First Presbyterian Church Session Agenda Wednesday August 18, 2021 5:30 p.m.



- Treasurer's report shows us \$26, 672 ahead of budget.
- -Sound and video system cost about \$20,000. We received \$10,000 from Presbytery and \$2,500 from individuals.
- -Wayne has filed the paper work and our \$16,000 Payroll Protection Loan has been forgiven. Thank you, Wayne!
- -Received a request for a work camp in 2022.
- -Rally day for Sunday School will be September 12 with breakfast at 9:30 a.m. Youth will lead worship that day.
- -Fall Festival will be October 24th
- -Approved \$1,000 college scholarship for Ashleigh Burnett.
- -Feedback on new video and sound system is very positive. Special thanks to Bryon and Ginger and Wayne, Bradley, Quentin, Terra and Jason for their good work in learning this new system.
- -We will resume fellowship and coffee hour after church beginning in October.
- -The city's Winter Fest Committee would like to arrange a tour of churches during their festival on December 4. Each church would welcome visitors and provide 30 minutes of entertainment. We are interested in doing this and await further details.
- -We have scheduled church work/ cleaning days for August 28 and September 11.
- -The property committee reports that we have had some water problems in the McClelland rooms. We are looking into solutions.
- We are currently having our water tested for lead content.
- We will advertise on Facebook to give away the piano in McClelland 2.
- -The laundromat ministry is going well. Each team is taking one Thursday a month. We need one more team to fill out the month. If you can help with this important ministry, please let Pastor John know.
- -Approved the request of Jeanne Harris for use of Sanctuary and Westminister Hall for the wedding of her daughter Terri Harris and Matthew Wycoff on January 8, 2022 2 p.m.
- -Plans are under way to host the Presbytery's Small Church Conference on Saturday, September 18. Session approved a budget of \$200 to cover cost of refreshments and miscellaneous items. It shouldn't cost that much, but we wants First Presbyterian to shine for the conference!
- -Approved the request from Kassandra Todd and Michael Hunt to have wedding and reception here on Saturday, November 6.
- -Set the date for congregational meeting to elect officers this fall for after church on Sunday, October 31.
- -Clarksburg Historical Society has put in for a work group from AmeriCorps to come work on their building for a three week period sometime between October 27 - December 19. They are requesting permission for the work group to stay here, use our showers and kitchen. We would not be responsible for anything other than that. The group would be between 8 and 10 people including work supervisors. We would like to be able to host this group, but we need definite dates before making that commitment.

-We will be hosting the Presbytery meeting on November 13, 2021. We will need lots of volunteers for that day. Please mark the date on your calendar.

JOHN'S JOTTINGS



Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. ... Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. (Romans 12:17, 21)

The war in the Holy Land seems to go on forever. Generation after generation, the Israelis and the Palestinians have killed each other. The hate and the bitterness grow and it seems like peace is impossible. That is why stories like this one that was published in "The Wired Word" for this week hit us so powerfully. If there is ever to be peace, it will be because of people like those in this story.

For her 50th birthday, Israeli Idit Harel Segal didn't want any presents. Instead, she wanted to give a gift to someone else. She finally decided to donate a kidney to give someone another chance at life.

Initially, Segal thought her kidney would go to a 54-year-old Jewish father of two, but it didn't work out. It turned out that she was a match for a 3-year-old child, which pleased her, because she is a preschool teacher. She was not deterred when she learned that the boy was from Gaza. "A kid is a kid," she said.

One of Segal's first preschool students, Oz, had become a soldier; he was killed seven years ago in battles in Gaza. Before she proceeded with the donation, she talked it over with Oz's father, Ofer, out of concern that her decision to donate a kidney to a Palestinian boy might cause him distress.

"[Oz is] your son," Segal said tearfully, "but I call him my child. I lost a child in [Gaza] ..., but on the other hand I'm giving life to a child [in Gaza]." Ofer cradled her in his arms and kissed her on the head.

"Just because my son was killed in Gaza doesn't mean I now hate the Palestinians and the Gazans," he whispered gently.

A day before the operation was scheduled, Segal's father called to wish her luck. Only then did she tell him the recipient of her kidney would be a Palestinian toddler from Gaza who had been born with a congenital kidney defect. He had required dialysis his whole short life.

"Well," Segal's father said, "he needs life, also."

It was a stunning admission, considering that her paternal grandparents had been killed by Palestinian terrorists in Jerusalem in 1948, leaving her father orphaned at the age of 1. Then in 2002, her father's adoptive uncle was killed in another terror attack in the capital.

The day of the surgeries, Segal met the boy and his family, whose names were withheld at their request. The boy's father told Segal that Israeli bombs had destroyed their home in May, rendering the family homeless. But he still went ahead with his decision to donate one of his own kidneys to Tal Ferguson, a 25-year-old Israeli mother of two. The operations all took place on June 16.

Segal brought gifts to the boy, caressed him, sang Hebrew lullabies to him and told him she loved him.

"You don't know me, but soon we'll be very close because my kidney will be in your body," Segal wrote to the boy, adding that she hoped he would live "a long and healthy and meaningful life."

The boy's condition was touch and go for a while, but eventually his condition stabilized. Segal's heart pounded the next time she visited him.

"In a way, he's like my kid," Segal asserted. "I've even got a mark to prove it. The big opening where they remove the kidney, it's like a C-section, like a birth."

Later, Segal met Ferguson, the woman who had received a kidney from the boy's father. Ferguson was amazed that he had given a part of himself "with no regard to religion, race, gender."

As Segal pondered the unlikely new relationships that were being forged between people who should have been enemies, she commented, "I threw away the anger and frustration and see only one thing. I see hope for peace and love. And if there will be more like us, there won't be anything to fight over."

"Not a day goes by that I'm not happy about saving the life of that sweet child," Segal reflected, happy that she saved a life. "What could be better than that?" she asked, flashing a sunny smile.

God bless the peacemakers and those whose love overcomes the hate of the world!
