Scottie Scheffler Rank 1

Scottie Scheffler is making his sixth Masters start. He is one of two Masters champions with Horton Smith to earn his first two wins in five or fewer starts and has never finished outside the top 20 at Augusta National. He won last year's Tournament by four strokes over Ludvig Åberg and won in 2022 by three strokes over Rory McIlroy. He has two top-10 finishes worldwide in 2025, including T-3 at Torrey Pines in February. His historic 2024 also included winning the PGA Tour's season-long points race, successfully defending his Players Championship title and becoming an Olympic gold medalist. Since 2022, the three-time PGA Tour Player of the Year has also won both the Arnold Palmer Invitational and the Memorial Tournament. He has represented the United States in the Ryder Cup, Presidents Cup and Walker Cup.

Aaron Rai* Rank 27

Aaron Rai is making his Masters debut. His best finish in a major championship is T-19 in both the 2021 Open at Royal St George's and the 2024 U.S. Open at Pinehurst No. 2. He finished T-4 in the Mexico Open in February. Last August, he earned his first career PGA Tour win in Greensboro and competed in his first Tour Championship at East Lake. Also in 2024, he finished runner-up in Detroit and T-4 in the Byron Nelson in Texas, Scottish Open and the DP World Tour's flagship event in England. His other worldwide wins include the Hong Kong Open in 2018 and the Scottish Open in 2020.

Will Zalatoris Rank 63

Will Zalatoris is making his fourth Masters start. He has top-10 finishes in each of his three starts at Augusta National, including runner-up in his Tournament debut in 2021. He has seven top-10 finishes in major championships, including runner-up in both the PGA Championship and U.S. Open in 2022. After missing most of the 2023 season following back surgery, he returned to competition in 2024 by finishing runner-up in Los Angeles and T-4 in the Arnold Palmer Invitational early in the year and then closing his season with top-15 finishes in Memphis and Colorado. Before turning professional, the three-time All-American at Wake Forest University won the 2014 U.S. Junior Amateur and represented his country in the 2016 Arnold Palmer Cup and 2017 Walker Cup.

Joe Highsmith* Rank 61

Joe Highsmith is making his Masters debut and second major championship start. He competed in the 2021 U.S. Open at Torrey Pines as an amateur. In March, he won in Palm Beach Gardens by two strokes over Jacob Bridgeman and J.J. Spaun to earn his first career PGA Tour win. He retained his PGA Tour card for the 2025 season after recording five top-20 finishes last fall, including fifth in Mexico, T-6 in Utah and T-11 in St. Simons Island. Before turning professional, he was a two-time All-American at Pepperdine University and helped his school win the 2021 NCAA Division I Men's Golf Championship. He also represented the United States in the Junior Presidents Cup in 2017.

Tom Hoge Rank 53

Joe Highsmith is making his Masters debut and second major championship start. He competed in the 2021 U.S. Open at Torrey Pines as an amateur. In March, he won in Palm Beach Gardens by two strokes over Jacob Bridgeman and J.J. Spaun to earn his first career PGA Tour win. He retained his PGA Tour card for the 2025 season after recording five top-20 finishes last fall, including fifth in Mexico, T-6 in Utah and T-11 in St. Simons Island. Before turning professional, he was a two-time All-American at Pepperdine University and helped his school win the 2021 NCAA Division I Men's Golf Championship. He also represented the United States in the Junior Presidents Cup in 2017.

Rory McIlroy Rank 2

Rory McIlroy is making his 17th Masters start. He is one Masters win away from completing the career Grand Slam and would join Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan, Gary Player, Jack Nicklaus and Tiger Woods as those to accomplish that feat. In 2014-2022, he finished inside the top 10 in seven of nine starts at Augusta National, including runner-up in 2022. He won the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am in February and the Players Championship in March. In 2024, he won events in Dubai, New Orleans and Charlotte, finished runner-up in the U.S. Open, secured his sixth season-long points title on the DP World Tour and competed in the Olympics for the second time. Before turning professional, he earned low amateur honors in The Open and represented Great Britain & Ireland in the Walker Cup in 2007.

Tom Kim Rank 31

Tom Kim is making his third Masters start. His final-round 66 in last year's Tournament was the low score of the day by two strokes. Also last year, he finished runner-up in Hartford, South Korea and the Bahamas and represented his country in the Olympics and the Presidents Cup. In 2023, he finished runner-up in The Open and T-8 in the U.S. Open, competed in his first Tour Championship at East Lake and successfully defended his title in Las Vegas. He earned his first two PGA Tour wins in 2022 with victories in Greensboro and Las Vegas. In addition to his PGA Tour success, he has worldwide wins in Singapore, India, Pakistan, Malaysia, Indonesia and South Korea.

Sam Burns Rank 35

Sam Burns is making his fourth Masters start. In 2024, he closed his PGA Tour season by finishing T-5 in Memphis and runner-up in Colorado to qualify for his fourth consecutive Tour Championship at East Lake and represented the United States in the Presidents Cup for the second time in Canada. He also finished T-9 in the U.S. Open at Pinehurst No. 2 for his first top 10 in a major. In 2023, he won the WGC-Match Play in Austin, finished sixth in two title defenses in Tampa and Fort Worth and represented the United States in the Ryder Cup in Italy.

Cameron Davies Rank 58

Cameron Davis is making his third Masters start. In 2024, he earned his second career PGA Tour win in Detroit and finished T-5 in Colorado and T-6 in the Australian PGA Championship. In 2023, he had 10 top-12 finishes worldwide, including T-4 in the PGA Championship and T-6 in the Players Championship. In 2022, he was a member of Trevor Immelman's International team in the Presidents Cup at Quail Hollow Club in Charlotte. Before turning professional, he was low individual and part of the winning Australian team in the 2016 Eisenhower Trophy in Mexico and in two starts in the Asia-Pacific Amateur Championship, he finished runner-up in 2015 in Hong Kong and fourth in 2016 in South Korea.

