DAY 0: Depart the USA for Madrid, Spain!

You'll need to depart your home city one day early to arrive in Madrid in time. For a full range of ticket air options visit: https://www.kayak.com/ Once you find your preferred routing, book directly with the airlines of your choice.

DAY 1: Tuesday, June 3 - Arrive in Spain's Capital City, Madrid!

Arrive in Madrid and transfer to your centrally located hotel. Meet your Sunday Baroque host, Suzanne Bona, and local guide for a walk through the historic center of Madrid. After enjoying a welcome glass of wine at a local bodega, we'll enjoy a stroll down medieval lanes to the Plaza Mayor and a restaurant for our Welcome-to-Spain dinner featuring regional dishes. Sleep in Madrid (D)

DAY 2: Wednesday, June 4 - The Prado Museum and Reina Sofia: From Velazquez to Picasso!

After breakfast, we'll walk to the Prado Museum for an in-depth look at the masterpieces of Goya, Velazquez and El Greco. For those who love modern art we've planned a visit to the impressive Reina Sofia Museum. Today the Reina Sofia houses masterpieces by Pablo Picasso, Salvador Dali and Miro. This afternoon you may wish to visit the Royal Palace or stroll through the colorful bistro-lined streets of the Santa Ana neighborhood. This is a free evening to enjoy dinner in one of Madrid's many excellent restaurants. Sleep in Madrid (B, D)



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Spend a full day exploring Toledo!

DAY 3: Thursday, June 5 - An Outing to Towering Medieval Toledo

Perched high above a winding river, Toledo looms from a distance. Toledo's historic roots run deep. Once a Roman town, it was occupied by the Christian Visigoths in the 6th century. Later, in the 8th century, Muslim armies swept across Spain, and Toledo became a thriving commercial center where Jews, Christians and Muslims peacefully coexisted. Finally, after several hundred years Catholic forces returned again, turning this city into their Christian capital. Together, we'll take an in-depth look at Toledo's historic cathedral, El Greco's premier masterpiece The Count of Orgaz, and visit one of Spain's oldest and stunning synagogues, Santa Maria Blanca. The afternoon is yours to stroll Toledo's many cobblestone streets or visit the Alcazar. Sleep in Madrid (B, L)

DAY 4: Friday, June 6 - Madrid to Salamanca - via Segovia

Just one hour north of Madrid is the celebrated town of Segovia. Well known for its castle, cathedral and Roman aqueduct, Segovia is well worth exploring. In Segovia we'll have a feast on one of the region's most celebrated dishes ... roast suckling pig. (Vegetarian options available). After lunch there will be time to discover Segovia's many charms before heading two hours north to Salamanca. Sleep in charming Salamanca (B, L)



Spend two nights in Burgos!

DAY 5: Saturday, June 7 - Discover Salamanca

Salamanca, a UNESCO World Heritage site, captivates visitors with its stunning Plaza Mayor, a vibrant square renowned for its intricate sandstone architecture that radiates warmth. The historic University of Salamanca, one of the oldest in the world, features an ornate façade and the whimsical Frog of Salamanca, believed to bring good luck to students. Strolling through the charming cobblestone streets, you'll encounter quaint shops and inviting cafés nestled in centuries-old buildings. The magnificent dualcathedral complex showcases an awe-inspiring blend of Gothic and Baroque styles, each detail telling a story of the city's rich heritage. Don't miss the Casa de las Conchas, adorned with scallop shells, which houses a fascinating public library and a glimpse into the past. As twilight descends, the illuminated sandstone facades cast a magical glow over the Tormes River, making Salamanca a truly enchanting place to explore.

Today, there will be a morning tour of the city center followed by a multi-course lunch featuring regional specialties. Sleep in Salamanca (B, L)



DAY 6: Sunday, June 8 - Discover Burgos, the city of El Cid

The cathedral of Burgos, a UNESCO World Heritage site, is a masterpiece that's worth the trip. It had humble origins as a modest Romanesque church, but work began on a grander scale in 1221. Remarkably, within 40 years most of the French Gothic structure that you see today had been completed. The twin towers, which went up later in the 15th century, each represent 84m of richly decorated Gothic fantasy and they're surrounded by a sea of similarly intricate spires. Probably the most impressive of the portals is the Puerta del Sarmental, the main entrance for visitors, although the honor could also go to the Puerta de la Coronería, on the northwestern side, which shows Christ surrounded by the Evangelists.

And tucked away in the cathedral lies the body of El Cid. Few names resonate through Spanish history quite like El Cid, the 11th century soldier of fortune and adventurer whose story tells in microcosm the tumultuous years when Spain was divided into Muslim and Christian zones. El Cid has become a romantic, idealized figure of history, known for his unswerving loyalty and superhuman strength; his exploits captured the popular imagination as expressed in an anonymous 12th century epic poem and the 1961 film starring Charlton Heston and Sophia Loren.



