## Principal's Corner

Welcome Back! The start of this school year has gone very well. All the work we have done over the past several years is really starting to yield better results for our school community.

As many of you know, we have been using PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports) as a way to prevent negative behaviors and support students in making better choices. Below, you will find our WHY, WHEN and HOW we teach our expectations.

#### Why we teach our school expectations:

- Refreshes the school rules and procedures with students
- Reminds students what expectations are
- Can apply to all students in class without "blaming" them for doing anything wrong or bad
- Non-threatening
- Takes the "blame" off the teacher or authority figure for having to follow rules and expectations.
- It is something all students are already familiar with, so no new teaching needs to take place, which makes it fast and more easily comprehended
- Going over the rules and expectations multiple times reinforces good behavior choices

#### When we teach our school expectations:

- 1. When a student, students, group, or class are not following PBIS rules and expectations
- 2. When the class or school seems to be "slipping" in following through PBIS expectations
- 3. Midway through the year, or long breaks, as a refresher and to help start back after a break on a positive foot
- 4. On a regular basis as part of classroom management, for example, reviewing one PBIS rule or expectation per week

#### How do we teach our expectations:

- 1. Use a calm, neutral, non-threatening tone
- 2. Do short lessons, demonstrations, and discussions on PBIS concepts, routine, expectations, etc. on a weekly, daily, and/or monthly basis
- 3. Randomly call on students to state specific PBIS expectations or concepts, then reward them with a small treat, for example, "Suzy, how are we supposed to line up for recess?"

4. As part of regular redirection, for example, "start your assignment and work quietly to respect others who are working" or "make sure to wash your hands after using the restroom"

This year we added onto our <u>Positive Referral System</u> that we started at the beginning of last year by mailing postcards home to parents when their child receives a "Soaring Eagle" ticket when they are "caught" being Respectful, being Responsible, or achieving Academic Excellence. When students receive a Soaring Eagle ticket, they come to the office to be congratulated, pick a number for a raffle, and receive a small reward.

When students make a negative choice, consequences may be assigned. We use a progressive system that aligns with the infraction a student has done. We have lunch, recess, after-school, and Saturday detention, but we really work to limit recess detention. As a part of Restorative Practices, the student may need to give back to the school community through service work. We also try to avoid Out of School Suspension but for reasons of safety, a student may receive an out of school suspension.

We are looking forward to a wonderful school year and hope to see you at one of our many events!

## Planning the year ahead: LEAF, PSCC, and the Equity Committee

There are several ways for parents and teachers to get involved at Liberty and support the school community. The primary groups with this purpose are:

- PSCC: Run by the school. Discusses governance and curriculum.
- <u>LEAF</u>: Run by parents. Traditionally, LEAF plans events, raises funds, and provides parents a voice for advocacy.

On the third Wednesday of every month of the school year, PSCC and LEAF meetings are held back-to-back at 5PM and 6PM, respectively (with a break for a FREE dinner in between!).

In the past year, PSCC and LEAF have collaborated often—most recently on a joint venture, the Equity Committee. In February and May of this last school year, we teamed up and started a conversation to address the very real opportunity gap that exists for students in our school and across the district (a helpful video on the topic is at <a href="https://bit.lv/opportunity-gap">bit.lv/opportunity-gap</a>).

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This school year we are continuing our work on this important issue. On Wednesday, September 18th we began creating a mission and a vision for the Liberty Equity Committee. We discussed the reasons WHY we need an equity committee at Liberty and brainstormed WHAT the equity committee can and will do to build and create a more equitable space for all of our children to learn in. We welcome all members of the Liberty community (teachers, parents, staff, grandparents, guardians) to join us when we continue this process and generate our plans for the coming year at the October PSCC and LEAF meetings on Wed. Oct. 16, 5pm-7pm, School Library.