Austin Eckroat Rank 54

Austin Eckroat is making his second Masters start. In 2024, he earned his first two career PGA Tour wins with victories in Palm Beach Gardens in March and Mexico in November. Also last year, he finished sixth in Greensboro and T-18 in the PGA Championship at Oak Hill. In 2023 as a rookie on the PGA Tour, he had four top-10 finishes, including runner-up in the Byron Nelson in Texas, T-8 in St. Simons Island and T-10 in the U.S. Open at The Los Angeles Country Club. Before turning professional, the four-time All-American at Oklahoma State University was a member of the 2018 NCAA Division I Men's Golf Championship-winning team and represented the United States in both the Arnold Palmer Cup and Walker Cup.

Xander Schauffele Rank 3

Xander Schauffele is making his eighth Masters start. He has top-10 finishes in four of the past six years at Augusta National and was runner-up in 2019 to Tiger Woods and T-3 in 2021. In 2024, he won both the PGA Championship at Valhalla and The Open at Royal Troon to become the sixth to win those two majors in the same year, with Walter Hagen, Nick Price, Tiger Woods, Padraig Harrington and Rory McIlroy. In his 30 major starts, he has 15 top-10 and 23 top-20 finishes. Also last year, the 2021 Olympic gold medalist finished inside the top seven in the Tour Championship at East Lake for the eighth consecutive year and represented the United States in both the Olympics and the Presidents Cup.

Jason Day Rank 36

Russell Henley is making his eighth Masters appearance. Last year at Augusta National, he closed with three under-par rounds to finish T-4 and record his best finish in a major championship. Finished T-4 in Honolulu in January and in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando in March. In 2023, the Georgia native finished T-14 in the U.S. Open at The Los Angeles Country Club and qualified for his third Tour Championship at East Lake after closing his PGA Tour season with a runner-up in Greensboro, T-6 in Memphis and T-8 in Chicago.

Adam Scott Rank 32

Adam Scott is making his 24th Masters start. He won the 2013 Masters in a playoff over Angel Cabrera on a rainy Sunday afternoon to become Australia's first Tournament champion. In the years prior to his victory, numerous Australians had finished runner-up in the Masters, including Jim Ferrier, Greg Norman, Jason Day and Scott himself. He has made the cut in each of the past 15 years at Augusta National. In 2024, he finished runner-up in Scotland and Colorado, T-3 in the DP World Tour Championship in Dubai, T-4 in the Tour Championship at East Lake and T-10 in The Open at Royal Troon. Also last year, he represented the International team in his 11th consecutive Presidents Cup.

Nicolai Hojgaard Rank 79

Nicolai Højgaard is making his second Masters start. In his Masters debut in 2024, he was inside the top six after each of the first three rounds and briefly led on Saturday before finishing T-16. This year, he and twin brother Rasmus will become the first pair of twins to compete in the same Masters Tournament. He finished eighth in the Mexico Open in February. Other highlights of 2024 included finishing seventh in the Olympics for Denmark and closing the year with five consecutive top-25 performances in DP World Tour events in France, Spain, South Korea, the United Arab Emirates and South Africa. He was a member of the winning European Ryder Cup team in Italy in 2023.

Chris Kirk Rank 73

Chris Kirk is making his sixth Masters start. He has top-25 finishes at Augusta National in each of the past two years and his third-round 68 last year was the low score of the day. In 2024, he won the PGA Tour's season-opening event in Maui and after finishing T-9 in Colorado in August, he competed in his second Tour Championship at East Lake and first since 2014. In 2023, he won in Palm Beach Gardens and finished third in Honolulu and La Quinta. Before turning professional, the three-time All-American at the University of Georgia represented the United States in the Arnold Palmer Cup and Walker Cup.

Collin Morikawa Rank 4

Collin Morikawa is making his sixth Masters start. He has finished inside the top 10 in each of the past three years and has never missed the cut at Augusta National. He finished runner-up in Maui in January and the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando in March. In 2024, he finished inside the top 20 in all four majors, recorded runner-up performances in both the Memorial Tournament and Tour Championship and represented the United States in both the Olympics and Presidents Cup for the second time. He is the first to win two different major championships in his debut with his victories in the 2020 PGA Championship and the 2021 Open. Before turning professional, he represented his country in both the Arnold Palmer Cup and Walker Cup.

Tony Finau Rank 33

Tony Finau is making his eighth Masters start. He has three top-10 finishes and has never missed the cut at Augusta National. He has finished inside the top five in all four major championships, including third in the 2019 Open at Royal Portrush and T-3 in the 2024 U.S. Open at Pinehurst No. 2. In February, he finished T-5 at Torrey Pines. Highlights of 2024 include competing in his eighth Tour Championship and representing the United States in his third Presidents Cup. From 2022-2023, he won four times on the PGA Tour, winning the Mexico Open in 2023 and winning in Minnesota, Detroit and Houston in 2022.

JJ Spaun Rank 28

J.J. Spaun is making his second Masters start and first since 2022. Three years ago, he received the final Tournament invitation when he earned his first career PGA Tour win in San Antonio just four days before the opening round. His T-23 finish at Augusta National is his best performance in a major championship. Earlier this year, he finished runner-up in Palm Beach Gardens and the Players Championship in March and T-3 in Honolulu in January. In 2024, he finished T-10 in Detroit, T-9 in Minnesota, T-3 in Greensboro and T-6 in Japan. Before turning professional, he was a two-time All-American at San Diego State University.

Christian Bezuidenhout Rank 56

Christiaan Bezuidenhout is making his fourth Masters start and his first since 2022. He has made the cut in each of his three starts at Augusta National. He finished T-4 in Phoenix in February. In 2024, he competed in his first Tour Championship at East Lake, represented his country in the Olympics and the Presidents Cup for the second time and finished runner-up in La Quinta, T-3 in a DP World Tour event in Japan and fourth in the Memorial Tournament. From June 2019 – December 2020, he won four times around the world to raise his world ranking and earn his first invitations to major championships and in 2021, he earned his PGA Tour card through the Korn Ferry Tour Finals.

