2020 IN REVIEW

We can all agree that 2020 came with unique challenges. Despite these obstacles, PIA was able to accomplish a lot of extraordinary things.

With the CARES ACT COVID Relief funding, we were able to offer direct assistance such as food, rent/mortgage, utility, internet, some critical home repairs, increased food assistance for those diagnosed with COVID-19, and moorage programs designed to ease some of the financial burden caused by COVID-19.

The Tribal Transportation Program has continued work on the Mountain View Manor Boardwalk, the William Musson Trail, the Howkan Street sidewalk, and more. The Transit Service has been running steadily and continues to be a useful resource to the community.

PIA was able to renovate the Elizabeth Peratrovich building to create much needed office space. A duplex and two studio apartments are currently being built and will serve as quality low income housing.

The Tobacco Prevention and Control Program continues to maintain partnerships, and educate the public on the negative impacts of tobacco use. We are continuing to hold events that are safe, fun, and educational.

The IGAP Program is continuing to make compost, check ocean acidification and PSP levels in our waters, and has started working with two teens on their research project.

Johnson Prevention and Control

Tobacco Prevention and Control, like many other programs and services, has looked different due to COVID-19. We had to cancel our usual Kick Butts Day movie activity, all our major events, but we have still found ways to interact with the community in a safe and fun way.

In July, we had a cigarette butt cleanup covering the downtown area. A photo of our littlest volunteer made it on to the front page of the newspaper. The PIA Natural Resource Management crew also volunteered with us.

In September we had a rock hunt. Positive messages and tobacco prevention messages were painted on rocks hidden around town, and the community set out to find them. All rocks were found, and it was a great way to spread positivity and get people out and active.









In October, we had a Halloween Scavenger Hunt. Kids of all ages were welcome to find all the items on the scavenger hunt that were both Halloween and tobacco education related. All those who participated took home Halloween goody bags for their hard work!

Social media and outreach is a huge part of socially distanced prevention work. TPC Director, Tori Shay, has taken over social media and monthly e-newsletter for the Partnership for a Tobacco-Free Southeast.

Stress relief is a huge part of tobacco prevention, due to stress being a huge trigger for many tobacco users. 2020 has been stressful for everyone, and we wanted to spread some positivity. We asked community members to send in photos of themselves doing something that they love that relieves stress. Those photos were compiled into a video and then posted on our Facebook Page.


January 11-22, 2021

Petersburg and Wrangell Tobacco Prevention and Control Programs decided to ignite the spark of the rivalry between our towns. We had a Petersburg vs. Wrangell competition, focusing on how e-cigarette companies have targeted youth and also taken advantage of the COVID-19 pandemic with their advertising. Community members were tasked with locating 5 posters, each one featuring a different e-cigarette ad and the tactic used in the ad. Once a poster was found, they posted a photo of the poster in the Facebook event. The town with the most posters found won, and that happened to be Petersburg! The final scores were:

Petersburg: 81 Wrangell: 75

Both communities gained valuable knowledge about e-cigarette advertising tactics, which is a win in itself. Petersburg won bragging rights, and this trophy will be proudly displayed for the next year.

PIA's Tribal Transportation Program received a \$26,053.00 Federal Transit Administration Grant to run the PIA Paratransit service.







Construction of 1,013 feet of sidewalk on the left side of 12th street and the left side of Howkan street was completed by the Tribal Transportation Program in October. Rainforest Construction was the contractor. Additional sidewalks on the right side of 12th street and Howkan street will be completed by July, 2021.

TTP has been assisting in the delivery of Mountain View Manor Food Service meals to seniors because COVID is preventing them from dining in at Mountain View Manor.

Salmon Canning Class

The class was sponsored by PIA and Spruce Root Community Development. PIA received this grant to teach a subsistence skill to Petersburg's Tribal Citizens. Classes were limited to 6 people to accommodate social distancing recommendations, and to allow one-on-one assistance with canning.

IGAP (PSP TESTING/COMPOST)



WATER SAMPLING

The PIA IGAP Department conducts regular water sample studies looking for the toxin PSP (paralytic shellfish poisoning). Petersburg generally has no toxins determined. These results are posted regularly at the harbor, on our Facebook page and website, and inside our building.

The PIA IGAP department works to create compost (commonly used in gardens) made of fish waste and wood chips. This is a lengthy process. The compost is then bagged up and ready to be sold. At the moment we do not have any available, but there is more cooking! The IGAP Department also collects old nets to be sorted and shipped out for recycling.

IGAP Director, Brandon Thynes is mentoring two high school students as a part of the Rural Alaska Student in One-Health Research (RASOR) program through Southeast Alaska Tribal Ocean Research (SEATOR). The teens are learning how to collect water samples and examine phytoplankton and measure ocean acidification as a part of a larger research project for school.

HOUSING

PIA's Housing Department is very excited about all of the projects that we have going on.

We have recently finished a second story renovation of the Elizabeth Peratrovich Building. We created five new office or retail spaces and are delighted to offer the spaces for rent at \$2.00 a square foot. They are available for rent now.



We have on-going construction of a new duplex on 8th & Ira II Streets. This building when finished will offer 2 non-smoking, two-bedroom apartments. These units are scheduled to be completed sometime this summer. PIA's construction projects are part of the continued effort to address the need for quality, safe, and affordable housing for our Tribal Citizens as was identified in the tribe's Comprehensive Plan.

We are in the last phase of construction of two studio apartments at our Raven Eagle
Apartments on South 2nd and 3rd Streets. We are hoping these units will finished by
February 1, 2021 and are now accepting applications from prospective tenants. These non-smoking units will be available for single, low-income Tribal Members.



CARES ACT PROGRAMS OF 2020



The CARES ACT funding provided PIA with a special opportunity to directly help the Native community in Petersburg. COVID-19 has impacted every household in some way. These programs were designed to offer direct aid to tribal families in need. The programs included utility/fuel cost subsidies, internet assistance, food assistance (read more below), rent/mortgage assistance for Native households, and moorage assistance for Petersburg harbor users.

PIA was excited to have the unique opportunity to provide much needed assistance to our Tribal Members.

PIA has and continues to have face coverings available for Tribal Members at no cost.



FOOD ASSISTANCE

In 2020, PIA was able to complete four food distributions which served over 80 Native families. Each family received pre-selected household food essentials. The food for these programs was purchased locally, and distribution was coordinated by PIA staff and community volunteers. PIA would like to thank volunteers: Liam Jackson, Nicole Peterson, Aidan Torrez, Darnell Murray, Sami Jackson, Pete Welch, and Maryann Rainey.

We would also like to thank key staff members that made the food distributions possible: Tori Shay, Tina Kerr, Tracy Welch, Ron Ware, Jack Galaktionoff, and Andy Edfelt.

PIA plans to continue food distributions in the early part of 2021.
