



SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY

LISTENING AND RESPONDING

There are three interwoven themes in today's readings: listening to God, faith vs. good works, and losing our life in order to find it. How are they related? The Suffering Servant of Isaiah undergoes much distress and ridicule, but is able to bear it because he has listened to the promptings of God day after day. The psalm tells us that God listens, too. God hears our prayers for help and is always ready to save us. As our faith deepens, so does our desire to do the works of justice and charity that build up the reign of God. God directs our actions in ways we often cannot see, and we don't always see the results. We are called upon in faith to trust that what we do is enough, and that willingness to listen to God's promptings will lead us in the right way.



FAITH OR WORKS?

Sometimes we think the argument of faith vs. works started with the Reformation. But the second reading shows that it was already being debated in New Testament times. The simplified version of the debate has the Reformers saying that faith alone is all we need to be saved, while the Catholic side says we have to do good to be saved. Actually, they are both right. The idea of works being necessary for salvation probably goes back to the Old Covenant emphasis on the law and the commandments. They believed that their religious practices set them apart from the pagans around them. Then Jesus came to show that only God is Holy. Our holiness comes from loving God and loving others. Because Jesus is the Son of God, he is the best way to know God. So believing in Jesus is not just believing that he exists. We believe in a Person who loves us and showed us that God is our Father. He gives us life and protects us; he supports us and also lets us learn from our mistakes. Then he forgives us, showing that he loves us even when we turn away from him. So if we truly believe in Jesus we follow his commandment of love, because we love him so much we want to be just like him. We help others, not to make us look good, but to show them how good God is. So you cannot truly believe in Jesus without wanting to help others to know and love him too. Jesus' way of saying that in today's gospel was to take up our cross and follow him. That is truly a work of faith.



Brothers and Sisters in Christ, I am Bishop Edward Weisenburger, and I'd like to address briefly with you the events that are unfolding on the East Coast.

After many years of diligent efforts focused on creating and implementing strong Safe Environment Protocols, and removing offenders from among our ranks, it now feels that the wounds that were healing have once again been torn open by events on the East Coast. In addition to the words I'm speaking to you now, you may also have seen on our Diocesan web page the statement released today by Cardinal Daniel DiNardo, President of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Cardinal DiNardo, along with senior Conference leadership, is calling for three significant actions to be taken quickly. The first is a full and thorough investigation of issues surrounding Archbishop McCarrick's abuse. The second is to create structures that facilitate easier reporting of abuse or misconduct on the part of a bishop. The third point in his plan is to advocate for better procedures to resolve complaints against bishops. He rightly notes that lay leadership will be critical and I thoroughly agree. I find the approach Cardinal DiNardo is calling for to be strong, timely, and appropriate. I fully endorse the approach outlined by Cardinal DiNardo and will lend my voice and my effort to seeing its implementation.

On a more personal level as your bishop, I would call to mind that we here in the Diocese of Tucson went through our own time of great suffering approximately 14 years ago as we came to acknowledge and repent for the sins of our past. At that time we had the wonderful leadership of Bishop Kicanas whose outreach to victims, as well as his establishment of firm Safe Environment Protocols, restored the trust of our local people. Let us keep the victims of Pennsylvania, over the last 70 years, as well as those who were harmed anywhere by clergy, in our prayers. And of course, be assured of no lessening of Safe Environment procedures, due diligence, and firm response on the part of leadership in our beloved Diocese today.

For myself, and on behalf of my brother bishops, I humbly apologize for the pain and anguish this situation has caused not only the immediate victims of abuse but also for you, the Catholic faithful—the Body of Christ. I also ask your prayers for our good and faithful clergy, most especially our parish priests who continue to serve us with great generosity and devotion in the midst of these very challenging times.

May God bless you all.
