Notes About Holy Week and COVID-19: Holy

Week is the most solemn and prayerful time of the liturgical calendar. We are planning to have many special services to commemorate Christ's Saving Passion and Resurrection. However, due to the unavoidable issue of the COVID-19 virus, Fr. Lewis has petitioned Bishop Kurt to allow us to offer services outside. Bishop Kurt has informally replied that we may hold these services

outside, unless our local civil authorities have made other restrictions, an that he will give guidelines for this in the near future. Fr. Lewis hopes that the civil authorities allow those of us who wish to, publicly gather to celebrate these important feasts in person, or to at least participate in them from home via Live-Stream.

Since Great and Holy Friday is the most solemn of these days, Fr. Lewis suggests that those who are able, should take off of work on this day, or specifically set aside the time at home, so that all can come to a deeper understanding of Christ's Passion, and keep this a day of prayer and fasting. We will have two services this day: Passion Matins in the morning, and Burial Vespers in the evening.

FURTHER DISPENSATION OF OBLIGATION: Bishop Kurt has extended the dispensation from attending the Sunday Divine Liturgy for all of the faithful of the Eparchy of Passaic through April 12, Pascha. However, he reminds the faithful that we must still keep Sunday a Holy Day.

excerpt from the Life of **Our Venerable Mother Mary of Egypt**

Many days passed and at last recovering from his illness he remained in the monastery. And when attain the monks returned and the day of the Last Supper dawned, he did as he had been ordered. and placing some of the most pure Body and Blood into a small chalice and putting some figs and dates and lentils soaked in water into a small basket, he departed for the desert and reached the banks of the Jordan and sat down to wait for the saint. He waited for a long while and then began to doubt. then raising his eyes to heaven, he began to pray: "Grant me O Lord, to behold that which Thou hast allowed be to behold once. do not let me depart in vain, being the burden of my sins." And then another thought struck him: "And what if she does come? There is no boat; how will she cross the Jordan to come to me who am so unworthy?" And as he was pondering thus he saw the holy woman appear and stand on the other side of the river. Zosima got up rejoicing and glorifying and thanking God. And again the thought came to him that she could not cross the Jordan. Then he saw that she made the sign of the Cross over the waters of the Jordan (and the night was a moonlight one, as he related afterwards) and then she at once stepped on to the waters and began walking across the surface towards him. And when he wanted to prostrate himself, she cried to him while still walking on the water: "What are you doing, Abba, you are a priest and carrying the divine Gifts!" He obeyed her and on reaching the shore she said to the elder: "Bless, father, bless me!" He answered her trembling, for a state of confusion had overcome him at the sight of the miracle: "Truly God did not lie when He promised that when we purify ourselves we shall be like Him. Glory to Thee, Christ our God, Who has shown me through this thy slave how far away I stand from perfection." Here the woman asked him to say the Creed and our Father. He began, she finished the prayer and according to the custom of that time gave him the kiss of peace on the lips. Having partaken of the Holy Mysteries, she raised her hands to heaven and sighed with tears in her eyes, exclaiming: "Now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, O Lord, according to Thy word; for my eyes have seen Thy salvation."

Yes, O Lord and King, let me see my own sins, and not judge my brothers and sisters; for you are blessed forever and ever. Amen. (*Prostration*)

LITURGICAL NOTES

A **bow** is an inclination of the head at the shoulders while making the sign of the cross.

"To make a great bow or prostration" means to make the sign of the cross, kneel, and then touch the forehead to the floor. Those who cannot make a full prostration may make a profound bow, touching the floor with the fingers and making a sign of the cross on themselves.

OFFICE OF THE BISHOP

To the faithful of the Eparchy of Passaic:

On March 16, all public services in the Eparchy of Passaic were cancelled through March 29, and the people were dispensed from the obligation to attend the Eucharist on Sundays.

Now all the faithful are DISPENSED from the obligation to attend the Eucharist on Sunday through April 12, that is, Pascha or Easter Sunday. Please remember that the Bishop cannot dispense from Divine Law. We are all bound by Divine Law to keep holy the Lord's Day by prayer and avoiding unnecessary work.

From now the PUBLIC SERVICES ARE SUSPENDED INSIDE CHURCHES through April 4, that is, Flowery Sunday or Palm Sunday. However, the parish may livestream a service without the public present. A parish may have a service in the parking lot or a large open area outside, provided that permission is given by the local government, and the recommendations of the medical experts are followed. However, please respect local sentiment as well. In the more densely populated areas, many people are in a state of panic.

Baptisms, weddings, and funerals may be celebrated with the immediate family provided that there are no more than ten people total, as requested by our President.

Priests may celebrate the Eucharist, even with no one in attendance, and the pastor is authorized to move or combine stipends for the good of the faithful.

Please pray for the medical workers and first responders in this very difficult time. Please pray for our civil authorities who are responsible for difficult decisions.

I commend you to the protection of the Archangel Michael, and especially to the care of the all holy Mother of God.
