Principal's Corner

I would like to thank all the families, teachers and staff members that are supporting the formation of our School Equity Committee. There is an article in this newsletter (see page 4) with more information about what we are doing and our next steps. The need for this committee is evident by our data from multiple sources, such as PSSA data, misconduct data, Tripod Surveys, Panorama Surveys and Academic data. In order for us to embody our Mission and Vision we need to address underlying issues and this committee is one strategy we will use to help bring our Vision and Mission to fruition.

Vision

All Pittsburgh Liberty students will demonstrate academic excellence and self-efficacy to impact their school, community, and world.

Mission

All students attending Pittsburgh Liberty will have a strong academic foundation of learning built on collaboration, communication, critical thinking, creativity, and strength of character in a safe, supportive environment. We will support students to become active, compassionate, global thinkers through the study of Spanish language and culture.

Instructional Focus

A school-wide effort to have all Pittsburgh Liberty students show measurable growth in written expression as measured by PSSAs, content-specific writing prompts, PPS Comprehension Performance Assessments and Mathematics Exemplars.

Our Internal Goal 85% of our students will demonstrate proficiency in written expression in all components of identified scoring guidelines with 15% showing growth.

Student Council

Elections are right around the corner and are scheduled to occur the week of November 3 so that they coincide with Pennsylvania's election day. Ms. Bender has been kind enough to



sponsor our student council on top of her teaching schedule. Our Student Council is made up of:

- President 5th Grade
- Vice-President 4th Grade
- Secretary 5th Grade
- Treasurer 4th Grade
- Homeroom representatives.

Students can nominate themselves for positions. They give a speech either to their whole grade level for officer positions or their homeroom for homeroom representatives, then elections are held in homerooms. Student Council meetings are normally during lunch and recess or sometimes during the teacher's prep period. The student council officers



decide when they will meet. Ms. Jerabek ran Student Council last year and Ms. Bender picked it up this year.

Last year, our Student Council accomplished a lot. The re-started student council at Liberty and held several fundraisers and food drives that benefitted the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank, a local nursing home, and a homeless shelter. The students also sponsored a pizza lunch for our staff during Teacher Appreciation Week.

Uniform Policy

I am hearing there is some confusion around the uniform policy at Liberty. The policy, as stated in our handbook, is:

Everyday Uniform:

Pants, shorts, skirts and jumpers must be navy blue or khaki. Shirts and blouses must have a collar and be a plain solid color. All

Spirit Wear clothing sold by LEAF or clubs can be worn as a piece of the uniform.

Gym Days:

Students must wear rubber soled tennis shoes to participate in gym class.

Sweaters and sweatshirts

Sweaters and jackets are permitted as long as they are a plain solid color. A Liberty sweatshirt with the Liberty logo or emblem is also acceptable.
