A PRAYER FROM THE EMMANUEL MOLEBEN:

O God and Father, the Almighty One, you created the human race in your image and likeness, and when we fell through disobedience, you promised to send a Savior. 2020 ANNUAL BISHOP'S APPEAL: Our parish goal is the same as last year at \$10,800. However, if we reach or exceed our goal as we did last year, the parish will receive a rebate of 40% of that total after the campaign has concluded. **So far, 18 families have contributed \$5,450!** (as of Dec. 14) It is suggested that if each family contributes \$200, then we will meet our goal. THE PHILLIPS FAST & CHRISTMAS EVE DAY: As with any period of fasting, if we have forgotten or have been lax we may always take up more strict fasting closer to the Feast Day. Also, The Vigil of Christmas or Christmas Eve Day is traditionally a day of Strict Fast, meaning no meat or dairy is to be consumed. This, however, is not currently an aspect of our Particular Law of the Byzantine Catholic Metropolia of Pittsburgh, PA, but is suggested for the faithful to undertake this traditional practice.

NOTE ON CHRISTMAS SERVICES: The Royal Hours are a combination of the Daily Hours (part of the Divine Office), but are made festive and specific for each of the 3 major Feasts: Nativity, Theophany, and Pascha. We will celebrate this service in the morning, which may take 2 hours. The Vespers with the Dine Liturgy of St. Basil is the appropriate service for Christmas Eve and is then followed by Great Compline. Last year, we celebrated these backwards, but fear not, this year we have them in the correct order. They are to be celebrated back to back and are considered as one long service (really 3-in-1), even though we have them scheduled at specifit hours. If families choose, they may leave after the Divine Liturgy, but please note that Mirovanija (the reception of the blessed bread and anointing with the blessed oil) will not take place until it has been blessed at the Service of the Litija in the Great Compline. The Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom will be celebrated Christmast Morning. Either the Evening Vigil Liturgy or the morning Christmas Liturgy fulfill the obligation.

COVID-19 VACCINES: IMPORTANT TALKING POINTS

MINOR IMPACT: Vaccine manufacturers claim that Covid-19 vaccines are 95 percent "effective," but the FDA is allowing companies to define effectiveness as "prevention of mild symptoms." The studies are not designed to detect a reduction in outcomes such as severe illness, hospitalization or death. ^{1,2} For individuals who develop severe symptoms, the vaccine is not a remedy. Instead, nutritional and oxidative support can help keep the illness from going into "overdrive." ³

EXPECT ADVERSE REACTIONS: Participants in every Covid-19 vaccine trial have reported adverse reactions including high fever, chills, muscle pains and headaches. ⁴⁻⁶ Some have even reported severe reactions that required hospitalization and invasive treatment. According to the FDA, potential long-term effects may include Guillain-Barré syndrome, brain swelling, muscle weakness and paralysis, convulsions and seizures, stroke, narcolepsy, shock, heart attack, autoimmune disease, arthritis and joint pain, multisystem inflammatory syndrome in children, and death. ⁷ Some UK health workers have experienced anaphylactic shock after receiving one dose of the approved vaccine. ⁸

WON'T PREVENT COVID-19: An FDA Pfizer briefing paper published December 10, 2020 revealed 43 percent more suspected cases of Covid-19 in the vaccinated group than in the placebo group within seven days of vaccination.⁹

NO LIABILITY: Covid-19 vaccine manufacturers will be protected from all liability—if you are injured, you cannot sue. ¹⁰ Manufacturers will have complete indemnity even though all previous attempts at creating coronavirus vaccines caused harm and never advanced to regulatory approval. ¹¹

WILL NOT END RESTRICTIVE MEASURES: Dr. Anthony Fauci of the National Institutes of Health acknowledges that the vaccines may prevent symptoms but will not block spread of the virus, so vaccine recipients will still need to wear masks, practice social distancing and avoid crowds. 12,13

NOT NECESSARY: According to the CDC's current best estimate, the "infection fatality rate" (IFR) for Covid-19 is less than 1 percent for people age 69 and younger, including a .003 percent IFR for children and adolescents.¹⁴

COULD MAKE YOU STERILE: Two prominent doctors, including the ex-head of Pfizer's respiratory research, warn that Covid-19 vaccines contain a spike protein called syncytin-1, vital for the formation of the placenta.¹⁵ If the vaccine triggers an immune response to this protein, then female infertility, miscarriage or birth defects could result.

