Miniature Orchid Care

Miniature orchids, though small in size, have the same needs as their larger relatives but require closer attention due to their delicate nature. These orchids thrive in bright, indirect light, such as an east-facing window or under grow lights, where they receive steady illumination without scorching. They prefer warm, stable temperatures between 65-75°F during the day and slightly cooler at night, with humidity levels of 50-70%. Good air circulation is essential to prevent fungal issues.

Watering should be frequent but light, as their smaller pots or mounts dry out quickly. Use room-temperature, filtered, or rainwater when possible, keeping roots moist but not soggy. In general, water once or twice a week, adjusting based on potting medium and environment. Fertilize weekly at quarter strength with a balanced orchid fertilizer ("weakly, weekly"), and flush with plain water once a month to prevent salt buildup.

Because miniatures grow in small pots or on mounts, they often need repotting more frequently—every one to two years. Repot when roots crowd the container, the medium breaks down, or growth slows. Use fine-grade bark, sphagnum moss or a mix suited to the orchid's natural habitat. Handle gently, as roots are fragile.

With attentive care—light, warmth, humidity, and consistent but careful watering—miniature orchids reward growers with abundant blooms in a compact form, perfect for limited space collections.

I began growing orchids in the late 60's after several years of tagging along with my father to visit his friend's greenhouses. I received a few back bulbs from some of these folks, and a few of them lived. I was off to the races after that. Having grown up on 1800 acres of family-owned ranch land, I started working on cattle ranches in the 70's and became familiar with Florida cypress swamps. I greatly enjoyed my adventures into these wonderful swamps. They became my refuge, and I always had the sense of traveling back hundreds of years in time when I entered one of these untouched places. It was here that I was able to find many of the Florida orchid species along with native ferns and a variety of wildlife.

I have been fortunate enough to receive several AOS awards and register several of my hybrids. The greatest satisfaction for me is to have one of my hybrids awarded.



Orchid-abulary A REFRESHER ON **CATTLEYAS**

The <u>Cattleya</u> is among the most widely grown orchid. It is often referred to as the "Corsage Orchid" because of its use in bouquets and corsages.

Cattleyas are epiphytes, air plants, so they should be potted in a porous, free-draining medium. They have large, fleshy roots. New growths come from <u>eyes</u>, a bud near the base of the previous growth. The growth is attached to the <u>rhizome</u>, a thick, horizontal stem. The growths become <u>pseudobulbs</u>, well-developed water and nutrient storage organs.





There are two leaf patterns in the Cattleya family. Unifoliate Cattleyas have one leaf per pséudobulb and bifoliate varieties which have two or more leaves.



Potting should be done every 2 to 3 years. If the plant is otherwise healthy, it may not need to be divided. Soaking the plant will make it easier to remove from the pot. If it won't come out, you can cut away a plastic pot or carefully break a clay pot. Some people have even put a whole smaller pot into a larger one and backfilled the medium. As we were recently told, if part of the orchid is growing out of the pot, you can put it next to another pot with medium, and it may grow into that pot and then you can divide it.

Most growers recommend repotting just before new roots sprout from the rhizome, after flowering, or in the spring. However, if the medium is badly broken down, it may be better to risk repotting a flowering orchid.

A division should have at least three viable pseudobulbs. Discard the old medium. Clean and trim the roots. Discard shriveled pseudobulbs. Treat the plant if there are any signs of pests, fungus, or bacteria. Use cinnamon on cut areas.

Roots and rhizomes don't like to be constantly wet. They like good air circulation.

Fall Climate Data
Average high: 89.0
Average low: 75.7
Average mean: 82.4
Average rainfall: 8.38"



- Careful watering this month often means no watering at all. Water only when truly necessary.
- Space plants amply. Good air circulation is essential across the coming months.
- Re-pot Phals and reset Vandas. Make sure that plants are firmly set in their new abodes.
- Begin or continue a disease prevention program.
- Clean up growing area and plants. Remove dead leaves from plants and the ground. Prune trees and shrubs to increase light and air circulation.
- Apply snail bait lightly early in the month and again lightly mid-month.


