Easter Message from the Grand Prelate 2025 S.K. Theodore M. Boomgarden

As winter slowly releases its hold and allows life to break forth from the once-frozen dirt, we are reminded of the promise that the night is never so long that we should never see the dawn. The weight of the tomb is never so heavy that the stone cannot be rolled away. In this sacred season, we are called to journey from the cross to the tomb, as it is in that emptiness that true hope is found.

As Knights of His Order, we stand in wait at the foot of Calvary, where justice and mercy met upon the cross, as it is there that, amid the cruelty of men and the very trembling of the earth, that the Creator of all things submitted himself to the hands of His creation. The very Word that spoke light into existence uttered, "It is finished," and the breath that animated Adam was surrendered to the hands of the Almighty.