Moral Guidance Regarding Vaccines and COVID-19

With the prospect of the FDA approving one (or more) COVID-19 vaccines within the next few weeks, many questions have been raised regarding the ethical status of these vaccines (particularly questioning whether embryonic stem cells or tissue from aborted fetuses were used in their creation, and whether Catholics can morally receive such vaccines). The following is a brief moral analysis to help provide you some guidance when these questions arise. Be mindful that this analysis is dependent on current information, and therefore could change once more information is released. It has only been within the last few days that the findings of some of the vaccines have been submitted to the FDA for approval, so more information will be forthcoming in the upcoming weeks as the government and independent researchers have access to data.

At this point, it appears as if the vaccine created by **Pfizer/Biontech**, along with the vaccine created by **Moderna** *have* <u>not</u> *been created using material of illicit origin* (*i.e.*, *embryonic stem cells and/or the tissue of aborted children*.) For Catholics, this is *great* news. Theologically speaking, there are no moral or religious grounds that would restrict the consciences of Catholics from receiving these vaccines.

There have been articles and press releases that affirm that, while these above vaccines were not *created* with material of illicit origin, there is good reason to believe that these vaccines may have been *tested* (post production) utilizing the tissue of aborted fetuses. These articles and statements, therefore, conclude that it is immoral to use them. This sweeping conclusion is *inconsistent with Catholic moral teaching*.

A critical question is: "Are Catholics <u>always</u> forbidden to perform an action if it touches upon evil, or cooperates, somehow, with the evil action of another?" The answer is 'no'. There *certainly* are instances when Catholics *must* refrain from immoral cooperation. However, Catholic teaching on moral cooperation makes critical distinctions (mediate/immediate, proximate/remote, etc) to determine the *degree or level to which* one cooperates in evil. In some cases, some forms of cooperation, while unfortunate, can be allowed in certain circumstances.

Unfortunately, we live in a fallen world. Dig deep enough, and one finds that many of our actions somehow touch upon evil and the evil actions of others. While the Church draws a firm line in delineating certain acts of cooperation as immoral, it does not condemn *all* actions of cooperation as such. It challenges us to be aware of evil around us, to *always* choose the option that involves less evil (or no evil), and to speak and challenge others to desist from evil. It is for this reason that the Church, in the early months of vaccine development for COVID 19, boldly challenged (and continues to challenge) researchers and the medical industry to seek moral means of vaccine production (and to reject the use of material of illicit origin that involved the destruction of unborn life).

Regarding the previous statement regarding the immorality of taking the vaccine because of immoral post-production testing, or even statements from some bishops that have forbidden vaccines derived from material of illicit origin, the following paragraph from *Dignitas Personae*, issued from the CDF under Pope Benedict XVI, offers critical (and perhaps surprising) conclusions. In speaking of the use of embryonic stem cell lines or the tissue of aborted children, the document states in no. 35: "Grave reasons may be morally proportionate to justify the use of such 'biological material'. Thus, for example, danger to the health of children could permit parents to use a vaccine which was developed using cell lines of illicit origin, while keeping in mind that everyone has the duty to make known their disagreement and to ask that their healthcare system make other types of vaccines available." While the statement uses the example of the danger to the health of children, the dangers of COVID-19 particularly to our vulnerable elderly or those with compromised health could reasonably be presumed as grave reason for vaccination. While the Church unequivocally condemns researchers and the medical industry for the creation, production, and distribution of vaccines produced from embryonic stem cells and from the tissue of aborted children, the *receiving* of these vaccines is in another moral category.

In conclusion, at this point there appears to be no moral issues to prohibit a Catholic from receiving vaccines produced by Pfizer or Moderna. If other vaccines are released which do have recourse to material of illicit origin, Catholic moral teaching would direct Catholics to utilize the option that is least morally problematic (i.e., the vaccines that were *not* created via such immoral means). Providentially, these two listed vaccines satisfy that criteria.

NOTE FROM FR. LEWIS: As we have seen this year there are competing sets of information in which the faithful and citizens have been asked to disseminate for themselves. Supplied here are two options of information regarding possible vaccines for COVID-19. One is the moral issue from the Catholic standpoint, the other is a list of possible health issues if one takes the vaccine, which of course, may or may not be true. It has been provided to offer a balance of ideas on the subject.

It is possible we may all agree, regardless of our personal ideologies and beliefs, that these vaccines have been produced in record time with little information of how they may effect the individual long after the vaccine has been received. Bishop Kurt has reminded his clergy that we are not medical professionals, so we should allow for each person to choose for themselves what will be most helpful for their personal situation.
