

OLD REYNOLDSBURG

So, my two best buddies pass away 15 months apart. They were my writers! And now they are watching me! Did I hear a snicker from above?

Connie wrote about 1956 in the **Historical**

Tales of Old Reynoldsburg, Volume

One in August of 1980.

Suzy did an article for the January 2021 Courier called. "Memories of 1956."

Their articles may be 41 years apart, but I believe I can make it work!

The **1950 Census** reflects the Reynoldsburg Population at **724** people. By 1956 that number had quadrupled, and by 1960 it had increased 976.38% to a grand total **of** 7,793. By 1970, the 1960 total had almost doubled. So,

what happened to cause all the growth in the 1950s? North American Rockwell came to central Ohio, along with **Lane Aviation**,

DCSC (Defense Construction & Supply Center), Lockbourne Air Force Base, and Western Electric, just to name a few. Since 1951, the town had more than quadrupled its population, but Main

Street, once part of the stagecoach route on the National Road, looked much the same as it had since 1939, when a Franklin County WPA Project* had resurfaced the street. Waldo Wollam, serving his third term as mayor (1952-1957), admitted, "We like it that way. Reynoldsburg is still a small community of people who want a fine place to live. We have no industry and want none.

* WPA stands for Works Progress Administration of 1935 (renamed Work Projects Administration in

1939). Created by President Franklin Roosevelt to relieve the economic hardship of the Great Depression. This national works program employed over 8.5 million people on 1.4 million public projects, before it was disbanded in 1943.

Sporadic annexation and the tremendous growth of the village were topics of great local interest. At 3,000 in our population, the town was not yet incorporated as a city. (that didn't happen until 1961) We did not yet have delivery of mail to homes and businesses.

A damaging flash flood in June of 1956 had raised questions about the advisability of erecting a Post Office building on French Drive. The proposed site would be a half block east of Lancaster Avenue and the width of French Drive from Blacklick Creek. However, other sites were being considered. (Discussion of this problem delayed the first foot delivery of mail in village history; but soon the Post Office Department leased a building erected on French Drive, and



the mail went out by carrier.) During this year, more than **1,000 new homes** were under construction, some of them being built by Mayor Wollam.




The largest housing development at the time was **Brookside Park**, where **520 houses** were scheduled. Other developments included **Marabar Heights**, where **200 houses** were being built in John Morrison's sheep pasture; **136 houses in the G. E. Bass Addi-**

tion, and **160 houses** on the **Bennett and Bell farms.*** Additional houses were being built by individuals throughout the village.

Reynoldsburg was looking forward to an increase of **3,350 in population**. The Village had annexed **1,099 acres**, and by October of 1956, expected to take in another **616 acres**. But Mayor Wollam said, "Please don't get the idea we are land hungry. Our intention is to square up the city limits so we may properly serve our people with water and sewers."

The city limits had been moved a mile west to Brice Pike, east to the Franklin County line, one mile north to Rodebaugh Road, and a quarter mile south to Livingston Avenue.

homes, because they were completed in the late 1950s and early 1960s, but history is never, never, never based on assumption.



Meanwhile, the schools were overloaded with students. Between 1958 and 1962, **five new schools** were opened. In 1950, we had 48 graduates, and by 1960, there were 69, but the class of 1964 had approximately 136.

A successful member of the **RHS Class of 1956** was **Jim Near** who became the "Whiz Kid" of Fast Food. Jim's senior picture caption read: "He's really neat from head to feet." Ambition – to own a drive-in... Pet peeve – dumb car hops..."Where's Dan?"...favorite pastime – Cattin' around...Burger Boy.. "Rose La Rose." In his class Last Will

Cattin' around...Burger Boy.. "Rose La Rose." In his class Last Will and Testament" Jim wrote: "I, Jim Near, bequeath my ability to fry hamburgers to Gary



Blackstone." Those words were very prophetic. Jim began working as a short order cook while still in high school and became the night manager

high school and became the night manager at the Burger Boy in Reynoldsburg.

He graduated from Hanover College in Indiana in 1960, joined the National Guard for a while, and then started working at the first McDonald's in Columbus on South High Street where he became the manager. His former boss from the Burger Boy, **Roy Tuggle**, co-founded BBF (Burger Boy Food-O-Rama) "home of the whirling satellite" and asked Jim to become manager of the new burger chain. Jim eventually became vice-president.

