Member Spotlight Gene Jacobs

This month's Gazette features a new member, an intuitive admirer of old cars, Gene Jacobs who joined the Gateway Buick Club just this year. His collection of Buicks, a 1931 Model 86 Victoria coupe and a 1941 Model 46 S are dear to his heart. He also still owns the 1948 F-1 pickup truck that his dad bought him for his first car.

Gene was born in Robertsville, MO on a farm that his grandfather bought in 1938 as an extra property for his nine children to have fun running around and do work at the same time. Five of these siblings have built houses and remained on

the property called "the Compound". After the war, Gene's father and Grandpa started a small body shop in nearby St. Clair that even did some modifications on cars. Of course, Gene hung out there starting at age 4. When starting school, his teacher was amazed at his vocabulary as she asked what his interests were. He told her about all the carburetors, camshafts, pistons, and cylinder heads he watched being worked on at the family business.

The shop closed in 1960 and Gene's Jacob family unit moved to Dogtown in St. Louis where he graduated high school from Southwest. He took additional classes at O Fallon Tech during high school in a machine shop and there he found his calling. Gene's grandfather was also a machinist for Anheuser Busch. The Jacob patriarch was such gear head he would talk mechanical engineering while playing pinochle.

In 1972, a low draft number descended upon Gene. He had to decide on what wing of the military to join. He applied to the US Navy for duty as a machinist on the fleet. He easily passed a test he was given due to his formative years' experience at home and school. At the age of 19, he was thrilled to be overseeing the power sources for a destroyer off the coast of Vietnam. This experience gave him great skills and confidence for his future. After his stint in the Navy, Gene went to UMSL to finish a degree in Business so he could also work in sales for machine shop tool distribution. He stayed in that field for forty-two years.

Moving to California with his job for some years, Buicks came into his life. Gene remembers the sound of his uncle's '52 Super's straight-eight engine. That silky smooth idle drew him to the Buick badge.

In 1988 Gene bought a 1941 Buick Sedanette SSE and began restorative work on it. But the "Super Equipped" car was quite ragged and just not up to par mechanically creating a larger challenge than Gene had time for.

As fate would have it in car karma, a friend spied an ad for a 1941 model S Buick sedan at an estate sale in San Diego. Gene decided to only "look" at the car stored for 20 years in an old apartment building built in the early 1900s. When he saw all the original documentation and receipts stuck up in a sun visor, Gene surrendered to own what he calls—an automotive "time capsule". The '41 SSE was then turned loose to drive away with another owner.

As he looked the car over, he found the original owner's sunglasses and driving gloves under the seat and drivers' license in the glove box. When he opened the trunk, he found an original can of Mobil Oil that had rusted open and dripped oil all over the mat preserving it from dry rot. He nicknamed the car "Harry" after its long-gone owner.

Gene learned basic auto mechanics as a young'un and harkens back to the day when everyone worked on their cars for simple economics. He enjoyed taking one year to get this pristine original Special running well and tuning its "compound carburetors", a predecessor to the dual carbs on muscle cars and hot rods today.

In 1993 Gene moved back to Missouri and as any car guy will do, started perusing Hemmings. He looked off and on for another Buick that would just be a fun car to ride around in the neighborhood. Finally, in 2000 he spied an ad from a collectible car dealer in Fenton, Mo. for a 1931 model 86 Victoria coupe completely restored. It was transported from a car museum in Oregon and put up for sale at Exotica Motors. This coupe was the first year of the big Straight 8 Buick engines with a small 124" wheelbase. So, it was indeed a little hot rod and fulfilled the fun factor in taking rides to the ice cream store!

Seven years ago, Gene met his soul mate Tracy and they make up a most congenial couple at our club meetings. They are volunteering to sell Lottery tickets for additional proceeds at the September Regional and also focus on doing this for other charitable groups such as the Route 66 Club in St. Clair and the Backstoppers.

In retirement, Gene bought his aunt's house on the land of his family's farm and moved back to the "compound" in Robertsville where he was born. Gene enjoys the club's camaraderie and wealth of knowledge in its membership. In conclusion, Gene remarks that the toolbox should always be in the trunk. Old cars are a link to the people in the past who drove them. And the precision of their classic designs should always be admired and respected.

