Family Activity Ideas

1. Draw Your Village

Draw or imagine a village where your family comes from. It can be real, remembered, or imagined. Add details like food, paths, rivers, or homes.

2. Family Story Time

Ask an elder in your family to share a story about their childhood or their parents. Write it down or record it.

3. Memory Objects

Choose one object that represents your family history (a recipe, photo, tool, or gift). Share why it matters.

4. Qing Ming Reflection

Light a candle, offer flowers or food, and take a moment to remember ancestors or loved ones who came before you.

Gentle History Background

Toisan (Taishan)

Toisan, also known as Taishan, is a region in southern China made up of many villages. For generations, families lived close to the land, passing down knowledge through daily life rather than written records.

In the late 1800s and early 1900s, many people from Toisan left their villages due to hardship and limited opportunities.

They traveled overseas seeking work and a better future for their families.

### Immigration & Early Chinese American Life

Chinese immigrants faced strict laws that limited where they could live, work, and whether family members could join them. Many opened laundries, shops, and small businesses, creating new communities that carried village values into new lands.

### Honoring Ancestors: Qing Ming

Qing Ming is a traditional time to honor ancestors. Families clean graves, offer food, and take time to remember those who came before them. It reminds us that we walk with our ancestors and carry their stories forward.

### Learn More: Museums & Cultural Centers in China

If you would like to explore more history connected to the story, these museums preserve the experiences of overseas Chinese families and Taishanese heritage:

Taishan Overseas Chinese Culture Museum (Taishan, Guangdong, China)

A museum dedicated to the history and culture of Taishanese emigrants. It highlights village life, overseas journeys, and the enduring connection between families and their homeland.

Overseas Chinese History Museum of China (Beijing, China)

中国华侨历史博物馆 A national museum presenting the history of Chinese emigration around the world, with exhibits on migration, daily life abroad, and ties to home.

Overseas Chinese Museum (Xiamen, Fujian, China)

华侨博物院 China's first museum dedicated to overseas Chinese history, founded with support from emigrant communities. It preserves artifacts, letters, and stories of migration.
