For those of you who are participating in our Master Grower challenge, remember to keep your Tolumnia growing.



Orchid-abulary




Adventitious growth - roots of growths that are produced from the stem or other unusual places

Alliance—a term applied to closely related orchid genera

Velamen - the white, absorbent outer layer that covers the roots.





Pseudobulb—the swollen stem of an epiphytic orchid that usually serves as a reservoir for water





Epiphyte - a plant growing nonparasitically above the ground on another plant, log, or other structure, often referred to as an 'air plant'

## **Tasks for January**

- Be prepared to protect outdoor plants from freezing temperatures.
- Spray for mites; spray again in 7-10 days.
- Many genera are entering or are in flowering season. Stake for better displays.
- Flush excess fertilizer salts from Cattleyas and other sympodials.
- Watering, fertilizing and re-potting should be kept to a minimum.
- Water early in the day.

## Why Shouldn't I Cut Those Brown Sheathes?



DO NOT CUT BROWN SHEATHS. In the photo at the left, the brown sheath is 6 months older than the green one. They both opened on the same day. Many, many cattleyas will start sheaths and then those sheaths go into a waiting, dormant period until the right blooming time for that orchid. Green sheaths may develop and all open at the same time, or sometimes there are only brown sheaths to open. I post this about once a month because we have so many new members who are tempted to keep things neat by clipping out brown sheaths. Don't do it unless you see that it is split and has bloomed. I repeat this post every few months for the newest members and in the last couple of days I have seen two posts on this topic.




