#### Tasks for March

Average high: 80.7Average low: 64Average mean: 72.4Average rainfall: 2.56"



- Repot cattleyas and other sympodials that finished blooming over the winter if you haven't already done so and the hard cane dendrobiums that need it (remember they don't like to be disturbed and like their roots crowded).
- Replant those genera which are breaking out of dormancy (e.g., catasetums, mormodes, etc.)
- Apply slow release fertilizer to last the season (Dynamite is the best.) and regular 15-5-15 fertilizer weekly thereafter.
- Slowly acclimatize sun-loving plants that have been in the shade to full sun.
- 'Tis the season for THRIPS! Orthene is the chemical of choice. Liquid dish soap (2 oz per gallon of water) is a non-chemical solution and should be applied thoroughly (water your plants the day before applying soap).

This month's words and terms are dedicated to Phalaenopsis, the popular supermarket orchid. Many of us, myself included, succumb to the beautiful flowers during the BOGO sales at Publix in Florida.



<u>Phalaenopsis</u> - aka "Moth orchid". The name comes from the Latin word Phalaenopsis, which means moth, and opsis, which is defined as appearance.

<u>Inflorescence</u> - the complete flower head of a plant, including stems, stalks, bracts, and flowers. Phalaenopsis orchids are known for their graceful, long lasting inflorescences.

<u>Monopodial orchid</u> - has no bulb, grows continually in one direction, coming from the apex of the stem. Phalaenopsis orchids are monopodial.

<u>Spike</u> - kind of inflorescence that bear's sessile flowers (flowers are attached directly without stalks).

There are many opinions about cutting spikes. I will include some from both sides here.

#### Reasons not to cut:

1. You may get more flushes of flowers.

2. Less energy put out by plant to get a new spike.

3. Some species are ever bloomers or sequential bloomers.

4. It doesn't cost energy to keep the spike. It's photosynthetic.

- 5. More biomass= more energy. The more green plant material and roots a plant has, the better equipped it is to make flowers.
- 6. Don't cut if you want keikis (baby orchids).
- 7. Every cut is a chance to spread viruses.

#### Reasons to cut:

1. If plant is stressed.

- 2. Plant saves energy for next spike (as you can see, the viewpoint varies here).
- 3. Aesthetics.
- 4. Unruly.
- 5. Turns brown.

Is it a spike or a root?

Spikes look like "mittens" or little hands and are not purely round like roots.