Memories on Main Street - Car Show

August 7 turned out to be a near perfect day to hold the annual Memories on Main St. Car Show in downtown Troy, Missouri. Attending from the Gateway Buick Club were Chet Palumbo, Mark and Sheree Kistner and Ted Becker. Meeting at the Walmart parking lot in Troy, the trio of Buicks caravanned to the venue. Girls Can Fix Cars Too

Ed. Note: At a previous meeting, Monica told a very interesting story about the fuel door on her Avalon. It was really quite resourceful how she had created a work around for her problem. The story inspired Bob Brasses to do some research to diagnose and resolve her issue. Herewith is her story and the path to resolving the problem.

1999 AVALON FUEL DOOR MALFUNCTION OR HOW TO GAS UP

YOUR CAR WHEN FUEL DOOR WONT FLIP

Upon Member Check-in during the June Meeting at Sports Café, Monica Ledwon reported that she experienced the failure of her '99 Avalon's fuel door to flip open. Odd things go wrong with old cars. And it took three heads put together to solve the problem.

Woody Smith--Monica's visiting friend from Florida. After hanging up the pump, Monica hightailed it to his house and hailed him away from his grass cutting. After examination, Wood discovered, when Monica held the flipper switch up steadily, it allowed him to manually pop the fuel door open. He then lubricated every working part and hinge to no avail. Monica headed home and figured out she could replicate this operation by utilizing a 5 ft. dog leash. Wrapping the handle to interior fuel door flipper switch and pulling it up while walking the few steps back to the fuel door she was able to gas up by herself. A temporary fix.

Bob Brasses—Upon hearing this story during the Member Update, Bob's mechanical brain gears started spinning. A day or so later he sent Monica a picture of his daily driver '03 Avalon's fuel door. He pointed out there is a V-shaped pinch clip on the left attached to the hinge. His theory was that mine was not functioning, broken, or perhaps had fallen off. Bob even found an Amazon listing of where I could buy a replacement clip. A very kind gesture on his part to analyze and research this repair for me.

Monica Ledwon— Monica compared Bob's pinch clip photo to her own Avalon and discovered, it was indeed missing. She brought Bob's exploded view to Seegar Toyota and with old car karma by her side, the parts department had one such clip at the price of \$10. She then set up an appointment with Woody in his driveway to accomplish this repair.

The Process—Always an exploration when working on the install of a new part on an old car. This is explained in step-by step-photos of the job.

Photo Number 1 – the clip on a white Camry, the Smith's family car for reference.





Photo Number 2 - '99 Avalon's clip missing the front part of the 'V'. The back part still attached to hinge rod.

Photo Number 3 – With a struggle and different sizes of screwdrivers, Wood was able to pry off the broken clip half, Note scratches on fuel door metal. I'm thankful for Wood's hand strength to wrestle his adversary into submission.





Photo Number 4 – New clip was installed but not easily. The part fought Woody until he was able to slide it onto the hinge rod by partially closing the fuel door at the same time.

Resolution – The fuel door now opens with such force it can cause anyone standing nearby a slap on the butt!

My Life with Cars

As you read this issue of the Gazette, Mary and I are on the last legs of our European vacation. Rome, Venice, Vienna, and Croatia. Hope it all goes the way I have planned it. In my absence, Chet Palumbo and Monica Ledwon have stepped in to complete this issue. Thank you to both of you.

How did I become interested and fascinated with cars? Well, it started probably by the age of 5 when I impressed my mom and dad by being able to identify virtually every car on the road. Unlike many of you, I did not inherit this from my dad. I loved him dearly and he was very good to me in my formative years, but he had no interest in cars or anything mechanical. He and his brother were insurance agents. They carried the insurance for Wagner Buick, so they faithfully only owned Buicks. I used to say that he was over his head washing screens. An exaggeration for sure, but not by much. He would occasionally have to replace those old faucet washers and always ended up calling a plumber to finish the task. Illinois at the time had both front and rear license plates that were newly issued each year. Dad would get his new plates and take them to Wagner Buick to have them install the plates for him.

When my dad died in 1995, we helped my mom clean out the house as she was moving to Texas with my sister. The only tools I inherited at that time were a few well worn screwdrivers, a pair of pliers and an old Ford Monkey wrench left over from my grandfather.

As I approached the age of 16, my desire to drive a car was almost painfully strong. I thought about it constantly and began washing and waxing my dad's 58 Buick Roadmaster 75 4 door hardtop. If you've ever waxed a big Buick with Simonize car wax, you can appreciate what a big job that can be. I studied shop manuals from the library for his Buick to better gain knowledge of the mechanics of the car.

