SCRIPTURES: Jeremiah 1:4-10 *1 Corinthians 13:1-13 SERMON TITLE: "Agape Update"

February 17 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time

But study after study shows that after one's basic needs are met, having lots of stuff has little relationship to happiness. Jesus talks about the basis of real and lasting happiness.

February 24 7th Sunday in Ordinary Time

SCRIPTURES: Genesis 45:3-11, 15 *Luke 6:27-38 SERMON TITLE: "God, is Another Name for Reality"

THEME: Jesus says, "Love your enemies. Do good to those who hurt you. ..." It is not another list of impossible things to do. It is rather a reflection on what God is like and how God has treated us. PASTOR JOHN'S JOTTINGS

Then I considered all that my hands had done and the toil I had spent in doing it, and again, all was vanity and a chasing after wind, and there was nothing to be gained under the sun. (Ecclesiastes 2:11) I just read a very interesting article by Anne Helen Petersen, "How Millennials Became the Burnout Generation." She is a Millennial writing to other Millennials (those born between 1981 and 1996), yet much of what she has to say has a much wider application.

Petersen talks at length about the pressure that Millennials feel to "optimize themselves." It starts with intense parenting. "Running around the neighborhood has become supervised play dates. Unstructured day care has become pre-preschool. Neighborhood Kick the Can or pickup games have transformed into highly regulated organized league play that spans the year. Unchanneled energy (diagnosed as hyperactivity) became medicated and disciplined."

The unfulfilled promise is that those who optimize themselves will gain employment that is secure, sounds cool to others, and be in line with one's passion. When that didn't happen, many Millennials doubled down and worked all that much harder. Clearly they were not efficient enough, not optimized enough, did not have enough education, etc. The result is a constant state of burnout. Burnout is living in a state of constant exhaustion while still being powered by a nervous energy that will not allow for rest.

The culture cure for such burnout is "self-care." Take a vacation. Engage in meditation. Get more physical exercise. Petersen points out that "selfcare" is a multibillion dollar industry. But it is not the cure for burnout. She talks about approaching even self-care from a perspective of "How can I do these things in order to better optimize myself?"

Everything is about doing more, producing more, being more efficient. Even the word, "adult" has become a verb rather than a state of being. "*To adult* is to complete your to-do list, but of course, everything goes on the list and the list never ends." The result is a burnout that is not simply a temporary affliction. Petersen writes, "It's the millennial condition. It's our base temperature. It's our background music. It's the way things are. It's our lives." Part of the price for this constant striving, burnout is that it takes things that should be enjoyable and flattens them into a list of tasks. Taking the kids to see the Christmas lights becomes just one more thing on the "to do" list.

Pattersen says she is struggling to attain a new attitude, "a way of thinking about life, and what joy and meaning we can derive not just from optimizing it, but living it. Which is another way of saying: It's life's actual work."

I think that Pattersen has done a great job of defining the problem. The solution could use some theologian reflection. The problem feels ever more intense these days, but it is not really new. The world-weary preacher in Ecclesiastes commented on all the things that people do in order to try to secure for themselves meaning and enjoyment in life. His repeated comment is, "all is vanity and a chasing after the wind." His point is not that work is unnecessary or that all of our actions are worthless. His point is that God created us as human **beings**, not as human **doings.**

The modern church has responded to the anxiety of over-busy individuals by trying to make things easier. Thus the 20 minute drive in worship services, Ashes to Go, and online Bible Studies. None of these things are bad, but they can simply feed that "need to be more ever more efficient and optimized."

The cure is not in more efficiency or more optimization of the individual. The cure is in finding our self-worth in being instead of in doing. The good news of the gospel is that God accepts us right where we are. There is nothing that we can do to make God love us more. There is nothing that we can fail to do that will make God love us less.

I have sometimes heard it said that Jesus spent so much time in prayer, because he needed that strength to accomplish his work. That sounds a bit too much like Jesus was "optimizing himself for the really important work." I think Jesus spent so much time in prayer because he enjoyed **being** in God's company. The most important thing for Jesus was not **doing** prayer, but **being** in prayer.

The more that God wants for us begins with the fact that we are already loved and declared of infinite value. We are already "enough." Tuesday, January 15, 2019 5:30 p.m.
