

DAY 0: Depart the U.S. for Amsterdam

Remember, you must depart the U.S. no later than April 21 in order to arrive by April 22.

DAY 1: April 22 - Arrive in Amsterdam


Arrive in Amsterdam and transfer to your centrally located fourstar hotel. Enjoy a stroll through the old town or along the historic canals before meeting your Earthbound Expeditions guide and fellow travelers for an orientation and welcome dinner. Sleep in the heart of Amsterdam (D)

DAY 2: April 23 - The Dutch Golden Age

After breakfast, discover the hidden and historic sights of this fascinating city. Enjoy a private tour of the Rijksmuseum and see Rembrandt's famous Night Watch. History and art lovers may wish to visit the Van Gogh Museum, Anne Frank House or the Hermitage Amsterdam independently. There is free time this afternoon to pursue your interests. Sleep in the heart of Amsterdam (B, D)

DAY 3: April 24 - Flower Auction, Keukenhof Gardens and Embarkation

The Aalsmeer Flower Auction is the largest in the world. Twenty million flowers from all over the world are sold daily here. This morning you'll tour the facilities and see where the auction takes place. Also known as the Garden of Europe, Keukenhof Gardens is the world's second largest flower garden after the Dubai Miracle Garden. After a full day outing, return to Amsterdam just in time to board the MS Magnifique II. Welcome drinks and dinner will be served on board. Sleep on board (B, D)

DAY 4: April 25 - Historic Haarlem and Evening Concert Sit up on the top deck this morning and enjoy a relaxing cruise through the Dutch countryside.

In 1625, Dutch settlers in the new world named New Amsterdam (later changed to New York) after their own beloved city. Today we'll also visit Haarlem, namesake to the neighborhood in New York. You'll have time for an independent lunch here.

A guided stroll through the delightful old town square of Haarlem is included today. Deepen your understanding of

Holland's Golden Age at the Frans Hals Museum, named for one of the Netherlands' most famous painters. If available, you'll also be treated to a concert on the very organ Mozart played while visiting Holland in 1765 - 66. Tonight, you have tickets to the world renowned **Concertgebouw Symphony** hall *Sleep on board (B, L)*




Day 5: April 26 - Historic Leiden

After a leisurely breakfast we set out to discover the fascinating Cruquius Museum. The Cruquius Museum explores the age-old Dutch battle against the water. The reclamation of Haarlemmermeer by means of steam power marked the breakthrough of the Industrial Revolution in the Netherlands. The Cruquius houses the worlds' largest steam engine.

After our visit we make our way to Leiden where we will enjoy an independent lunch. After lunch enjoy a guided tour of the

city center. It's known for its centuries-old architecture and for Leiden University, the country's oldest, dating from 1575. The university houses the Hortus botanicus of Leiden, founded in 1590, where the tulip was introduced to Western Europe. The Museum de Lakenhal displays works by the Dutch Masters including Rembrandt, who was born in Leiden. In the late afternoon, we make our way back to the Magnifique II and the town of Utrecht. Dinner served on board this evening. Sleep on board (B, D)



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DAY 6: April 27 - The Hague, Delft & Kings Day: After a hearty breakfast we depart for



The Hague. Enjoy an exclusive tour of the Mauritshuis Museum, where you will view the best of Dutch painting from the Golden Age. The compact, yet world-renowned collection is situated in the heart of The Hague, right next to the government center. Masterpieces such as Vermeer's *Girl with a Pearl Earring*, *The Anatomy Lesson of Dr. Nicolaes Tulp* by Rembrandt, *The Goldfinch* by Fabritius and *The Bull* by Potter are on permanent display in the intimate rooms of this 17th century monument.

You'll also see the Peace Palace, home of the International Court of Justice, the principal judicial body of the United Nations.

After an independent lunch, we make our way to the charming city of Delft. It is not just the historic city center and rich history of Delft that will amaze you. The city is full of special surprises.

Famous for its blue ceramic pottery, there are still three Delftware factories in operation. There is no standard for the designs used on the pottery, each factory creates its own designs inspired by Chinese porcelain. The main images are floral designs and various birds, including peacocks. *Sleep on board* (*B*, *D*)



DAY 7: April 28 - Antwerp, Belgium

Antwerp is a port city on Belgium's River Scheldt, with history dating to the Middle Ages. In its center, the centuries-old Diamond District houses thousands of diamond traders, cutters and polishers. Antwerp's Flemish Renaissance architecture is typified by the Grote Markt, a central square in the old town. At the 17th-century Rubens House, period rooms display works by the Flemish Baroque painter Peter Paul Rubens.

Enjoy an included in-depth walking tour of the historic city center. Then, you'll be treated to a traditional Belgium feast. We return to the *Magnifique II* in the late afternoon. Sleep on board (B, L, D)

DAY 8: April 29 - Windmills and Cheese Tasting: Rotterdam, Kinderdijk and Gouda Tour the lively market of Rotterdam and also learn about the city's tragic past. Now known as the "Manhattan on the Maas," many are unaware that this is Europe's largest harbor.