Tires at the time were those god-awful bias ply tires that only lasted 30,000 miles and were subject to blowouts. We were on vacation going to Canada when I was 15 and we were going through Elyria, Ohio. Right in a stretch of highway that was elevated and narrow with guard rails on each side, the left rear tire blew out. I jumped out of the car, emptied the trunk, and got the bumper jack and spare tire out. Traffic was pretty heavy at the time, and I was changing that tire with my hind end right on the outside lane marker. Cars whizzing by at 60 MPH (or whatever) made it a pretty harrowing experience. No harm, no foul, but I think about that every once in a while, thinking of the old saying that "the Lord loves a fool."

Fast forward a few years and it was time to spend some of my hard-earned money from my job as a busboy and buy my own car. After extensive searching, I found a 56 Ford 2 door sedan

with a 223 CID 6 cylinder in Millstadt, Illinois. The car was a 3 on the tree and I had never driven a stick shift before. I pretty much knew how it all worked, so I was confident that I could drive the car home. Well, it was raining that day and the tires were about as bald as Telly Savalas's head. I was doing OK until I got back home into Belleville and got stopped at a stop light on a hill. PANIC!!!! There was no emergency brake, so I had to give it some gas and let the clutch out without stalling the engine. After a few unsuccessful attempts and having an ever-increasing line of impatient cars behind me, I panicked and gave it a whole lot of gas and let out the clutch. All that got me was 2 rear tires spinning. After a few more attempts, I finally was successful.

My savings account was now lighter by the \$50 it took to buy the car, but new tires were an absolute necessity. So off to the Firestone dealer for a full set of recaps to the tune of \$62.50. Now my savings account was really thin, but I was frugal and replenished it in due course.

I was always working and tinkering on the car learning as I went along. I got good at changing points and setting timing with a timing light I borrowed from one of my friends. I even went so far as to change the pinion seal on the differential, which was a real chore.

The car burned a lot of oil and would die on me from time to time. I never did find out why it would die, but I convinced myself that the engine needed to come apart. I bought a set of Thorsen sockets with a ratchet and breaker bar from the local auto parts store and off I went.

The engine was a 6 cylinder, and I was able to remove the splash pans and stand on the ground next to the engine. The cylinder head came off without too much difficulty. I had much more testosterone back then and much stronger, so I was able to lift that heavy cylinder head and set it down on the floor.

Next step was to remove the valves. I had no spring compressor (obviously) so I had to figure out a way to remove the valve keepers. I cleaned off an area in the garage about 8 feet in diameter to give me some room and to be able to find the keepers as they came flying out. I took a large socket and put it on the top of the spring retainer and hit it with a hammer. After a few attempts, the keepers would come out and go flying around the garage. Fortunately, I was able to find all the keepers and did not lose a one.

I next pulled the pan and removed the piston and rod assemblies. I got new rings and bearings and set about putting it back together. I was young and stupid and did not realize the cylinders needed to be honed, so that step was not conducted. First step was to get the rings compressed so the piston would fit in the cylinder. Buying a ring compressor was a bit out of my budget and I did not know anyone who had one for my use. What to do – What to do?? I walked into town and bought 3 sets of shoestrings at the local shoe store. When I got home, I took one of the shoestrings and wrapped it around the ring and pulled it tight so the ring would compress. Starting with the oil ring, I dropped the piston down to where the ring was at the top of the deck

and tapped the piston with a hammer to get it into the bore. Then the lower ring and then the top ring. After a full day working and another trip to the shoe store to buy another pair of shoestrings, all the pistons were now in place. I had no torque wrench, so the rod and main cap bolts were tightened about as tight as I could get them. In retrospect, they were probably all overtightened, but – what the heck?

Now I had to put the head back together. The valves were not awful, and I surely couldn't afford a valve job, so back together it needed to go. Back into town I walked to the local hardware store, and I bought a couple of L braces like those used on those old wooden window frames. I bolted them together leaving a small opening in the middle. I took the legs of the L brackets in my hand and put it on the top of the spring retainer and put my weight on it to compress the spring. I had my sister (who was about 12 at the time) put the keepers in place. It all worked!!

At the end of all of this, I got the car started and had it back on the road. What a feeling of accomplishment that was!!


Over the years, I've self-taught myself many other mechanical tasks and expanded by collection of tools and equipment. Excepting the years while I was working for Ford and racing stock cars, I have always worked alone. Through the necessity, I think I've gotten pretty good at doing 2-man jobs by myself.

As I talk to all of my fellow club members and other car guys, I am almost envious of the stories I hear about them working with their dad, or their uncle, or their neighbor, in learning how to work on cars and have tools available to do the jobs. I guess I did mine the hard way, but I don't regret it for a minute. Now, if I could just get back some of that testosterone from my youth, I could really get some things done!