Borden, Inc. bought out BBF and Jim became the President of Borden Retail Operations. After he left Borden's, Jim

joined Dave Thomas, his BBF boss, and other investors to found Wendy's Hamburgers where he purchased a few franchises and opened over **39 Wendy's restaurants in** West Virginia and Florida. Later on, he sold the franchises back to Wendy's to "retire," but got bored. He ended up developing a spicy chicken sandwich which became the basis of "Sisters Chicken and Biscuits." Dave Thomas called him one day and said, "I need you back! Sales are down." Jim developed the "Dollar Menu," and it was a huge hit! Wendy's bought the Sisters Chicken franchises, from Jim and he became President and Chief Operating Officer of Wendy's and later CEO and President of Wendy's International.

Jim never wanted anyone to forget where they came from. Every year, all of the administrative people in the corporate office had to go out to one of the restaurants and work for one or two-weeks flipping hamburgers, working the drive-thru window, and the front counter. Jim wanted them ALL to know how to service customers and cook the food.

In the interim, the village had been growing in an orderly fashion, and without the strife that marked the annexation program that Columbus was simultaneously pursuing. **Devel**opers had been paying for the necessary improvements; tax rates remained low, and the water and sewer improvements of the 1930s were of immense value to the village



in the 1950s. When the additional houses were being built, the facilities were available. In the planning stage were additions to the sewer plant, a **new distribution** system and a filtration plant. These further improvements were expected to serve the 10,000 people projected to live here by 1960. The village was unique in that it was operating in the black. There were plans for a park to the north of Main Street and just west of Blacklick Creek; and for a second floor to be added to the Truro Township fire station at 7354 East Main. There it was hoped that the village offices

could be established.

Entertainment, except for school, church, and club functions, was meager but lively. Al Haft's arena, where Huber Homes now stand, featured wrestling each Saturday night. Joe Betts owned the duck pin bowling alley, above the Connell Hardware. It was a popular gathering place and now is the "1883 Locale."

Other forms of indulgence included going to Elmore Hayes' drugstore for a hot fudge sundae deluxe.

"Walking around the square," an old-time way to spend a lazy summer's

The cost of living in 1956 was: Average new house, \$11,700; Monthly rent, \$88; Yearly wages, \$4,450; Gallon of gasoline, .22¢; New car, \$2,050; and Coffee was .85¢ per pound. The Interstate **Highway System** was authorized in June by President Eisenhower, General Electric /Telechron introduced the first **snooze alarm clock**

and Play Doh was invented! Black and white portable televisions hit the market and Tefal started producing non-stick frying pans.

Polio "pioneer," Dr. Albert Sabin, developed an oral vaccine (remember Sabin on Sunday?) while Dr. Jonas Salk was administering injectable polio vaccine. There were 57,879 reported cases of polio in 1952. Mary Turner Stoots' cousin, Johnny Winters, was one of those cases. Mary was born in January of 1952, and Johnny was born in Septem-



ber to Jack and Jeannine (Turner) Winters. He developed polio in December of that same year. The picture of Johnny & Mary (below right) was taken in 1956 on the front steps at their Grandfather's porch in Whitehall. Mary said, "We never considered Johnny as crippled or disabled. **Johnny Winters**

He just sat all the time. Otherwise, he could do everything we could! He was on a championship wheelchair basketball team, the Buckeye Wheelers!"

Rocky Marciano, 31, retired as the only undefeated Heavyweight Champion of the World

with a perfect record. New York Yankees pitcher, **Don Larson**, threw the only **perfect game** in World Series



history in game five of the 1956 World Series against the Brooklyn

Dodgers. We watched "To Tell the Truth" on CBS-

TV and Bob Barker made his TV debut as the host of "Truth or Consequences". The "Huntley-Brinkley Report" was on NBC and MGM debuted "The Wizard of Oz" on

CBS as the final installment of the Ford Star Jubilee. Popular films were "Guys and Dolls," "The King and I," "Trapeze," "High Society," and "Around the World in Eighty Days."



Other entertainment news included the premiere of the movie "The Ten Commandments" and "My Fair Lady" opened on Broadway with Julie Andrews and Rex Harrison. "As the World **Turns**" became the first half-hour soap opera on CBS and aired for 54 years from April 2, 1956, to September 17, 2010. Irna Phillips created "As the World Turns" as a sister show to her other soap opera "Guiding Light." With 13,763 hours

of cumulative narrative, As the World Turns has the longest total running time of any television show on American television. Author's Note: Mary said, "it broke my mother's heart when it ended." (continued on page 06)



10:30pm on June 21st,
1956 with high winds and

night, rain passed through

French Run the
power lines went
down, water swirled
into homes, the bridge on Lancaster

Avenue collapsed, the footbridge floated away, and yellow mud and tree limbs flowed with the massive flood waters. The firemen said that the four hours after midnight were a nightmare.