Mattieu Pavon Rank 52

Matthieu Pavon is making his second Masters start. He finished T-12 in his Tournament debut in 2024. Last June at Pinehurst No. 2, he finished fifth in the U.S. Open and was in the final pairing in the final round with eventual champion Bryson DeChambeau. Also last year, he earned his first career PGA Tour win in San Diego, finished third in the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, competed in his first Tour Championship at East Lake and represented France in the Olympics in Paris. In late 2023, he won the Spanish Open and finished T-5 in the DP World Tour Championship in Dubai to earn his PGA Tour card for the 2024 season.P

Ludvig Aberg Rank 5

Ludvig Åberg is making his second Masters start. In 2024, he finished runner-up in his Tournament and major debut. Since Fuzzy Zoeller won in 1979 in his first Masters start, he is one of seven to finish second in his debut, with Dan Pohl (1982), Jason Day (2011), Jonas Blixt (2014), Jordan Spieth (2014), Sungjae Im (2020) and Will Zalatoris (2021). In February, he won at Torrey Pines for his second career PGA Tour win. Other highlights of last year include finishing runner-up in Pebble Beach and Colorado, competing in his first Tour Championship at East Lake and representing Sweden in the Olympics in Paris. He turned professional in June 2023 after concluding his collegiate career at Texas Tech as the top-ranked amateur in the world.

Sungjae Im Rank 24

Sungjae Im is making his sixth Masters start. He has three top-16 finishes at Augusta National, including runner-up in his Tournament debut in 2020 and T-8 in 2022. In January, he finished third in Maui and T-4 in San Diego. Last year, he recorded top-four performances in Charlotte, Hartford and Scotland, finished T-7 in The Open at Royal Troon, competed in his sixth consecutive Tour Championship at East Lake and represented the International team in his third consecutive Presidents Cup. In October 2023 in the Asian Games in China, he won a team gold medal and an individual silver medal for South Korea. He also represented his country in the Olympics in Japan in 2021 and earned PGA Tour Rookie of the Year honors in 2019.

Justin Rose Rank 38

Justin Rose is making his 20th Masters start. He has top-25 finishes in 11 of the past 14 years at Augusta National and was runner-up in 2015 to Jordan Spieth and 2017 to Sergio Garcia. He finished T-3 in the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am and T-8 in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando earlier this year. Last July, he finished runner-up in The Open at Royal Troon after playing his way into the field through Final Qualifying. Also in 2024, he finished T-6 in the PGA Championship at Valhalla. The 2013 U.S. Open champion and 2016 Olympic Gold Medalist has represented Europe in six Ryder Cups and before turning professional, he represented Great Britain & Ireland in the 1997 Walker Cup at the age of 17.

Nicolas Echavarria* Rank 46

Nicolas Echavarria is making his Masters debut. He becomes the fourth player representing Colombia to compete in the Masters, joining Miguel Sala, Camilo Villegas and Sebastian Muñoz. In January, he finished runner-up in Honolulu. In the second half of 2024, he represented Colombia in the Olympics in Paris, earned his second career PGA Tour win in Japan and finished T-6 in Mexico and runner-up in St. Simons Island. In 2023, he won the Puerto Rico Open to become Colombia's third winner on the PGA Tour, along with Camilo Villegas and Sebastian Muñoz. Before turning professional, he represented his country in the Eisenhower Trophy and recorded top-20 finishes in each of the first three editions of the Latin America Amateur Championship.

Max Homa Rank 88

Max Homa is making his sixth Masters start. Last year, he opened with a 67 and finished T-3 at Augusta National. It was his second consecutive top-10 finish in a major, following his T-10 performance in the 2023 Open at Royal Liverpool. Later in 2024, he represented the United States in his second Presidents Cup. In 2023, he won in San Diego and South Africa, competed in his second Tour Championship at East Lake and represented the United States in his first Ryder Cup. Before turning professional, the two-time All-American at the University of California – Berkeley won the NCAA Division I Men's Golf Individual Championship and represented his country in the Walker Cup in 2013.

Viktor Hovland Rank 6

Viktor Hovland is making his fifth Masters appearance. He earned Low Amateur honors in 2019 as Norway's first Masters participant and has yet to miss a cut at Augusta National. Started 2024 with top-25 finishes in Maui and Los Angeles. He won three times in 2023, with victories in the Memorial Tournament and consecutive playoff events in Chicago and Atlanta. Also last year, he finished runner-up in the PGA Championship at Oak Hill, recorded top 20s in both the U.S. Open and The Open and went 3-1-1 for the winning European team in the Ryder Cup.

Tom Kim Rank 21

Tom Kim is making his second Masters appearance. Was T-16 in 2023 in his debut at Augusta National. Went on to qualify for his first Tour Championship at East Lake after finishing T-8 in the U.S. Open at The Los Angeles Country Club, T-6 in the Scottish Open and runner-up in The Open at Royal Liverpool. In October, he earned his third career PGA Tour win with a successful title defense in Las Vegas.

Adam Scott Rank 52

Adam Scott is making his 23rd Masters appearance. In 2013, he made birdie on the second playoff hole at No. 10 in the late-afternoon rain at Augusta National to defeat Angel Cabrera and earn Australia's first Green Jacket. Has made the cut in 20 of his 22 Masters starts, including each of the past 14 years. Finished T-7 in Dubai in January and T-8 in Phoenix in February. In the last four months of 2023, he recorded top-seven finishes in Bermuda, both the Australian PGA Championship and Australian Open and the DP World Tour's flagship event in England. In addition to his 14 wins on the PGA Tour, he has represented the International team in each of the past 10 Presidents Cups.

Austin Eckroat Rank 50

Austin Eckroat is making his first Masters appearance. Won in Palm Beach Gardens in March to earn his first career PGA Tour win. In 2023 as a rookie on the PGA Tour, he had four top-10 finishes, including runner-up in the AT&T Byron Nelson in Texas, fifth in the Dominican Republic, T-8 in St. Simons Island and T-10 in the U.S. Open at The Los Angeles Country Club. His top-10 performance in the U.S. Open included shooting a first-nine 29 in the final round to tie the championship record for lowest nine-hole score.

