

For the March 2023, Courier I "walked" down East Main Street and ended up at the Hayes house where they sold sweet corn in the summer. Now I'm going to continue East on the North side of Main Street to one of my former




homes. My memories are a blend of the 50s and 60s and may not be totally accurate because my mind may remember things differently from my youth than what they actually were. First, I want to correct a comment I made in Part 2 of the walk, Nikki and Vikki Fledderjohanns' grandfather was Perry Walz, not Oath Young.

I had planned to "cross" Main Street at the crosswalk, but decided I would wander further up the street. There

were a number of houses along the street that are no longer there. But some landmarks are still visible. Miss Marguerite Click, a longtime

teacher in Reynoldsburg lived in a white house with big butterflies on her porch. I don't know if they were metal

or ceramic, but they definitely stood out! Miss Click was famous for taking her little Pekingese dog, Foo Ling everywhere. The dog became the unofficial "mascot" of the school. There are pictures of him posing with the 1956 Homecoming Queen, Marilyn Babbert. The Reynolian (continued on page 02)

listed him as "Foo Ling, the Homecoming King." The house has since been remodeled into the Eerie Escape venue and doesn't look the same.



One of the homes I visited often on Main Street belonged to **Mickey and Frances Slack**. Frances and I were both Founding Members of RTHS and served on the board in the late 70s. At one time we were sharing



the Secretary position, but we had to split up because we talked the whole meeting rather than paying attention. That's when I became the Publicity Chairman where I sent information to the local newspaper. Frances and I had a great time and she gave me many story ideas I used in the *Reynolds*-

burg Reporter.


The next place I remember was **Culligan Water** Softeners. I didn't know anyone who had soft water, but they had a big building. The building is still standing and has been a variety of business locations over the years.

When we moved from Rt. 204 to the Burg, my parents rented a big white house that sat right on the edge of Main Street I think the front yard was about six feet wide. The house was

situated on a hill and the back of the house was quite a bit lower than the

front. I don't have any pictures of that house, but I remember it well. There were quite a few kids in the old village area and we liked to hang out in the backyard where the swing set was located. There was a huge red barn closer to the creek where one of my uncles stored a race car. One of the highlights of fall was when the big, black walnut tree dropped its nuts. The hulls were thick and green and hard to separate from the nut. I don't know if you ever tried to crack a black walnut, but they are totally different than the English kind we see in the

stores now. Usually, we had to convince my dad to drive the car over the nuts a few times so we could get them open. A nutcracker couldn't open the nuts, pliers were a better choice.



We moved into the house in 1953 so I could begin kindergarten. I celebrated my 6th birthday in the house with a big party. My guests were: Mike and Mark Davis (twins), Mark Mallet, Mike Wetherell, David Millar, Carol Ingalls, Susie Wil-Laura liams. Bennett. Uhrig, Barbara Fickle, and Karen Stokes. We even did "couples" style of dancing. I remember it was a lot of fun. The house was in a great location because Kindergarten was held in the United Methodist Church on the other side of the street. The house was where the Old Town Shopping Center is located. At one time the Reynoldsburg Reporter was located at 7512 East Main which was about where the barn used to be. It was pretty strange working at the newspaper right where my old

I guess it's time to get across Main Street now. The street wasn't all that busy most of the time. At first, my mom would walk me and my neighbor, Barbara Fickle, across the street so I would learn how to cross a big road to go to school. Until we moved to the Burg, I had never been around streets or traffic because we lived on part of the Pickering/Millar farm. My mom would cross Main Street later in the day to help me back home. She didn't do that for long because one day, my little brother, Mike, must have gotten up early from his nap and saw mom crossing the street. He escaped out of the screen door and started toddling across the street (he was two-years-old). I still have a mental image of him, grinning from ear to ear with nothing on except a



sagging diaper. Mom yelled at him and caught him on the run. It was quite a sight. Guess he was an original "streaker", except he had his diaper on! Needless to say, mom decided I'd



Our job was to learn how to get used to being around nonfamily members and to listen to the teacher. One of my most traumatic



experiences happened in that room. The teacher had given us all a cardboard shoe and taught us how to put laces through the holes. It was fun until we were taught how to tie a bow. Everyone in the class accomplished the task, except for me.



I couldn't figure out how tying was done. That's when I found out I was left-handed, and my teacher did not know how to teach lefties! I didn't learn until I (continued on page 05)

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

was in the second grade.

Anyway, many
of us spent a lot of time at the
Methodist Church. I believe I was
there five to six days a week for
various activities over the years. My
father built a side annex to the
church that had two stories. The
lower level of the annex had multiple
entrances and windows. There was a
pretty big kitchen at one end of the
big room. The rest was a large open



space where the **Methodist Youth** Fellowship (MYF) met for meetings and dances. The church ladies also used the space for "Circle" meetings or potluck meals. The other two floors of the annex were used for Sunday School. I was in the children's choir, youth choir, and adult choir while growing up.

Well, I'd better get on with my journey back toward Blacklick Creek. After going from the church, there was Cypress Alley that connected to where the minister lived. Just on the other side of the alley is where Helping Hands is located. My dentist, **Dr. John Seeds**, had his offices in a



house next to that small office plaza.


My father went to Dr. Seeds for years.



Years later I even took my kids there. Next to that office is a State Farm Insurance agent. I don't remember what it was years ago, but there probably was a house there.



Bates Realty is still located in the same place I remember it. Although - originally it was a Motel, not apartments. These buildings are all located in Reynoldsburg's Historic section. Next to Bates was a popular beauty (continued on page 06)

salon known as "The Powder Puff." I don't remember ever going there, but my Aunt Virginia used to get her hair done there. The beauty shop



produced a cookbook for a few years which included recipes from their clients. I believe there is a copy of it at the RTHS museum.



