Surf Soup®: My Hula Is Broken is designed as a gentle, flexible read-aloud that supports Social-Emotional Learning, caregiving conversations, and movement-based exploration. This story works beautifully in classrooms, libraries, and homeschool settings where calm storytelling, discussion, and compassion are valued.

There are no right or wrong answers — the focus is on noticing, trying, and supporting one another.

Learning Focus (SEL-Aligned)

Self-Awareness

Notice how the body feels during movement and rest

Recognize emotions connected to aging, frustration, and healing

Social Awareness

Develop empathy for grandparents and elders

Understand caregiving as an act of love

Relationship Skills

Practice encouragement and patience

Learn how families support one another

Responsible Decision-Making

Explore safe, gentle ways to move and heal

Respect personal limits and changing abilities

Discussion Questions

Why did Grandma think her hula was broken?

How did the Kumus help her feel supported?

Why is gentle movement important?

How can we show care to grandparents or elders?

What does “learning never ends” mean?

Activities & Extensions

Gentle Movement Practice

Try slow swaying or simple arm movements. Focus on breathing and comfort rather than perfection.

Family Story Sharing

Invite students to share stories about grandparents or elders who have taught them something important.

Shell Condo Art

Draw Honi's shell and imagine how the Kumus live inside when they travel and return to the 88 Shrine.

Discuss how different cultures use dance and movement to tell stories and heal.