Later in the day, we visit quaint Kinderdijk, a UNESCO World Heritage site. This is where it all happened! It is an amazing experience to witness the resourcefulness and determination of a nation's successful efforts to beat back the sea and reclaim land that was once under water. You can climb up inside the belly of these tremendously powerful, wind powered, pumping stations. This is the largest collection of authentic, workin



stations. This is the largest collection of authentic, working 18th century windmills in the world.

After your tour, meet up with your floating home and enjoy lunch while cruising through the Dutch countryside. The Magnifique II travels next on to Gouda. Your walking tour includes the Gothic city hall, completed in 1450, and Sint Janskerk (St. John's Church), with its world-famous 16th century stained-glass windows. You will also have free time to explore this lovely traditional Dutch city. Independent dinner in town this evening. Sleep on board (B, L)

DAY 9: April 30 - Exploring Dutch Edible Specialties

Stroll Gouda's local market and join a visit to the cheese-weighing house, De Waag, where you will sample some of the appealing varieties. Yes, there is more than one kind of Gouda! We'll have lunch on board and continue along the canals toward Gouwsluis, a small Dutch town, renowned for its historic vertical lift bridge and also home to the futuristic Steekterpoort building, the facility which controls all of the 24 moveable bridges in South Holland. After dinner on board, enjoy a presentation and tasting of locally-crafted Dutch beers. Sleep on board (B, L, D)

DAY 10: May 1 - Homeward Bound

After breakfast, disembark and transfer to Amsterdam's Schiphol Airport for your flights home or enjoy some more time in Europe. Cities such as Paris and London are just a few hours away by high-speed train. Return home with a lifetime of happy memories! (B)

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

Melissa Ousley is an on-air regional host on YourClassical MPR. In the fall of 2020, she became the regular host of Minnesota Public Radio's live broadcasts with the Minnesota Orchestra. ABOUT: The Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra, based in Amsterdam, is considered to be one of the best orchestras in the world. It was established in 1888 and has collaborated with some of the greatest conductors and soloists, including Richard Strauss, Gustav Mahler, and Igor Stravinsky. April 24, 2025 You have tickets: The Amsterdam Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra

PROGRAM: Semyon Bychkov, Chief Conductor and Music Director of the Czech Philharmonic, leads the Concertgebouw Orchestra in Dmitri Shostakovich's monumental 'Leningrad' Symphony.

About Maestro Semyon Bychkov (pictured above)

Bychkov was born in Saint Petersburg. His younger brother was Yakov Kreizberg, is also a conductor. Bychkov studied at the Glinka Choir School for ten years before moving to the Leningrad Conservatory. In 1973 he won the Rachmaninov Conducting Competition, but was denied the usual prize of conducting the Leningrad Philharmonic by the authorities after he applied for an exit visa. His family had suffered after expressing views critical of the Soviet regime. He decided to leave the country in 1974, going first to Vienna with only \$100 in funds.

Studies and career in the United States

In 1975, at age 22, he left Vienna and emigrated to the United States. Bychkov attended and graduated the Mannes School of Music then becoming the director of the Mannes College Orchestra. From 1980 to 1985, Semyon Bychkov served as music director

of the Grand Rapids Symphony in Grand Rapids, Michigan, and through his Mannes connection with fellow alumnus Julius Rudel became principal guest conductor of the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra. Again through his connection with Rudel, Bychkov made his debut conducting Carmen at the New York City Opera on September 30, 1981. On 4 July 1983, he became a United States citizen. In 1985, he became music director of the Buffalo Philharmonic and held that post until 1989. During his time in Grand Rapids and Buffalo. In 1984 he was invited to conduct the New York Philharmonic, the Berlin Philharmonic and the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra. He was subsequently signed to a 10-year recording contract with Philips Classics Records, and made his debut recording conducting the Berlin Philharmonic in Shostakovich's Symphony No. 5.

Career in Europe

From 1989 to 1998, Bychkov was music director of the Orchestre de Paris. He became Principal Guest Conductor of the Saint Petersburg Philharmonic Orchestra in 1990, principal guest conductor of the Maggio Musicale Fiorentino in 1992, chief conductor of Dresden's Semperoper in 1998 and chief conductor of the WDR Symphony Orchestra Cologne in 1997. He remained in Cologne until 2010, during which time he made a series of recordings including Brahms' Symphonies No. 1-4, Shostakovich's Symphonies Nos. 4, 7, 8, 10 and 11, Mahler's Symphony No. 3, Rachmaninov's The Bells and Symphonic Dances, Richard Strauss' Ein Heldenleben and Eine Alpensinfonie, Verdi's Requiem, as well as Strauss' Elektra, Daphne and Wagner's Lohengrin which won BBC Music Magazine's Record of the Year 2010.

Bychkov made his debut at the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden in 2003 with a new production of Elektra, and returned later that year to conduct Boris Godunov. In 2012, he assumed the newly created Günter Wand Conducting Chair with the BBC Symphony Orchestra, a post specially created for him. He holds the Otto Klemperer Chair of Conducting at the Royal Academy of Music in London.

In October 2017, the Czech Philharmonic announced the appointment of Bychkov as its next chief conductor and music director, effective with the 2018-2019 season.
