

Pastor John's Jottings

There is a familiar saying, "Hindsight is 20/20." Well, in a few days it will be a new year and then 2020 will be hindsight. (Pun intended!) It has been a rough year for many of us. There have been so many new things with the pandemic-lockdowns,

masks, social distancing, and trying to learn new technology. Some have endured sickness, their own and those they love. Some have lost loved ones to the virus or other causes. Others have lost their jobs. Still others seem to have lost their way. Yes, there have still been blessings, but it has been a difficult year.

If we had it to do over again, knowing what we know now, we might well have done some things differently. Our elected leaders might have done some things differently. That has been part of the curse of the Covid-19, there was so much we didn't know about how it spread and what would be effective in stopping it. But we can't see the future.

We hope and we pray that this new year will be better. I am optimistic about that. But again, we can't see the future. Chances are good that we will get a handle on the Covid-19 sometime this new year. Yet, there will be other challenges that arise. Things that we cannot possible foresee.

So how do we handle the uncertainty? How do we handle the not knowing?

First, it helps to remember that in spite of all the bad things that happen, we are still blessed. We are still the very children of God and covered with his love. God has a way of bringing good out of even the bad things that happen to us. As much as I have struggled to learn new technology like Zoom and how to live-stream a worship service, I am grateful that we have learned how to do those things. We could have benefitted from doing those things even before the pandemic, but now we have new tools in hand that will continue to serve us well into the future.

I am reminded of a song that paints a vivid picture in my mind. The name of the song is "Drinking from My Saucer." It reminds me of the line from Psalm 23, ". . . you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows."

Oh, remember times when things went wrong,
My faith wore somewhat thin?
But all at once the dark clouds broke,
And the sun peeped through again.

So Lord, help me not to gripe About the tough rows that I've hoed When I'm drinking from my saucer, 'Cause my cup has overflowed.

Second, it helps to remember that though we cannot see the future, God can. God knows what is coming, wants what is best for us, and has the power to bring that good about. My Grandma Koerner had a poem stuck in the corner of a picture in her house. The words of that poem ring as true today as when I first read the poem as a teenager.

Odds and Ends from the Church Treasurer

Dec-2020

<u>Pastor's Emergency Fund</u> For many years First Church-Clarksburg has provided its pastors a separate fund for assisting needy members of the community with food, utility and clothing assistance. This worthy extension of our ministry continues with Pastor John determining how best to disburse available funds. Approved requests are forwarded to the church treasurer and checks are disbursed directly to the utility company, grocery store, etc.

If you wish to contribute to the Pastor's Emergency Fund, you are welcomed to include your check in the offering plate. Please make your check payable to First Presbyterian Church and mark "Pastor's Fund" in the note section.

<u>Year-End Contributions</u> Federal tax regulations specify that "...ordinarily, a contribution is made at the time delivery is effected." This means a check dated December 31, 2020 but dropped in the offering plate during January of 2021 is deductible only on the donor's 2021 federal tax return. Exception: a check mailed and postmarked in 2020 may be deducted in 2020 even though the church may not receive it until 2021.

Following special tax law changes made earlier this year, cash donations of up to \$300 made before December 31, 2020, are now deductible when people file their taxes in 2021, even if you do not itemize.

What is Per Capita? Per capita is a way for each Presbyterian to share in the administrative expenses of the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly. We send WV Presbytery the per capita (\$30.00 for 2020; \$30.05 for 2021) for every member on the active role the prior year.

Approximately 65% stays in WV Presbytery to cover such things as office expenses and programming committee expenses. Approximately 10% is forwarded to the Synod of the Trinity and the remainder goes to General Assembly.

Generally roughly one-quarter of our members send the church an extra amount specifically identified for per capita. If you are willing and financially able, it would be welcomed. Thank you.

One Check (if you prefer) Members are reminded that payments to the church may be combined on one check. For instance, you may consolidate your pledge with a gift to the Christmas Joy Offering or the Pastor's Emergency Fund. Or two weekly pledges may be included on one check. Simply indicate how much is to go to each fund.

HYGIENE KIT MINISTRY

<u>Purpose of Ministry:</u> FPC recognizes that just as many children in Harrison County, WV are food insecure, they are also in need of personal hygiene items and basic

education about adequate self-care. Filling this need not only aids children in their personal health, it also increases the overall health of our community. The purpose of this ministry is to provide personal hygiene kits to children in need at the following schools in Harrison County: Nutter Fort Elementary, Nutter Fort Intermediate, Washington Irving Middle, and Liberty High

Ministry Plan: The committee (Beckie Alvaro, Loria Cavallo, Terra Burnett, Maria Morrison, Amy Strange) will coordinate with professionals at partner schools to supply kits (initially 10 per school) for distribution as needed. Supplies for the kits will be kept in a designated area in the pantry behind the stage. Kits will be filled by youth of the church and other volunteers.

Needs:

- 1. Funds for supplies we will be starting with some money from the yard sale
- 2. Supplies: toothpaste; tooth brush/cover; shampoo; body wash; deodorant; comb/brush; small pkg tissues; cotton swabs; feminine hygiene products; gallon size baggies
- ** we can use travel size or regular size items that we can break down into containers

LAUNDROMAT PROPOSAL

<u>Purpose of Ministry:</u> To enable those in our community who do not have access to laundry facilities to have somewhere to go for their personal laundry needs.

Ministry Plan:

The Task Force has spoken with Tom Cohen & Brandon Critchfield who are in agreement with this plan and the use of their facility.

- 1. Individuals/families will be referred from Community Action, Open Heart Ministry, or Health Access. We may eventually expand to include the homeless, but our starting target is for families, particularly families with young children, who have a home but are temporarily unable to do laundry because of cost or availability of machines. This is not a long term solution but is intended to get families and individuals over a rough patch. Pastor John will keep track of the names and pass the names on to the team for the week. Clients will be limited to one paid visit a month to the laundromat. Each client will be limited to \$10 per visit.
- 2. There will be four teams of two each that will meet clients each Thursday evening between 4-5 p.m. at the laundromat. The teams will have an app on their phone that will be tied to a pre-paid credit card. This app will allow the team members to start the machines for clients.
- 3. Target start date will be January 7, 2021. \$1000.00 from the yard sale proceeds is requested as a starting budget. Other funding options will be explored if necessary.
- 4. We will ask the congregation for donations of laundry detergent.

Benefits:

- 1. We will be a presence in the community as a church who cares for others.
- 2. We will be following the words of Christ, "What you do to the least of these you do for Me." Matthew 25:40
- 3. We will be supporting a local business and sharing God's work with someone who is willing to serve the community with us.
- 4. Team members will have a chance to interact with clients/families and share God's Word and the message of salvation as we minister to people's physical needs.