Nick Dunlap Rank 69

Nick Dunlap is making his first Masters appearance. In January, he became the first amateur to win on the PGA Tour since Phil Mickelson in 1991 with his victory in La Quinta, California. After his victory, he moved up over 4,000 places in the Official World Golf Ranking to No. 68 and, the day before he turned professional in January, became No. 1 in the World Amateur Golf Ranking. Last August, he won the U.S. Amateur at Cherry Hills Country Club in Colorado after defeating Neal Shipley in the final, 4&3. Joined Tiger Woods as the only winners of both the U.S. Junior and Amateur Championship titles and joined a list that includes Bobby Jones, Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer and Woods as winners of the Havemeyer Trophy

Patrick Cantlay Rank 7

Patrick Cantlay is making his eighth Masters appearance. He earned Low Amateur honors in 2012 and has finished inside the top 20 at Augusta National in three of the past five years. Recorded top-12 finishes in Maui, Pebble Beach and Los Angeles to start 2024. In 2023, he recorded seven top-five finishes on the PGA Tour, finished inside the top 15 in three of the four majors and qualified for his sixth Tour Championship at East Lake. He was the PGA Tour Player of the Year in 2021.

Min Woo Lee Rank 32

Min Woo Lee is making his third Masters appearance. Finished T-14 in his debut at Augusta National in 2022 and his final-round 70 included a Tournament record-tying 30 on the first nine. Finished runner-up in Palm Beach Gardens in March. Last June, he moved inside the top 50 in the Official World Golf Ranking with a T-5 finish in the U.S. Open at The Los Angeles Country Club. He secured his place there with wins in the Macao Open and Australian PGA Championship and top-15 finishes in England, Ireland, Japan, Dubai and the United States later in 2023.

Matthieu Pavon Rank 24

Matthieu Pavon is making his first Masters appearance. Finished fifth in a DP World Tour event in Singapore in March. Won in San Diego in January to earn his first career PGA Tour win and finished third in the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am the following week. In October and November 2023, he won the Spanish Open for his first career DP World Tour win, recorded top 15s in events in St Andrews, Spain and South Africa and birdied his last four holes in the DP World Tour Championship in Dubai to finish T-5 and earn one of 10 PGA Tour cards for the 2024 season. Two weeks before winning in San Diego, he finished T-7 in Honolulu in his first start as a PGA Tour member. His best finish in four previous major starts is T-25 in the 2018 U.S. Open at Shinnecock Hills.

Cameron Davis Rank 60

Cameron Davis is making his second Masters appearance, and his first since 2022. Last May, he shot a final-round 65 in the PGA Championship at Oak Hill to finish T-4. It was his best performance in a major and earned him his second invitation to the Masters. Finished T-18 in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in March. He was rarely outside the top 12 in the last five months of 2023, finishing third in Napa, T-6 in Memphis, T-7 in Greensboro, Las Vegas and the Australian PGA Championship, T-10 in Minnesota and T-12 in Japan. He won the Australian Open in 2017 and earned his first career PGA Tour win in Detroit in 2021. Finished in the top four in the Asia-Pacific Amateur Championship in 2015 and 2016.

Lee Hodges Rank 72

Lee Hodges is making his first Masters appearance. Finished T-12 in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando in March. Last July in Minnesota, he led after all four rounds and defeated three players by seven strokes to earn his first career PGA Tour win. Other 2023 highlights included finishing T-12 in both the Memorial Tournament and the Scottish Open and making his debut in both the PGA Championship and The Open.

LUDVIG ABERG Rank 9

Ludvig Åberg is making his first Masters appearance and his major championship debut. Finished runner-up in the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am in February and eighth in The Players Championship in March. Last June, he concluded his collegiate career at Texas Tech as the top-ranked amateur in the world and the recipient of the Fred Haskins, Ben Hogan and Jack Nicklaus Player of the Year awards. The three-time First Team All-American turned professional having already gained PGA Tour membership. He earned his first DP World Tour win in September in Switzerland, was part of the winning European Ryder Cup team in Italy in October and earned his first PGA Tour win in St. Simons Island in November. He started 2023 outside the top 3,000 in the Official World Golf Ranking and ended the year inside the top 30.

Shane Lowry Rank 33

Shane Lowry is making his ninth Masters appearance. Has top 25s in each of the past four years at Augusta National. In consecutive weeks in March, finished T-4 in Palm Beach Gardens and third in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando. Highlights of 2023 included finishing T-3 in the Irish Open, recording top 20s in both the PGA Championship and U.S. Open and representing Europe in the Ryder Cup for the second consecutive edition. Won the 2019 Open at Royal Portrush and has top-four finishes in all four major championships. He also represented Ireland in the Olympics in Japan in 2021 and won the DP World Tour's flagship event in England in 2022.

Sepp Straka Rank 29

Sepp Straka is making his third Masters appearance. Finished T-12 in Maui in January and T-16 in The Players Championship in March. In 2023, the University of Georgia graduate followed a T-7 finish in the PGA Championship by winning in Illinois for his second career PGA Tour victory, finishing runner-up in The Open at Royal Liverpool and qualifying for his second consecutive Tour Championship at East Lake. He was also a member of the winning European Ryder Cup team in Italy.

Patrick Reed

Patrick Reed is making his 11th Masters appearance. Finished T-4 last year for his fourth top 10 in the past six years at Augusta National. Won the 2018 Masters by one stroke over Rickie Fowler and by two over Jordan Spieth. That year, he led after the second and third rounds and won with a score of 15-under-par 273. Last month, he finished fourth in Macao. In 2023, he finished T-18 in the PGA Championship at Oak Hill and recorded top-15 finishes in events in Dubai, Indonesia and Hong Kong.

Phil Mickelson Rank 161

Phil Mickelson is making his 31st Masters appearance. Shot a final-round 65 last year to finish runner-up and record both the lowest round and highest finish by a player 50 and older in Masters history. The World Golf Hall of Fame member is one of eight to win at least three Masters and one of three with Jack Nicklaus and Tiger Woods to finish inside the top five at least 12 times at Augusta National. He won the Silver Cup as Low Amateur in his Masters debut in 1991. In May 2021, at the age of 50, Mickelson won the PGA Championship at Kiawah Island in South Carolina to become the oldest player to win a major. Was a member of every United States Ryder Cup and Presidents Cup team between 1994 and 2018.

