well as anything else that might spark. Keep your vehicle stocked with fire safety equipment such as a fire blanket and <u>fire extinguisher</u>.

Check ahead to see what conditions are likely to prevail at your destination and find out the rules pertaining to those. Throughout parts of Australia there are different restrictions on Total Fire Ban days; in some places you'll be prohibited from using a generator, while in others there's a blanket ban on recreational four-wheel driving.

Aside from the risks of sparking a blaze, breaking the laws around fire bans can result in some hefty penalties, including five-figure fines or prison time.

#### On the road

One universal wisdom echoed around bush fires is to always act early. Whether that means leaving a place that's under threat or reducing danger by choosing to go flame-free to begin with, the best way to deal with a dangerous situation is to never encounter it in the first place.

Common sense should lead us all to avoid areas close to active blazes, not only for our own safety but also to keep roads clear for emergency services.

If you do, however, find yourself in such an area, be sure to keep your windows up, switch on your headlights and drive with extreme caution. Don't linger any longer than need be, but also be sure to obey road rules, temporary road closures and so forth.

# Campfire care

It's hard to beat the experience of gathering around a campfire and, if the conditions permit, it can be a great addition to any camp kitchen.



Regardless of the weather, campfires should always be lit with the utmost care but in the drier months, particularly during fire season, you should avoid lighting any solid fuel fires.

#### Keep these tips in mind for a safe campfire throughout the year:

In campgrounds or caravan parks where fires are allowed, campers may light campfires in campground fireplaces if it is not a day of Total Fire Ban

Don't light fires on hot and windy days

Some national parks do not permit fires at all so it's always best to check with the local park's office

Use prepared fireplaces where they're available, or as directed by signs

Clear 3m radius around the pit by removing any twigs, leaves and flammable debris, and make sure there are no low-hanging branches overhead

Dig a pit around 30cm deep to contain the fire

Use large rocks to create a border around the fire; avoid river rocks and layered rocks as they can explode when they get hot

Keep a shovel and a bucket of water nearby (not sand or dirt as they stay hot for an extended period)

Ensure that the fire is never left unattended and is completely extinguished (cool to touch) before you leave the campsite. Extinguish the fire by pouring water onto it

When it comes to firewood, your best bet is BYO. You can't rely on there being sufficient supplies in the area around your camp. Some public lands will have seasonal restrictions on the collection of wood, while national parks and reserves have a ban to preserve habitat.

#### On Total Fire Ban days:

No campfires or open flame barbecues are permitted, including kettle/Weber style barbecues and solid fuel camp ovens (this includes use of burners in your tent)

No liquid fuel or gas appliances are permitted

Built-in electric or gas barbecues can only be used if a water supply is within 10m, the barbecue is clear of all flam
mable materi-

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clear of all flamal for 3m around adult is present.

# Essential Guide to Alternators: "Smart" vs "Dumb"

### What does the alternator do?

The engine of a 4WD produces mechanical energy, however, it doesn't generate electricity, that task belongs to the alternator. The 4WD charging system consists of a battery, a voltage regulator, and an alternator. The alternator converts mechanical energy to electrical energy with an alternating current.

When the 4WD engine is running, it turns a drive belt that rests on a pulley attached to the alternator. The pulley rotates the alternator's rotor shaft, which spins a set of magnets around a coil. These spinning magnets generate alternating current (AC) around the coil, which is then channelled to the alternator's rectifier. Then the alternating current (AC) is transformed into a direct current (DC). A voltage regulator sends the power from the alternator to the battery and controls the amount of energy provided to allow a steady flow of power to the battery.



### "Dumb" Alternator

A traditional alternator, or "dumb" as we are calling it, has been in use since World War Two when they were installed on vehicles to power radio equipment. They used to be called a generator as they work the same as one, the 4WD engine spins wheels under the bonnet that crank a wheel on the alternator which produces electricity.

The issues with a "dumb" alternator are that it only offers a single voltage target, and that target is often not even correct. The typical target of the "dumb" alternator is between 13.6V and 14.2V, which is too low for an absorption phase and too high for a floating stage. What this means is that the battery may not fully charge and in the long term it may overcharge the battery, in turn, damaging it.

With a secondary battery setup, an intelligent battery management system or a DCDC charger is not required, a simple battery isolator or voltage sensitive relay (VSR) will do. A DCDC charger or intelligent battery management system, however, will look after the second battery better.

### What is a "Smart" Alternator?

Smart alternators, also known as variable voltage alternators, control the output voltage and current produced by the alternator based on the 4WD operating condition. In doing so the smart alternator is more efficient and helps the engine reduce emissions by reducing the voltage supplied to the battery when the 4WD is driving. Unlike a "dumb" alternator, which supplies a constant voltage of between 13.6V and 14.4V when the engine is running, a smart alternator's voltage is variable.

A smart alternator is unable to charge a secondary battery system due to the variable voltage, which can range between 12.3V and 15V making them ineffective to charge a second battery effectively. A VSR won't work with a smart alternator, however, DCDC chargers or intelligent battery management systems, such as the Redarc Manager 30 or an Enerdrive Power System have the smarts to charge and maintain a secondary battery setup to 100%.

# Lazy Gourmet: Camp oven pizza

Camp oven Pizza, you ask? Yes! It is totally possible to make a pizza in a camp oven, and as I have as yet to meet anyone who doesn't like the humble meal it is a winner with everyone.

From the Rug Rats to the Grandfolk, from vegetarians to dedicated carnivores, from pineapple people to anchovy tragics – this camp oven pizza recipe is one for all. There are a couple of ways camp oven pizza can be constructed and it is entirely up to you which method you pursue. The first is probably a little easier and quicker as you use pre-made flat breads or pre-made bases. These can readily be purchased from the supermarket or you might like to have a go at making your own at home (from bread mix) before you leave. As flat breads are dead easy to make when you are on the road and don't need to be cooked in an oven (just a large frypan), they can be made anywhere. The second way requires you to make bases from scratch from bread mix. It takes a little more time but the results are delicious.

Of course the choice of toppings is entirely up to the individual and this could be a great opportunity for a group to all get together and bring a selection of different toppings for some amazing creations. The secret to a good pizza is to only have about four toppings; cut everything small; and don't overload the pizza as it will take longer to cook. Fantastic way to get the kids involved, too. To perfectly cook a pizza you need a hot camp oven of at least 200°C (with most of the heat on the lid) and, for once, all over the lid... not just around the outer edge.




A cast iron camp oven will need a bit more time to heat up than a Steel Hillbilly although the cast iron one will maintain its heat longer. If you are unsure of the temperature in your camp oven, invest in a BBQ temperature gauge that can be placed into the camp oven five minutes before you are ready to cook – it will tell you exactly how hot it is, and then you have time to cool it down by taking away some of the coals or heat it up by adding more coals (or even some small pieces of wood) to the lid. Always, no matter what you are cooking, have less coals underneath and more on top as they are easier to manage and the food is less likely to burn on the bottom. I have found that the small pizza trays available from homewares stores are great, and they fit easily in my large Hillbilly. If your camp oven is smaller, a sheet of baking paper on top of a trivet that fits inside the camp oven works a treat. Just make sure your pizza is a couple of centimetres smaller than the inside of your camp oven – so it's easy to lift in and out. If your camp oven is hot enough, it should only take about 15 minutes before you are dining on your very own delicious creation.

Now you have all the instructions, it's your turn to use your imagination and have a go at a Camp oven Pizza. Enjoy!


