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#### President's Message

With the orchid show coming up, it's a good time to review what one needs to consider when buying an orchid.

(1) First, determine the light level where you're going to put your new orchid. Remember to keep this in



mind when you buy an orchid.

(2) Compare identical orchids and select the one with a few flowers and a bunch of buds.

(3) See if any spikes are branching. If so, that

plant will produce more flowers.

(4) Make sure the plant does not wobble. If it wobbles it may mean that the root system has died and the plant will not bloom properly.

(5) Leaves should be firm, juicy looking and have no strange pigmentation

(yellowing, spotting or black tips).

(6) Ask the vendor how long the flowers should last? What's the orchid's light level? Is the flower fragrant? How big will it grow? How often does it bloom each year?

(7) The deadly ride home: On sunny days shop early or late and go directly home. Secure your plant in the car and shade it from the sun. It's estimated that 10 percent of orchids bought by novices never make it home alive and another 10 percent suffer significant damage.

(8) The best time to repot is generally just after the plant has finished blooming and

new growth starts appearing.

(9) Finally, take the time to stock up on orchid supplies.



Each month we will feature one of our members in an effort to get to know you a little better. This month we will feature Jet Tanner




Like most of us, Jet is not a Florida native but transplanted from another part of the United States. In her case it is New York. But she has lived in Florida for almost 25 years.

Her interest in orchids started years ago when she purchased a few dendrobium and phalaenopsis from Home Depot. Her initial success sparked her interest to learn more. She found "Newbie Florida Orchid Growers" Facebook group eight years ago. Her involvement with the group has taught her a lot and she's made many new friends. A few years ago she took on the task of an administrator of the Newbie Facebook group. She became a serious orchid collector 5 years ago. She enjoys helping people learn. She joined PSLOS a few years ago and says each of the speakers has provided one of those "aha moments" giving her clues on how to be

even more successful in growing orchids.

It's pretty obvious when you walk into her screened pool enclosure that her passion is orchids. She estimates that she has about 800 plants. She collects all varieties but currently her favorite is the cattleya alliance - and most favorite myrmecocattleya. She mostly purchases her plants as seedlings rather than the larger specimens. She's perfected mounting orchids and has dozens on display. She also prefers the black plastic not pass because they give good drainings and plants. fers the black plastic net pots because they give good drainage and plenty of airflow around the roots. She uses a mixture of potting mediums and lots of charcoal but stays away from sphagnum moss. Each of her plants has an organza bag with a tablespoon of Dynamite Flower and Garden Food dangling over the top for constant fertilization.

### Tasks for April

April Climate Data Average high: 83.8

Average low: 67.6 Average mean: 75.7 Average rainfall: 3.36"

- Water heavily when you water; then dry hard.
- Fertilizer becomes more crucially important. Apply:
  - 13-13-13 time release (Dynamite more reliable);
  - 15-15-15 at a rate of 2 tsp per gallon every 2 weeks; and fertilizer high in phosphorus once or twice.
- Treat plants for thrips and mites.
- Catch up with all your repotting this month.

#### PROPAGATING ORCHIDS

There are two ways to <u>propagate</u> (multiply) plants: sexually (by seed) or asexually (vegetative propagation), by which a new plant is produced from another plant.

#### VEGETATIVE PROPAGATION

Back bulbs- When a sympodial plant (new growth begins at the base of the newest existing pseudobulb and grows sideways) has enough bulbs to support new growth, plus 2 or 3 inactive, but still green, bulbs at the back of the plant, the back bulbs may be encouraged to grow into a new plant.

There are 2 ways to do this:

1. At repotting, after cleaning away the old potting material, count the bulbs and decide where the division is to be made. Cut through the <a href="mailto:rhizome">rhizome</a>(hard, woody stem) with a sharp, sterilized knife. Dust with fungicide. Pot the front in the usual manner. The back bulbs probably have no roots, but must have one good eye (a little bump right where the bulb curves upward from the rhizome). <u>Don't pot up!</u> Stand them up in a pot of damp sphagnum moss, set in a shady place, spray with water daily. When an eye begins to swell or roots to form, pot them up as usual. Use a pot clip to secure to the side of the pot and tie securely so that they don't wobble or fall out of the pot.

2. Another method is to put the back bulbs into plastic bags. Put a handful of wet sphagnum moss in the bottom of the bag. Make a couple of holes with a pencil about halfway up the bag to allow for a little air circulation. Tie the bag shut with a twist tie or wire and hang. Check every week, and add water if bag isn't moist enough. Make sure that the bag is large enough so leaves and all are enclosed. Or use a bag that is smaller without air holes. Put an inch of water in the bottom, insert the bulbs, and tie the bag shut around the bulbs. Leaves should

protrude from the bag.

Back bulbs may not flower on the first growth, which tends to be smaller and the first blooms may not be as spectacular as usual.

Divisions- A mature sympodial that is making 2 new leads simultaneously and has 3 or 4 bulbs to support each one may be divided into 2 separate plants which may be expected to flower regularly without interruption. Back bulbs may be cut off at the same time.


Offsets or keikis are little plants that grow off some part of a mature plant. Dendrobiums frequently produce these little plants from <u>nodes</u> (joints) on the <u>canes</u> (stems). You can remove the plantlets when the baby has a few roots and is a few inches tall. Numerous offsets may appear on a cane. Pot separately and treat as a seedling.

#### **SEEDS**

Seed- Two orchids are carefully selected as parents for their qualities. Hand pollination will result in a pod if successful.

<u>Flask</u>- When the pod is mature (which may take several months), the tiny, dust like seeds are planted in a solution of sterile nutrients in a sterile glass bottle under strict antiseptic conditions. Orchid seeds don't have their own food supply. If all goes well, green fuzz on top of the agar (nutrient solution) can be distinguished as individual plants. Flasks may be transplanted (reflasked) once or twice.