Hideki Matsuyama Rank 14

Hideki Matsuyama is making his 13th Masters appearance. Has top 20s in eight of the past nine years at Augusta National. When he won his Green Jacket in 2021, he became Japan's first male major champion and strengthened a connection to the Masters that already included two Asia-Pacific Amateur Championship victories in 2010 and 2011 and the Silver Cup as Low Amateur at Augusta National in 2011. He is one of seven Low Amateurs to go on to win the Masters with Cary Middlecoff, Jack Nicklaus, Ben Crenshaw, Tiger Woods, Phil Mickelson and Sergio Garcia. He has top-six finishes in all four majors, including runner-up in the 2017 U.S. Open at Erin Hills in Wisconsin. Won in Los Angeles in February for his first victory in over two years and finished T-6 in The Players Championship in March

Tyrrell Hatton Rank 17

Tyrrell Hatton is making his eighth Masters appearance. In 2023, he qualified for the Tour Championship at East Lake for the second time. Also last year, he finished runner-up in the flagship events of the PGA Tour and DP World Tour in Ponte Vedra Beach and England, recorded top-six performances in both the Canadian and Scottish Opens, made the cut in all four majors and represented Europe in his third Ryder Cup. His worldwide victories include both the PGA Tour's Arnold Palmer Invitational and DP World Tour's flagship event in 2020 as well as consecutive DP World Tour wins in St Andrews in 2016 and 2017.

Justin Rose Rank 107

Justin Rose is making his 19th Masters appearance. Has top-25 finishes in 14 of his 18 starts at Augusta National, including 11 of the past 13 years. Finished T-11 in the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am in February. In 2023, he won the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, recorded top 10s in the Players Championship, Canadian Open and PGA Championship and represented Europe in the Ryder Cup for the sixth time in his career. The 2013 U.S. Open champion and 2016 Olympic Gold Medalist has earned worldwide wins on six different continents.

Bryson DeChambeau

Rank 208

"Par 68."

Camillo Villegas Rank 162

Camilo Villegas is making his seventh Masters appearance, and his first since 2015. It is also his first start in a major championship since 2015. In consecutive weeks in November, he finished runner-up to Erik van Rooyen in Mexico and then won in Bermuda for his fifth career PGA Tour win and first since 2014. In between those victories, he and his wife Maria mourned the loss of their 22-month-old daughter Mia to cancer in July 2020 and welcomed their son Mateo in December 2021. After winning in Bermuda, Villegas looked up to the sky and said, "I've got my little one up there watching."

Max Homa Rank 10

Max Homa is making his fifth Masters appearance. Has four top-20 finishes worldwide in 2024, including T-8 in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando in March. After starting his 2023 by winning in San Diego and recording top-three finishes in Maui and Los Angeles, he went on to close his PGA Tour season with five consecutive top-12 finishes, including T-10 in The Open, T-5 in Chicago and T-9 in the Tour Championship at East Lake. Has represented the United States in cup competitions in each of the past two years, going 4-0-0 in the 2022 Presidents Cup in North Carolina and 3-1-1 in the 2023 Ryder Cup in Italy. Won a DP World Tour event in South Africa last November for his first victory outside the United States.

Will Zalatoris Rank 30

Will Zalatoris is making his third Masters appearance. In his first two starts at Augusta National, he finished runner-up and one stroke behind Hideki Matsuyama in 2021 and T-6 in 2022. He has six top-eight finishes in major championships, including runner-up in both the PGA Championship and U.S. Open in 2022. After withdrawing prior to starting last year's Masters, he underwent back surgery and missed the rest of the PGA Tour season. Following his return to competition, he finished runner-up in Los Angeles in February and T-4 in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando in March. In 2022, he earned his first career PGA Tour win in a playoff event in Memphis.

Nicolai Hogaard Rank 37

Nicolai Højgaard is making his first Masters appearance. He was runner-up in San Diego and T-7 in Dubai in January. In consecutive weeks last November, he finished runner-up in South Africa and won the DP World Tour Championship in Dubai. Earlier in 2023, he recorded top-six finishes in Thailand, the Dominican Republic, Italy, Scotland, the Czech Republic and Switzerland and was a member of the winning European Ryder Cup team. Both he and his twin brother Rasmus have multiple wins on the DP World Tour and in 2021, they won in consecutive weeks with Rasmus winning in Switzerland and Nicolai winning in Italy.

Kurt Kitayama Rank 41

Kurt Kitayama is making his second Masters appearance. In last year's PGA Championship at Oak Hill, he shot a final-round 65 to finish T-4 and earn a return invitation to Augusta National. Finished T-8 in Phoenix in February and T-19 in The Players Championship in March. In 2023, he earned his first career PGA Tour win in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando and reached the quarterfinals of the Match Play in Austin. In 2022, he moved inside the top 50 in the Official World Golf Ranking for the first time with runner-up finishes in Mexico, Scotland and South Carolina.

Gary Woodland Rank 134

Gary Woodland is making his 12th Masters appearance. In 2023, he opened with 68 for his lowest round at Augusta National and went on to finish T-14 to record his best performance in the Masters. Recorded additional top 25s in Los Angeles, Charlotte, Scotland and the Memorial Tournament last year. Won the 2019 U.S. Open by three strokes over two-time defending champion Brooks Koepka. Joined the list of major champions at Pebble Beach that also includes Jack Nicklaus, Lanny Wadkins, Tom Watson, Tom Kite, Tiger Woods and Graeme McDowell. In September, he underwent surgery to remove a brain lesion and returned to competitive golf four months later.

Jordan Spieth Rank 19

Jordan Spieth is making his 11th Masters appearance. Has top-four finishes in six of his 10 starts at Augusta National. In 2015, he won the Masters by four strokes over Phil Mickelson and Justin Rose in wire-to-wire fashion with a then-record-tying score of 18-under-par 270. Joined Tiger Woods as the only champions to win their Green Jacket at 21. He would go on to win the U.S. Open at Chambers Bay in 2015 and The Open at Royal Birkdale in 2017. Finished third in Maui in January and T-6 in Phoenix in February. Last year, he finished runner-up in Hilton Head Island, qualified for his eighth Tour Championship and represented the U.S. in his fifth Ryder Cup.

