The Tussing Road Covered Bridge

This continual adjustment was vital to the maintenance of any highway bridge or railroad bridge. Today there remain in Ohio more Howe truss bridges than any other patented type. Its simplicity and ease of erection

The Blacklick Bridge, which spanned Blacklick Creek on Tussing Road just below Reynoldsburg, is a Howe Truss bridge of a single span, 130 feet long, built in 1888. Its general design was the work of William Howe, a Massachusetts millwright and house builder. It may have been built or sub-contracted under Thatcher, Burt, and McNary, who sublet Ohio rights to Howe's designs.

A friendly man who liked music and the good things in life, William Howe patented his invention of a new type of bridge truss in 1840, 30 years after the first covered bridge in the nation was built. Howe's very simple design was primarily for use in railroad bridges. But the patent brought a revolutionary improvement to bridge building.

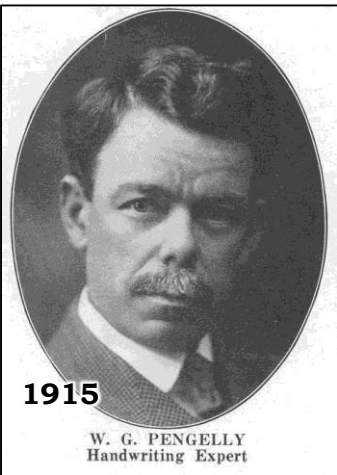
The Howe truss could be quickly and cheaply built of the greenest wood. Its secret of success was the introduction of a scarce material, iron. By incorporating iron tension rods into the truss, the bridge could be adjusted and readjusted.

made "The Howe" the most popular type of bridge in the world.

Wood was used for the early bridges because it was easy to obtain and could be bought cheaply near the building site. Proper stone was not available in many areas. As for iron or steel, although the Bessemer process had been discovered in 1856, these materials were not yet in common use in bridge building. The bridges were roofed and sideboarded to protect flooring from weather. But in snowy times, snow had to be shoveled onto the bridge floor so that horse-pulled sleighs could pass through.



On August 31, 1977, a trucker tried to drive through Blacklick Bridge with a load that was *twelve tons over* the 5-ton limit. Today the 89-year-old bridge still lies broken in the stream; the road is closed to traffic while a settlement is being discussed; and we have been robbed of a once-handsome, useful emblem of our past.



William G. Pengelly

Reynoldsburg's Handwriting Expert

In the field of handwriting analysis, the expertise and authority of William G. Pengelly was internationally recognized in his own time. Mr. Pengelly lived in Reynoldsburg many years.

Pengelly was one of the early authorities in America to recognize the study of documents and chirography (art of writing or engraving) as a nearly exact science, demanding thorough study of the elements which definitely identify typewriting, as well

as those pertaining to signatures and handwriting. Factors entering into handwriting analysis include the effects of alcohol and mental disorder as manifested in handwriting; use of the microscope and comparative signatures in determining true or forged handwriting; the documents themselves, their age, composition of the paper, etc.

Pengelly's researches extended back to the earliest history of the written word, and included a study of the work of all his predecessors and contemporaries in the profession. He furnished decisions as proof in cases involving questioned documents and writing in courts from New York to Iowa, from Wisconsin to Arkansas. His services were requested by the U.S. Post Office, the intelligence department of the British Government. He wrote various articles on handwriting and safeguarding against forgery.

Born in Plymouth, England, in 1865, the son of a British Navy warrant officer, Pengelly came to this area in 1883. From then until 1915 he was employed by the Capital City Bank of Columbus, rising from secretary to president. As a banker he became interested in fraudulent documents, and pursued that study for many years. He was ranked among the foremost American experts.

Pengelly was of stocky build, and has been described as "not handsome, a little like Alfred Hitchcock" in appearance. He married a tall stately woman named Elizabeth Lunn, daughter of Dr. Lewis T. Lunn of Reynoldsburg. The couple took into their home H.E. "Elzie" Minor, a brother of Lester Minor who lives at 1311 Lancaster Avenue. Pengelly taught Elzie his profession.

A 32nd Degree Mason and a member of Aladdin Temple, William Pengelly was elected in 1899 a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland, and was a life member of the Ohio Archeological and Historical Society. He was a founder of the old Northwest Genealogical Society.

He died in 1935 and is buried in Reynoldsburg in the Silent Home Cemetery.

The “Reflector” was the title of the RHS school newspaper in the mid-thirties. The 1936-37 staff consisted of Constance Fischer, editor; Richard Parkinson, associate editor; Elbert Weber and Ruth Campbell, sports editors; Maebelle Weber, Girl Reserve editor and Spice editor; George Wood, Senior editor; Jean Kelsey, Junior editor; Robert Halterman, Sophomore editor; and Howard Smith, Freshman editor.

The senior class officers were: George Wood, president; Harold Pickering, vice president; Virginia Turner, secretary, and Elmore Hayes, treasurer. The junior class had an exciting year as reviewed by the year-end “Reflector”. Some of the highlights were:

“The first social event of the year was a wiener roast at the ancient and venerable location. This memorable occasion was one of great extreme because it began as a usual wiener roast, but ended in Canal Winchester, since everyone took part in a general exodus, leaving their ... behind them.”

“... Then we juniors ambitiously staged a doughnut sale, clearing \$13 toward the Junior-Senior banquet. The evening of that same day, a house-party was held at the home of ‘Julie’ Kelsey. This was our first venture into the ‘pound party’ style. A very successful venture as it turned out.

Never was such a bountiful supply of edibles accumulated at any junior party. (We might add that Howard McIlvaine left early apparently because no one would play “post office” with him, however he might become flustered if we mentioned it, so we shall leave those things unsaid.)”



"Shortly afterwards, another party was held at the domicile of "Red" Hamilton. This time the food was obtained by one-half pound donations."
