<u>A Moment from Greenview's History</u> "What's in a Name?"

When Greenview was developed, Richland County named the community's main road, *Wilkes Road*. The original developers, the *Cooper Brothers*, made a decision to name the majority of the remaining streets from the Bible. Perhaps this was their way of wishing God's blessings on the new families who were making Greenview their home.

A drive through Greenview shows these Biblical street names: *Abraham, Christian, David, Delilah, Easter, Gabriel, Isaac, Luke, Mark, Martha, Paul, Ruth, and Samson*. Names with spiritual roots include *Alida, Armour, Benedict, Jasmine, and Rosebud*.

Farrow Road was once called **Asylum Road**, because it was used primarily to transport patients to the mental health and tuberculosis hospitals located in the State Park Community. It was named in honor of **Samuel Farrow** (1759-1824), a former lawyer and legislator who championed the rights and needs of the mentally ill. In 1817, the state started an ambitious public works effort to address these vulnerable populations and renamed the road in Farrow's honor to recognize his leadership on this issue.
