





As we enter into the season of Advent and look forward toward the birth of our Savior Jesus Christ, I wanted to pause and give thanks for God's grace. God's grace and mercy are revealed to us in Jesus Christ. We are all sinners and thus we all deserve condemnation. But in Jesus Christ we receive mercy. None of us is good enough to enter the kingdom of heaven on our own. Yet in Jesus Christ we all receive grace that makes us fit for heaven.

Our Bible Study lesson for this last week was about the 250th anniversary of the hymn "Amazing Grace" written by John Newton. Newton had a very rough life and was for many years an atheist. He was given to drinking, gambling, profanity and mockery of those who held Christian beliefs. He was forced into service in the Royal Navy of Great Britain but deserted his post. He was caught, arrested, publicly stripped and flogged until he lost consciousness. Later he was sold into slavery in Africa. His father managed to get him rescued from that slavery. In spite of the fact that Newton had been a slave, he went on to become captain of a slave ship. He witnessed and took part in the humiliation, sexual assaults, and abuse of the slaves under his command.

Things changed for Newton when his ship was caught in a violent storm. A crew member who relieved Newton was swept off the ship's deck moments later and drowned. Newton prayed for God's mercy, and the wind and the waves settled down. Facing the powerful forces of nature, Newton felt his own helplessness, and realized that only God's grace could save him.

This incident marked what Newton would later describe in "Amazing Grace" as "the hour I first believed." Newton in reading the Bible felt a kinship with the Apostle Paul who described himself as being the worst of sinners. Newton went on to become a pastor in the Church of England and he mentored William Wilberforce. Wilberforce led a successful campaign in Parliament to abolish the African slave trade.

What stuck out for me in this story was that after receiving God's grace, Newton changed. He was not content to simply accept God's grace and then keep living the way he always had.

He allowed God's grace to confront him with the wrongs he had done and to train him in the way that God wanted him to live. He was not only saved by grace, he was also changed by this same grace.

As we go into this Christmas season, let us thank God not only for his saving grace, but also let us submit ourselves to be changed and transformed by this same grace. Truly the grace of God is amazing!