El Cid (from the Arabic sidi for 'chief' or 'lord') was born Rodrígo Diaz in Vivar, a hamlet about 10km north of Burgos, in 1043. After the death of Ferdinand I, he entered into the murky world of royal succession which saw the king's five heirs squabbling over the throne and, ultimately, El Cid's banishment from Castilla in 1076. With few scruples as to whom he served, El Cid offered his services to a host of rulers, both Christian and Muslim. With each battle, he became ever more powerful and wealthy. Today you'll walk past his coffin as we tour the cathedral.

Enjoy lunch in Burgos and then take some time to explore this gem at your own relaxing pace. Sleep in Burgos (B, L)

THE ROAD TO SANTIAGO

The Way of St. James (commonly known by its name in Spanish: El Camino de Santiago) is the name of any of the <u>pilgrimage</u> routes (most commonly the <u>Camino</u> <u>Francés</u> or French route) to the shrine of the <u>apostle St. James the Great</u> in the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela in Galicia in northwestern Spain, where tradition says the remains of the saint are buried. The area around Burgos is one of the main stops en-route from the Pyrenees to Santiago so chances are you'll meet quite a few tired and happy pilgrims in this region.

DAY 7: Monday, June 9 - Wine Tasting and Sightseeing in Rioja

Set in the foothills of the Pyrenees close to the French border, La Rioja produces what most people have in mind when they think of Spanish wines. The region was making millions of gallons even during the regime of the ancient Romans, and it boasts qualitycontrol laws promulgated by a local bishop in the 9th century.

This morning we'll head out to the countryside to discover some of the finer wines of Rioja - including tastings with the producers. Upon our return to Burgos you'll have time to stroll through the charming medieval streets. Why not stop in a charming café for a glass of vino and some tapas? Sleep in Burgos (B, L)



DAY 8: Tuesday, June 10 - Guggenheim Museum, Bilbao

In Bilbao there is a different way of seeing the city's main museums and monuments: by boat. You will be able to see the following while you sail down the Nervión estuary for an hour: the impressive Guggenheim Bilbao Museum, Euskalduna Palace, Zubizuri Bridge, the Town Hall, Izozaki towers, Deusto University... all these are icons in a city that many describe as a laboratory of open-air architecture. Enjoy a private tour of the Guggenheim Museum and lunch.

Then, make your way to San Sebastián. Sleep in San Sebastián (B, L)

Day 9: Wednesday, June 11 - San Sebastián - Spain's Basque Country

San Sebastián, located in Spain's Basque Country, is renowned for its stunning beaches and vibrant culinary scene. The city's picturesque La Concha Bay is often considered one of the most beautiful urban beaches in Europe. San Sebastián is also famous for its pintxos, delicious small bites that reflect the region's rich culinary traditions. The historic Old Town, or Parte Vieja, buzzes with lively bars and restaurants, making it a perfect spot for food lovers. Cultural events, such as the San Sebastián International Film Festival, attract visitors from around the world. Additionally, the surrounding hills offer breathtaking views and hiking opportunities. With its unique blend of natural beauty, gastronomy, and culture, San Sebastián is a must-visit destination. Sleep in San Sebastián (B, L)

DAY 10: Thursday, June 12 - Morning Funicular Railway

Enjoy a morning tour of the colorful town center. Then, we will hop the historic funicular railway which leads to a stunning viewpoint. Upon our return to the town center, we'll enjoy a wonderful farewell lunch. Then, the afternoon is yours. You may wish to soak up the sights, visit museums, beaches and explore the cobbled streets before meeting your guide and host for tapas and wine. Let's toast to a fabulous Sunday Baroque adventure! Sleep in San Sebastián (B, L)

About Rioja & Catalonia Wine Regions & Dining Out

Meals and Dining Out: In Spain lunch is king. Spaniards enjoy large multi-course lunches and typically enjoy a lighter dinner at 10:00pm. Through the years we have noticed that American travelers, having just dined for 2 hours on a delicious hearty lunch, are in no mood to have a large dinner the same day. Therefore, the lion's share of meals will be beautiful traditional multi-course lunches. And we are guessing that by dinnertime a tapa and a glass of wine is all you'll be looking for.

Rioja: Rioja wines are normally a blend of various grape varieties, and can be either red (tinto), white (blanco) or rosé (rosado). La Rioja has a total of 57,000 hectares cultivated, yielding 250 million litres of wine annually, of which 85% is red. A distinct characteristic of Rioja wine is the effect of oak aging. First introduced in the early 18th century by Bordeaux influenced winemakers, the use of oak and the pronounced vanilla flavors in the wines has been a virtual trademark of the region though some modern winemakers are experimenting with making wines less influenced by oak.

Codorniu Cellars, Catalonia: The influence of the sun and the Mediterranean Sea makes the Penedés a privileged territory in which the Codorníu winery, declared national historical and artistic patrimony, stands out in 1976. This winery is owned by the oldest family business in Spain. This currently has more than 450 years of history. Discover the Cathedral of Cava and the other 2 modernist buildings designed by Puig i Cadafalch, enjoy the train ride through the underground cellars and taste their cava in an exciting journey to the origins of viticulture in our country.
