As a young woman, Barb never had any connection to backyard auto mechanics, nor any interest in cars whatsoever until she met and married her husband Jack. Then, she set off on the road to appreciating and loving automobiles.

Jack was a long-time employee of GM. He sparked Barb's interest by buying a 1931 Chevy Roadster and having her work on it with him in the garage. From Jack, Barb learned the difference between crescent wrenches and open ended along with the feeling of accomplishment of getting an old car running again. They later worked together to restore a prize winning 1935 Chevy Tudor that Barb still owns today.

Throughout her marriage while raising two daughters and one son, Barb and Jack gathered an eclectic collection of cars. She still owns a 1936 Cord, 1941 Packard, 1955 Chevy and 1961 Impala, and 1982 Corvette.