Tony Finau Rank 26

Tony Finau is making his seventh Masters appearance. Has made the cut in each of his six appearances at Augusta National, including top-10 finishes in 2018, 2019 and 2021. Finished T-6 in San Diego in January and T-13 in the Mexico Open in February. After starting 2023 with top 25s in each of his first eight worldwide starts, he won the Mexico Open for his sixth career PGA Tour win, finished T-7 in his title defense in Minnesota and qualified for the Tour Championship at East Lake for the seventh consecutive year. The Utah native has won five times on the PGA Tour in the past three years and has represented the U.S. in two Ryder Cups and two Presidents Cups.

Denny McCarthy Rank 51

Denny McCarthy is making his first Masters appearance. Recorded top-25 finishes in Honolulu and Phoenix to start 2024. After a T-4 performance in the 2023 AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, he finished runner-up in the Memorial Tournament and added a T-20 in the U.S. Open at The Los Angeles Country Club followed by top 10s in Hartford and Illinois. Closed last year with a T-5 finish in St. Simons Island. Recorded his first top 10 in major in the 2022 U.S. Open at The Country Club in Massachusetts after closing 68-68 to finish T-7.

Ryan Fox Rank 49

Ryan Fox is making his second Masters appearance. Finished T-14 in the Dubai Invitational in January. In the last four months of 2023, he won the DP World Tour's flagship event in England and finished runner-up in St Andrews and T-3 in the Irish Open. Also made the cut in all four major championships last year. He had started 2023 by winning the Seve Ballesteros Award as the 2022 DP World Tour Player of the Year in a vote by his fellow players after recording eight top-four finishes that season.

Danny Willet Rank 245

Danny Willett is making his 10th Masters appearance. In 2016, he shot a final-round 67 at Augusta National to turn a three-stroke deficit into a three-stroke victory over defending champion Jordan Spieth and Lee Westwood. He became England's first Masters champion since Nick Faldo won his third Green Jacket in 1996. The former top-ranked amateur in the world has won both the DP World Tour's flagship event in England and its season-ending Tour Championship in Dubai and has represented his country in the Walker Cup, Ryder Cup and the Olympics.

Matt Fitzpatrick Rank 11

Matt Fitzpatrick is making his 10th Masters appearance. Has finished inside the top 15 in each of the past two years at Augusta National. Finished fifth in The Players Championship in March. In 2023, he celebrated emotional wins with his family in Hilton Head Island and St Andrews, recorded additional top-three finishes in Chicago and Switzerland, qualified for his second consecutive Tour Championship at East Lake and was part of the winning European Ryder Cup team in Italy. In 2022, he won the U.S. Open at The Country Club in Brookline, Massachusetts, the same course where he won the 2013 U.S. Amateur.

Sam Burns Rank 20

Sam Burns is making his third Masters appearance. Recorded top-10 finishes in La Quinta, Pebble Beach, Phoenix and Los Angeles to start 2024. In 2023, he qualified for his third consecutive Tour Championship at East Lake after winning the Match Play in Austin, finishing sixth in two title defenses in Tampa and Fort Worth and recording additional top 20s in the Memorial Tournament, Scottish Open and a playoff event in Chicago later in the season. He also made his debut as a member of the United States Ryder Cup team last year in Italy.

Byeong Hun An Rank 42

Byeong Hun An is making his fifth Masters appearance, his first since 2020. Made his Tournament debut in 2010 as the 18-year-old reigning U.S. Amateur champion. Finished fourth in Maui and runner-up in Honolulu in consecutive weeks in January and T-8 in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando in March. Last year, he finished T-3 in the Scottish Open, T-23 in The Open at Royal Liverpool in England and runner-up in Greensboro. In 2015, he won the DP World Tour's flagship event at Wentworth Club in England and received that tour's Sir Henry Cotton Rookie of the Year award. Represented his country in both the 2016 Olympics and the 2019 Presidents Cup.

Jake Knapp Rank 48

Jake Knapp is making his first Masters appearance. This is his second major-championship start and first since he competed in the 2015 U.S. Open at Chambers Bay as an amateur. Won the Mexico Open in February for his first career PGA Tour win. The 2024 PGA Tour rookie also finished T-3 in San Diego in January and T-4 in Palm Beach Gardens in March. Last year, he earned his PGA Tour card after finishing inside the top 30 on the Korn Ferry Tour's season-long points list with 10 top-10 finishes. Won three PGA Tour Canada events in 2019-2022.

Charl Schwartzel Rank 382

Charl Schwartzel is making his 15th Masters appearance. In 2011 at Augusta National, he was four strokes off the lead entering the final round and closed with second-nine birdies at hole Nos. 15, 16, 17 and 18 to win by two over Jason Day and Adam Scott. He won the 75th Masters Tournament 50 years after fellow South African Gary Player became the first international champion in 1961. He is one of three South Africans to win the Green Jacket, with three-time champion Player and 2008 champion Trevor Immelman. In the 2017 Masters, he finished third and three strokes out of the Sergio Garcia – Justin Rose playoff.

Brian Harman Rank 8

Brian Harman is making his sixth Masters appearance. Finished runner-up in The Players Championship in March and T-5 in Maui in January. Won The 151st Open at Royal Liverpool by six strokes over four players to join Bob Charles, Mike Weir, Phil Mickelson and Bubba Watson as left-handed major champions. Also last year, he advanced to the Tour Championship at East Lake for the third time and represented the United States in the Ryder Cup for the first time.

Jason Day Rank 22

Jason Day is making his 13th Masters appearance. He finished runner-up in his debut at Augusta National in 2011 and also finished third in 2013 and T-5 in 2019. Recorded top-10 finishes in Maui, Pebble Beach and Los Angeles to start 2024. After starting 2023 with top 20s in each of his first seven worldwide starts, he won the AT&T Byron Nelson in Texas in May to earn his 13th career PGA Tour win and end a five-year winless drought. Finished runner-up in The Open at Royal Liverpool in July and in August, qualified for the Tour Championship at East Lake for the first time since 2018.

