




The work of a Project Manager is to:

- •Participate with the other team members in planning volunteer team projects, matching projects with team skills.
- •Evaluate projects to determine the necessary repairs and estimate the extent of needed work and materials.
- •Order materials for delivery and supply materials to sites PRIOR to arrival of work groups.
- •Supply sites as needed during the week
- •Supervise the work of volunteer groups. This requires being on site and ensuring high quality work.
- •Debrief the groups during the course of the week

Building construction and repair skills and experience are required. Membership in a Christian church is desired, as well as some previous membership in work teams or committees. Ability to communicate well (both speaking and listening) with groups is a requirement.

If you know of anyone who is qualified, please show this to them. There may be someone in your neighborhood who would like to help out. Faith and service go hand in hand.



January 2, Epiphany of the Lord Sunday (Holy Communion) Scripture: *Jeremiah 31:7-14 John 1:1-18

January 9, The Baptism of our Lord

Scripture: Isaiah 43:1-7 *John 2:1-11

Sermon Title: "The Power of Prayer"

Theme: The gospels want us to know that Jesus was a praying man. At his baptism, he was praying and the heavens opened. When faithful people pray, good things happen.

January 16, 2nd Sunday After Epiphany

Scripture: Isaiah 62:1-5 *John 2:1-11

Sermon Title: "Oh, I See!"

Theme: Jesus turned the water into wine as the first of his signs. A sign is something that points beyond itself to a greater reality. We are told that after this sign, the disciples believed. They had an "aha" moment. The identity of Jesus was being revealed to them and they had a new understanding of what it means to follow him.

January 23, 3rd Sunday after Epiphany

Scripture: Nehemiah 8:1-3 5-6, 8-10

*Luke 4:14-20

Sermon Title: "Jesus' First Sermon"

Theme: What would it be like to have been personally present when Jesus gave his first sermon? We can't go back in time to hear it. But we can look at what is recorded in Luke about that first sermon. What does it reveal about Jesus and God? Let's listen in!.

January 30, 4th Sunday after Epiphany

Scriptures:

*Jeremiah 1:4-10

1 Corinthians 13:1-13

Sermon Title: "God Loves Throwing Lead Passes"

Theme: A lead pass in football is when the quarterback throws a pass, not to where the receiver is, but to where the receiver will be when the ball gets there. The receiver has to keep running toward the right place and trust that the ball will be there when he gets there. God does the same thing with those he calls to do his work. We keep going in the direction that God has sent us, trusting that God's resources and help will meet us at the right place.

"A compass helps us travel with confidence in the right direction. If it doesn't, you need a new compass."

We know what a compass is. We remember from scouting or summer camp seeing the little, round, hand-held compass with the glass-covered needle that sort of pointed north. That is a simple magnetic compass.

Now you might think that since the modern world has fewer and fewer unexplored areas, the use of the compasses would decline. The opposite is actually true. Ships and planes use a

sophisticated form of compass. So do moving companies, farmers, loggers, civil engineers, surveyors, mining companies and Navy SEALs.

There are lots of different kinds of compasses in addition to magnetic compasses. There is the gyrocompass that uses a gyroscope in conjunction with the Earth's axis of rotation to point to true north. There is the solar compass that uses the sun as a navigational tool. But what is most important to us as Christians is the moral compass.

Jesus Christ and scripture are the needle on our moral compass that points to true north and keeps our lives and our actions moving in the right direction. When airplane pilots are flying through clouds, they have to keep checking their navigational gauges (compass). If a pilot does not pay attention to the navigational gauges, he or she will soon be off course and unable to find the airport. The same is true for us with our moral compasses. The clouds of stress and the chaos of the many voices in our society can easily get us off course.

I recently read that navigators in both planes and ships that are carrying a lot of ferrous material must make adjustments to their instruments because ferrous material throws their instruments out of true. In the same way, the society around us can affect our moral compasses. We think that we are on the right track, but our moral compass is being adversely affected by those around us. It is therefore necessary, to keep looking to scripture and the model of Jesus Christ to keep our moral compass in the right adjustment.

As we enter a new year, let us commit to keep our moral compasses in right adjustment by taking the time and making the time to be faithful in prayer, Bible study, and worship.

It has been said that, "If you don't know where you are going, any road will get you there." The corollary to that is that if you do have a destination, then it is important to travel on the right road. As Christians we do have a destination, we are seeking to walk in God's way and to follow Jesus Christ in this life and the next.

Let's keep our moral compass in right adjustment so that we can move forward in this new year with confidence that we are going in the right direction.


