Sermons & Scriptures

August 7 9th Sunday after Pentecost
(Communion)

Scriptures: Luke 12:32-40
*Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

Sermon: "Faithing Into the Future"

Theme: To have faith in God is always to be turned to the future. We can't always see what God is going to do next. But we move forward with confidence anyway, because we know that God has already promised us the kingdom.

August 14, 10th Sunday after Pentecost

Scriptures: Isaiah 5:1-7
*Luke 12:49-56

Sermon: "Popularity vs. Faith"

Theme: The peace of Jesus is more than the absence of conflict. In today's gospel lesson, Jesus says, "I came to cast fire upon the earth." Truly engaging in the life of faith will bring us into many areas of conflict. This is a good news message, but it is not a popular one.

August 21, 11th Sunday after Pentecost

Scriptures: Jeremiah 1:4-10
*Luke 13:10-17

Sermon title: "What Did You Expect From Jesus?"

Theme: In our lesson a woman who had been crippled for 18 years is told to come stand before Jesus. We don't know what she expected. We do know that she was healed and left praising God. Time after time the Bible tells us of people who encountered Jesus. Many of them did not get what they expected. But all of them were changed by the encounter.

August 28, 12th Sunday after Pentecost

Scriptures: Jeremiah 2:4-13
*Luke 14:1,7-14

Sermon title: "Jesus as Judge"

Theme: Jesus admonished his disciples "Do not judge, or you too will be judged." (Matthew 7:1-3) But he never promised that he would not judge us. Jesus loves us enough to give us guidance and help in living right. That means he is willing to do the hard work of correcting us, of judging us.



I continue to be amazed and grateful for the generosity and faithfulness of you, the members of First Presbyterian Church. You obviously believe that the work done here is necessary and important and you show that in the way you generously give your time, talents, and money to this work. Thank you!

Some believe so strongly in the work of the church that they have arranged to support it long after they have departed this earth. Some have the mistaken belief that you have to be wealthy to do this. But that is not true. Very modest gifts can make a huge difference in what the church is able to do ministry and mission wise.

Let me tell you about one such couple. Bob and Betty Dodd were dedicated and faithful members of this church for many years. I very much enjoyed visiting them and talking with them. They were very special people. Betty, in particular loved music and wanted that ministry to continue from many years to come. The Dodds left the church a gift from their estate of a few thousand dollars to be used for music. That money made it possible to offer music scholarships to some students from A.B. College. In return, they came and sang in the choir on Sunday morning. This arrangement ended after three years because the music program at the college changed. However, while they were with us, these students greatly enriched our worship! Some of the Dodd bequest will also be used to help bring in the singing group, "The Gospel Harmony Boys" on Sunday evening, Nov. 13th. We continue to look for ways to use this money, this gift, in ways that glorify God and honor the Dodds.

In time, the gift that the Dodds gave to the music fund will be all used. But they didn't stop there. They also bequeathed to the church some very small percentages of oil and gas interests that they had inherited from family members. This is a gift that keeps on giving. Though the percentages were very small, the rising prices of oil and gas products means that the church gets checks from leases for over \$100 each month! Although Betty and Bob died over ten years ago, their influence and support for Christ's work continues to be felt!

There have been many, many others who have chosen to leave lasting gifts to help continue the work of Christ here at First Presbyterian Church. We are grateful and indebted to each and every one of them! Some have left sums of money to be invested and only the interest used. Some have left us set sums of money or property. Some have left us with memorial gifts of banners, musical instruments, and other necessary items needed to carry out our ministry. Each gift is greatly appreciated and helps us to expand our ministry. Perhaps I can share more of their stories with you in the future.

So why is the session talking about this now? First we have become aware that someone in the past must have lifted up this opportunity for legacy giving. Otherwise we would not be receiving these gifts now. So we owe it to the future church to make people aware of this giving opportunity in the present.

Research shows that many church members just don't think about the opportunity provided by legacy giving. They don't think about it, and even if they do, they don't know the practical steps and options for doing what they want to do.

The Presbyterian Foundation was established over 200 years ago as the original trustees of our denomination with the purpose of receiving gifts and bequests from pious Presbyterians. They provide all sorts of services to manage and distribute gifts to support mission and ministry. A part of that work includes investment management for churches and individuals as well as Planned Giving and Stewardship Education. This church has some investments that the Presbyterian Foundation manages for us. The Foundation exists to support the mission and ministry of local congregations such as ours.

Our session has learned that the Presbyterian Foundation will provide, free of charge, one of their staff members to come and answer questions about estate, wills, and investment giving. We think this is a great opportunity and one we need to take advantage of. We have scheduled the Rev. Ellie Johns-Kelley to come preach for us on Sunday morning, September 11, 2022. There will be a congregational meal after church. Then Rev. Johns-Kelley will lead a workshop in the afternoon on legacy giving and answer whatever questions you may have.

Rest assured this will not be an attempt to pressure you into doing something you do not want to do. This is an educational event in which you will learn about possibilities and options for supporting the ministry you love after your lifetime. It will also contain some practical advice on how to go about setting up future and legacy giving. This is an opportunity to get your questions answered and your options explored.

We look forward to the 11th being a great day and we sincerely hope that you be there to enjoy it with us.