Stephan Jaeger Rank 43

Stephan Jaeger is making his first Masters appearance and his fifth major championship start. Won in Houston on March 31 by one stroke over five players, including World No. 1 Scottie Scheffler and defending champion Tony Finau, to earn his first career PGA Tour victory. Also finished T-3 in San Diego in January and in the Mexico Open in February. During the 2022-2023 PGA Tour season, he made the cut in 30 of his 33 starts with 10 top-25 finishes, including T-9 in Houston and Detroit. Won six times on the Korn Ferry Tour between 2016 and 2021, winning at least once in three consecutive seasons in 2016, 2017 and 2018.

Emiliano Grillo Rank 36

Emiliano Grillo is making his fourth Masters appearance, his first since 2019. Has five top-25 finishes worldwide in 2024, including T-7 in Honolulu in January and T-8 in the Arnold Palmer Invitational in Orlando in March. Last year, he defeated Adam Schenk in a playoff in Fort Worth in May to earn his second career PGA Tour win and his first since 2015. He celebrated winning on the same golf course as Argentine legend and 1967 Open champion Roberto De Vicenzo who won at Colonial Country Club in 1957. Went on to finish T-6 in The Open at Royal Liverpool and qualify for his second Tour Championship at East Lake.

Sergio Garcia Rank 648

Sergio Garcia is making his 25th Masters appearance 25 years after his Augusta National debut in 1999. In 2017, Garcia defeated Justin Rose in a playoff to follow Seve Ballesteros and Jose Maria Olazabal as Masters champions representing Spain. Like Jon Rahm in 2023, Garcia won on what would have been Ballesteros' birthday on April 9. As the 19-year-old reigning Amateur champion in 1999, he finished T-38 to earn the Silver Cup as Low Amateur on the same day that Olazabal won the second of his two Masters titles.

Jose Maria Olazabal

Rank 4223

José María Olazábal is making his 35th Masters appearance. He is celebrating multiple Masters anniversaries this year. 40 years ago in 1984, he won The Amateur Championship at Formby in England to earn his first invitation. 30 years ago in 1994, he won his first Green Jacket with a two-stroke victory over Tom Lehman. And 25 years ago in 1999, he defeated Davis Love III by two strokes to join his hero, friend and fellow Spaniard Seve Ballesteros as a two-time champion. Has 13 top-15 finishes at Augusta National.

Brooks Koepka Rank 31

Brooks Koepka is making his ninth Masters appearance. Led for most of last year's Masters before finishing runner-up at Augusta National for the second time. Has top 12s in four of his past six Masters starts. One month later, he won the PGA Championship at Oak Hill by two strokes over Viktor Hovland and Scottie Scheffler for his third PGA Championship and fifth major championship victory. Joined Gene Sarazen and Sam Snead as three-time PGA champions and Byron Nelson, Peter Thomson and Seve Ballesteros as five-time major champions. Also represented the United States in the Ryder Cup for the fourth time in 2023.

Sahith Theegala Rank 15

Sahith Theegala is making his second Masters appearance. Last April at Augusta National, he made seven birdies in his final-round 67 to finish ninth in his Masters debut. Has four top-10 finishes worldwide in 2024, including runner-up in Maui in January and T-6 in the Arnold Palmer Invitational and T-9 in The Players Championship in consecutive weeks in March. Last September, he earned an emotional first career PGA Tour win in front of more than 30 family and friends in Napa, California.

Eric Cole Rank 38

Eric Cole is making his first Masters appearance. Has six top-25 finishes worldwide in 2024, including T-10 in Los Angeles in February and T-13 in Honolulu in January. Moved inside the top 50 in the Official World Golf Ranking with top-three finishes in Palm Beach Gardens, Japan, Las Vegas and St. Simons Island last year. The 2023 PGA Tour Rookie of the Year had seven other top 15s last year, including runner-up in Palm Beach Gardens, fourth in Napa and T-15 in the PGA Championship.

Harris English Rank 40

Harris English is making his fifth Masters appearance. Has six top-25 finishes worldwide in 2024, including seventh in Los Angeles in February and T-10 in Honolulu in January. Last year, he had seven top 15s worldwide, including runner-up in the Arnold Palmer Invitational, T-3 in Charlotte and T-8 in the U.S. Open at The Los Angeles Country Club. Has top 10s in the U.S. Open in three of the past four years, finishing fourth in 2020 at Winged Foot and third in 2021 at Torrey Pines. Has represented the United States in both the Walker Cup and the Ryder Cup.

Tiger Woods Rank 950

Tiger Woods is making his 26th Masters appearance. In 2023, the five-time champion and 1995 Low Amateur made more history at Augusta National when he tied Gary Player and Fred Couples for most consecutive Tournament cuts made with 23. He is one of three with at least four Masters wins with Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer. Since rewriting the history books with his 12-stroke victory in the 1997 Masters, the World Golf Hall of Fame member has gone on to earn 15 major championship titles and 82 PGA Tour wins.

Vijay Singh Rank 4223

Vijay Singh is making his 31st Masters appearance. Won the 2000 Masters by three strokes over Ernie Els for the first of his six top-eight finishes in a seven-year stretch at Augusta National. The World Golf Hall of Fame member won 34 times in his career on the PGA Tour, including the 1998 PGA Championship at Sahalee Country Club near Seattle, Washington and the 2004 PGA Championship at Whistling Straits in Wisconsin. In 2023, he had eight top 10s on the PGA Tour Champions, including a win in Michigan and a third-place finish in The Senior Open in Wales.

Cameron Young Rank 13

Cameron Young is making his third Masters appearance. Two weeks after finishing runner-up to Sam Burns in the Match Play in Austin, he finished T-7 at Augusta National to record his third top 10 in a major championship to go with his T-3 in the PGA Championship at Southern Hills and runner-up in The 150th Open at St Andrews in 2022. Has three top-10 finishes worldwide in 2024, including third in Dubai in January and T-4 in Palm Beach Gardens in March. Last July, he finished T-8 in The Open at Royal Liverpool for his fourth top 10 in a major. Named the 2022 PGA Tour Rookie of the Year after finishing inside the top three seven times that season.