The next important stop is the United Presbyterian Church. I visited there a number times when the churches had special combined services for Thanksgiving, Easter, or Christmas. One of my elementary teachers, Martha Savage was their organist for decades. Martha was the person who took care of the original RTHS museum, accepted and cataloged donations from guests, and made sure that everyone signed our

guest book! Martha kept our records in order for many years. **Shirley Vingle**, another RTHS member, used to be a youth leader at the United Presbyterian Church. Apparently, Shirley made quite a choice when she had our own, **Mary (Turner) Stoots**, play the Virgin Mary in the Christmas pageant. Usually little, red-headed girls weren't chosen for such a visible




role! Mary is the current President of RTHS and editor of the *Courier*.

On May 31, 1927, an Army, large, single-bay, conventional biplane, Huff-Daland XLB-5 crashed



in Reynoldsburg. There were five men on that airplane. One of the men who parachuted (Continued on page 7)

from the plane ended up getting caught on the steeple of the **United Presbyterian Church** at Main and Jackson. His name was First Lieutenant Bernard A. Bridget. My brother, Mike Millar, did research on the story of the crash in 1967 and found out from Bridget's son that his father had suffered back injuries from that jump for the rest of his life. (See the *Courier* article from May, 2020, Vol. 43, No. 3). The version of the church that was standing in 1927 burnt down on Dec. 29, 1946. Apparently, over the course of the years, the Presbyterian Church burned down at least four different times.

The church building was sold a few years ago. Our museum has one of the pews from the church. The pew is located in the kitchen of RTHS. I think I'll take a rest on that pew for a while before I finish up my stroll West to Blacklick Creek.



Al will be in a movie that started filming a few weeks ago in Louisville Kentucky. It's about a lady wrestler, Mildred Burke, and Al will be portrayed by Martin Kove.

Kove is best known for his role as John Kreese, the main antagonist of The Karate Kid (1984). He reprised the role in The Karate Kid Part II (1986), The Karate Kid Part III (1989), and the television series Cobra Kai (2018-present). Kove also appeared as Nero the Hero in *Death* Race 2000 (1975), and afterward as Clem in White Line Fever (1975). He was a regular on the TV series Cagney and Lacey (1982–1988), portraying Police Detective Victor Isbecki. He appeared in Rambo: First Blood Part II (1985) and Quentin Tarantino's Once Upon a Time in Hollywood (2019).

<u>PWInsider.com</u> has confirmed a lot of additional details on the forth-coming independent feature

film Queen of the Ring: Based on the True Story of Mildred "Millie Burke," an independent film written and directed by Ash Avildsen (No Cover, the in-development Genghis Khan and Paradise City, among other projects), which will tell the story of influential groundbreaking women's star Mildred Burke.

The film began shooting in Louisville, Kentucky last month Monday June 12, and they'll shoot through at least late July and in some production material, the film been referred has to as just Millie, so they may be shortening the title. The screenplay by Avildsen is based on the excellent Jeff Leen book of the same title on Burke's life, which was released back in 2009. Avildsen recently scored a Grammy nomination for Best Metal Performance for singer Poppy, who has appeared on WWE NXT programming in the past.



The plot of the film – "The true story of the tough, gutsy Mildred Burke, the first world famous female pro wrestler and million-dollar athlete, who becomes a champion of a grow-



ing entertainment franchise in the 1930s to 1950s. Married to business partner BILLY WOLFE, the brilliant but vicious entrepreneur who pioneered women wrestlers, Mildred endured his infidelity and physical abuse despite the rise of her own power until she couldn't take it anymore. With courage, panache and a loyal following, Mildred challenged the all-male hierarchy of the wrestling world as she became the first woman to headline over men."

from that time period:

-Francesca Eastwood, recently seen



in M. Night Shyamalan's film Old, will be portraying WWE Hall of Famer Mae Young, who will be seen 20s/30s. Eastwood her the daughter of Clint Eastwood.

-Leona "Babe" Gordon, who Burke defeated for the Women's World Championship will be portrayed by Marie Avgeropoulos (The 100).

- Josh Lucas will be playing Billy Wolfe. Lucas is well known for roles in a number of feature films including The Hulk, The Forever Purge, American Psycho and tons of other projects. Wolfe, as some will know, was a major



promoter of women's wrestling in that time period and not a likable personality, in the least, as he exploited the women he promoted. He was also the former husband of Burke.

-Deborah Ann Woll (Karen from Marvel's Daredevil, in which she was excellent) will portray Gladys "Kill em" Gillem.

-Kelli Berglund, who stars in STARZ pro wrestling series Heels as Crystal. will portray "Alabama Bombshell" Nell Stewart.

-Legendary pro wrestling promoter Al Haft will be portrayed by Cobra Kai's Martin Kove. Haft was one of the original promoters to form the National Wrestling Alliance.

-Walton Goggins will be playing legendary New York City wrestling promoter Jack Pfefer, one of the first to ever break kavfabe* and reveal secrets of the business to the media at the time, but also pushed for women's wrestling to be legally allowed in NYC.

A number of these personalities were featured years ago in the excellent Ruth Leitman women's wrestling documentary Lipstick & Dynamite.

The film is said to be budgeted in the \$5 million area, so it's closer to an independent film than a studio production.

* Kayfabe - In professional wrestling, kayfabe is the portrayal of staged events within the industry as "real" or "true", specifically the portrayal of competition, rivalries, and relationships between participants as being genuine and not staged.
