2022 Carter Bradley First Amendment Award

The independent student news outlet of the University of Oklahoma since 1916, the staff of **OU Daily** are the 2022 Carter Bradley First Amendment Award recipients.

Along with the more publicized efforts to monitor the football team's brewing quarterback controversy via the journalism school windows near the practice field, the staff spent 2021 finding ways to hold community and campus officials accountable.

In February, the staff broke down data from the Norman Police Department that showed on a per capita basis, the city's Black residents were three times more likely than their white neighbors to be contacted, arrested or have force used against them by the police.

In October, the staff published a magazine-length feature that was distributed to every mailbox on campus, examining how university handles records requests, including the response times in comparison to other universities and resources available to to the school's records office.

2022 Teacher of the Year

The head of the mass communication program at Rose State College in Midwest City, **Darcy Delaney-Nelson** built her department from scratch.

As mass communication program head, she teaches Introduction to Mass Media, Media Writing, News Reporting, Mass Communication Participation, Mass Communication Capstone, Mass Communication Internship and Desktop Publishing courses at Rose State.

She also advises the student publications “The 15th Street News and “6420 magazine.” Under her leadership, the 6420 released its first edition in Spring 2018. The magazine provides the community with a local, in-depth look at news events and entertainment that affect the campus. The campus newspaper is strongly student-centered from consideration to production and reporting of campus news as a diverse news voice of Rose State College.

Delaney-Nelson earned a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in journalism and mass communication and a minor in sociology from the University of Oklahoma. While attending the University of Oklahoma, she was a working news writer at The Sun newspaper in Midwest City for three years producing News editorial content, which included news and feature articles, obituaries, photos and Web content.

Delaney-Nelson completed the master’s program at the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication in 2010. While at OU, she served as graduate assistant for Visiting Professor Warren Vieth, as well as Dr. Julie Jones and Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist John Schmeltzer for various mass communication courses.

2022 Frank Greer Lifetime Achievement Award

An enrolled citizen of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation and of Cherokee heritage, Gary D. Fife with almost 50 years of experience in print, radio and television.

Currently with the Okmulgee-based Mvskoke Media, he has specialized in national Indigenous and governmental affairs, including spending more than a decade reporting from Washington D.C.

After attending Northeastern State University in Tahlequah and an affiliate campus of Missouri's Westminster College, Fife moved to Alaska in the 1970s for the prospect of founding an Indigenous-focused radio program. That program became the first Native weekday radio news service, "National Native News." At its peak, the program was carried on 181 public radio stations, across the country. During Fife's tenure, the service won eight national awards in its first seven years.

"National Native News" began national carriage with National Public Radio and was later switched to American Public Radio.

Through the course of his career, Fife has numerous awards in national and state press competitions, three legislative citations from the State of Alaska and the Governor's Community Service Medal. In 1978, he was the first Native American recipient of a Ford Fellowship in educational journalism. He has held an internship as a guest editor on the national desk of NPR.

Along with a regular column in Mvskoke Media's newspaper, Fife hosts a weekly radio show.