Justin Thomas Rank 28

Justin Thomas is making his ninth Masters appearance. Has top 25s in six of the past seven years at Augusta National, finishing fourth in 2020 and T-8 in 2022. The 30-year-old is a two-time PGA champion, winning in 2017 at Quail Hollow in North Carolina and in 2022 at Southern Hills in Oklahoma. Has four top-12 finishes worldwide in La Quinta, Pebble Beach, Phoenix and Orlando this year. In the last five months of 2023, he recorded top-12 finishes in Greensboro, Napa and South Africa and represented the United States in the Ryder Cup.

Si Woo Kim Rank 45

Si Woo Kim is making his eighth Masters appearance. Has made the cut in each of the past six years at Augusta National, including top 25s in 2018, 2019 and 2021. Finished T-6 in The Players Championship in March and recorded top-15 finishes in Pebble Beach and Phoenix in February. In 2023, he won in Honolulu, recorded top-four finishes in both the AT&T Byron Nelson and the Memorial Tournament and qualified for his second Tour Championship at East Lake. Last October in the Asian Games in China, he won a team gold medal for Korea.

Adam Hadwin Rank 46

Adam Hadwin is making his fourth Masters appearance, his first since 2020. Has three top 10s in 2024, finishing T-6 in La Quinta in January, T-4 in Los Angeles in February and T-5 in Tampa in March. Last year, he recorded three runner-up performances in New Orleans, Detroit and Las Vegas. Other high finishes in 2023 included T-10 in Phoenix, T-12 in the Canadian Open and T-13 in the Players Championship. He earned his first career PGA Tour win in 2017 in Tampa and represented the International team in the Presidents Cup in 2017 and 2019.

Zach Johnson Rank 244

Zach Johnson is making his 20th Masters appearance. In 2007, he won in challenging weather at Augusta National with a score of one-over-par 289 that tied the Tournament record for highest winning total set by Sam Snead in 1954 and matched by Jack Burke Jr. in 1956. He played the par-five holes in 11 under and never attempted to reach the greens at hole Nos. 2, 8, 13 and 15 in two strokes that week. The 2015 Open champion is one of six to win majors at Augusta National and St Andrews, with Snead, Jack Nicklaus, Seve Ballesteros, Nick Faldo and Tiger Woods.

Mike Weir Rank 1922

Mike Weir is making his 25th Masters appearance. In 2003, he defeated Len Mattiace in a playoff to become Canada's first male major champion. He also became the second left-handed major champion and first since New Zealand's Bob Charles won The Open in 1963. He led the field in scrambling that week, successfully getting up and down from off Augusta National's greens 26 of 34 times. Later this year, he will captain the International Presidents Cup team at Royal Montreal Golf Club in Canada.

Collin Morikawa Rank 16

Collin Morikawa is making his fifth Masters appearance. Has made the cut in each of his four appearances at Augusta National, including top-10 finishes in 2022 and 2023. Finished inside the top 15 in Maui and Pebble Beach to start 2024. Last year, the 2020 PGA and 2021 Open champion won in Japan for his sixth career PGA Tour victory, recorded runner-up finishes in Maui and Detroit, qualified for his fourth consecutive Tour Championship at East Lake and represented the U.S. in the Ryder Cup for the second time.

Tommy Fleetwood

Rank 12

Tommy Fleetwood is making his eighth Masters appearance. Has finished inside the top 20 in three of the past six years at Augusta National. Won the DP World Tour's Dubai Invitational in January. In 2023, he finished runner-up in both the Canadian Open and the DP World Tour's season-ending event in Dubai, recorded top 10s in both the U.S. Open and The Open, qualified for the Tour Championship at East Lake for the third time and secured the clinching point for Europe in the Ryder Cup in Italy. The Southport, England native has seven top 10s in major championships, including runner-up performances in the 2018 U.S. Open and 2019 Open.

Akshay Bhatia Rank 87

Akshay Bhatia is making his first Masters appearance and his second major championship start. By winning in San Antonio on the day of the 10th playing of the Drive, Chip and Putt National Finals, the 2014 National Finalist became the first participant to earn an invitation to the Masters. Has five other top-20 finishes worldwide in 2024, including T-11 in Houston and T-17 in Tampa in March. In 2023, he earned his first career PGA Tour win in Truckee, California, was runner-up in Puerto Rico and finished fourth in the Mexico Open. Won on the Korn Ferry Tour in 2022.

J.T. Poston Rank 44

J.T. Poston is making his third Masters appearance. Recorded top-12 finishes in Maui, Honolulu, La Quinta and Los Angeles to start 2024. Had eight top-12 finishes on the PGA Tour last year, including runner-up in Minnesota, T-3 in Las Vegas, T-6 in Illinois and Scotland in consecutive weeks and T-7 in Greensboro in the second half of 2023. He also made the cut in three of the four major championships last year. In 2022, he won in Illinois in wire-to-wire fashion and qualified for his first Tour Championship at East Lake. Earned his first PGA Tour win in 2019 in Greensboro after playing 72 holes without a bogey.

Bubba Watson Rank 2012

Bubba Watson is making his 16th Masters appearance. He is one of just 17 to have won the Masters more than once. In 2012, he defeated Louis Oosthuizen with the help of a spectacular 52-degree wedge shot from the trees on the second playoff hole on No. 10. Two years later in 2014, he won his second Masters by three strokes over Tournament rookies Jonas Blixt and Jordan Spieth. He also finished T-5 in 2018 and has made the cut in 13 of his 15 starts at Augusta National.

Fred Couples Rank 1395

Fred Couples is making his 39th Masters appearance. Won the 1992 Masters as World No. 1 by two strokes over 1976 champion Raymond Floyd. In 2023, he made more history at Augusta National when he became the oldest to ever make the Tournament cut at 63 years, 6 months, 5 days of age and moved into second place behind Jack Nicklaus in total cuts made with 31. He has 11 top-10 finishes at Augusta National and has completed 72 holes in the Masters in five different decades. The World Golf Hall of Fame member also made a record-tying 23 consecutive cuts in the Masters in 1983-2007.