There were daring rescues of residents trapped in their houses. Using boats, **people evacuated children to higher ground** while everyone tried to save their homes.

The night of the flood was truly terrifying.

Suzy Millar was one of the children who rode a boat up Lancaster Avenue to her grandparent's house. One of her cousins, Marty Nessley, was a baby and she remembered him being passed over flood waters from the front porch to the boat.

the house just groaned and sank to one side. Eventually, the water came up to the first-floor level, but it didn't cover the beds. After that flood, all of the doors in the house were a little warped and never closed easily again.

When the Millar basement wall collapsed,

At Mary's house, the basement filled with water on Waggoner Road. Her Dad was beyond upset because he had just finished building the house! (We can't repeat what he said)

If 1956 wasn't memorable for the flooding, then it would probably be because that was the year that they invented

Or maybe it was because the movie star Grace Kelly married Prince Rainier of Monaco and became **Princess Grace of Monaco!**





Suzy Lee Millar Miller

Nov 24, 1948, to Feb 8, 2024

Suzy Millar Miller, 75, of Georgetown, Texas, passed away on Thursday, February 8th, 2024, at a hospital in Austin, Texas. She was the beloved wife of Chuck, and loving mother of Julie Ann and Carl "CC" Clinton Miller.

Suzy retired from IBM as an auditor and technical writer. She kept busy in her retirement continuing as a Lifetime Member of the West Licking Historical Society, Pickerington-Violet Township Historical Society, as well as the Reynoldsburg-Truro Historical Society (RTHS), where she held the office for many, many decades as the Corresponding Secretary on the Board of Directors. She was a lead writer for the organizational bi-monthly newsletter, the Courier. Her five-part series "A Walk Down Main Street" was shared and read by over 28.185 people. She co-authored a book, "Reynoldsburg High School 1899 to 1970" that contains pictures of all the class composites we have on the walls at our Museum. She spent eight years researching for the book because our composites go back to 1899, but the school's first graduating class was in 1871. Every student is listed, along with the faculty she could locate.

She was heavily involved with many Reynoldsburg High School classes, including her own graduation class from 1966. She acted as their Reunion Coordinator and Database Manager for decades. When Reynoldsburg had an active Alumni Association, she participated in that group and



helped out whenever possible, typing programs, or helping with mailers. For several years, she hosted an all-alumni bash at the VFW Post #9473 in Reynoldsburg. She created commemorative books for at least six or seven different classes including 1956, 1964, 1965, 1966, 1967, and 1970.

She served as the pianist for the Reynoldsburg High School Chorus throughout her entire high school career and was the accompanist for the youth choir at the United Methodist Church. Music has always been an important part of her life.

Suzy was a past Regent for the Mathias Ridenour Chapter of the National Society for the Daughters of the American Revolution (NSDAR). She is very proud of her heritage as evidenced by the DAR emblem on the back of her tombstone.

She met with Girl Scout Troop 505 whenever she came to town. They were formed in the 1950s when the girls were Brownies, and their leaders were Polly Cornell and Nina Bennett. After the girls flew from Brownies to Girl Scouts, they remained Scouts until they

graduated from high school in 1966. Suzy's mother, Maebelle was a Scout leader for the 1964 graduating class age group.



Suzy's claim to fame came in the form of a frog. February 2nd was known to all her friends and her entire family as the official Ground Frog's Day. There was a celebration every year. After 40 years of Frog parties, the final Ground Frog Party was held on February 4. 2012. In her last newsletter story, she recommended that we should each start our own holiday. She said, "It can be about a collection of items, a special family date, or anything we choose. The important point is to keep it consistent and not a traditional holiday, so it becomes a personal time that reminds people of you and how you care for those around you."

Suzy is survived by her son, Carl Clinton Miller, nephews, Brian and Chris Millar, and many cousins, including Sharon (Cosner) Sellitto, Mary Ann Klein, and Peggy Anstaett. She was preceded in death by her father, Paul Clinton Millar in 1984, her brother, Michael Paul Millar in 1991; mother, Maebelle Leona (Weber) Millar in 1998, her daughter, Julie Ann Miller in 2000, and her devoted husband, Charles (Chuck) William Miller in 2010. She will be buried in the Odd Fellows Cemetery, Georgetown, Williamson County, Texas.

A Celebration of Life event will take place on Saturday, June 29th, at the Cotner

Funeral Home, 7369 East Main Street in the Historic District of old Reynoldsburg. We will start with visitation of friends and family from 2:00pm to 3:30pm. The service will be at 3:30pm. Following the service, we will all walk together down the





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
