




























## **EDUCATION**

## AM I CAUSING CONFUSION?

Joshua is going to be in his first Beginner Novice Obedience trial next weekend. I am starting to second guess his readiness. I mull over in my mind if I had mindfully used corrections, would his performance be more reliable? I ask myself have I done my dogs a disservice by not clearly telling them when they are right and when they are wrong? Should I have been more consistent using a conditioner reinforcer- a marker word? After all this self doubt, I then look at my dogs in awe and I am amazed at what they have learned from me. My next thoughts are exactly how did I teach them all this? What guides my training? I do have some principles I use to train by that work really well for teaching all the exercises except heeling. Somehow applying them to heeling, they fly out the window. I keep going back in my mind to a lecture I heard at the Vollhard Dog Training Camp this past April. I ask myself if I had a better understanding of Operant Conditioning would my training for heeling be more reliable? This article is just as much for me as it for my readers as I go back and review my notes from camp. I have attended the Vollahrd Camp for four years. It is part classroom lecture, part hands on training, and all fun. Mary Ann Rombold- Zeigenfuse gives the lecture on Operant Conditioning which I have now heard four times. Each year I glean a little more understanding. Just a side note. There is Classical Conditioning and Operant Conditioning. The difference in the two lies in how a behavior is developed. Classical Conditioning is associated with Pavlov and his drooling dogs. He paired a neutral stimulus with a conditioned response. In Classical Conditioning the stimulus comes first. The response or behavior is involuntary. Operant Conditioning is associated with Skinner and his rats. Operant Conditioning involves either encouraging or discouraging a behavior. In Operant Conditioning the behavior is paired with a consequence. In Operant Conditioning a behavior comes first. It is followed by a reward or punishment. In Operant Conditioning positive means to add something and negative means to take away something. Reinforcement means that one is trying to build or encourage a behavior or action. Punishment means one is trying to eliminate or discourage a behavior. There are four quadrants. One is Positive Reinforcement. Here one is going to add something the dog likes to encourage the behavior. The dog dictates what he finds rewarding and also what he finds undesirable. Another is Positive Punishment. One is going to add an aversive as the unwanted behavior is occurring. Here a person wants to eliminate the behavior. No reward follows. Another is Negative Reinforcement in which one wants to increase the behavior by taking away the aversive. The discomfort ends when the desired behavior is achieved. A reward then follows. A leash pop would be an example here. The last is Negative Punishment in which one removes something the dog likes and doesn't want removed in order to decrease the behavior. Mary Ann emphasized a key here is to know if one is trying to build a behavior or eliminate a behavior. She also pointed out the last behavior that the dog does is what in his mind the dog thinks he is being rewarded or punished for. An example would be if I am heeling along and I am very pleased with the heeling. Instead of stopping and rewarding the dog in heel position, the dog sits and I then reward the dog. I have just rewarded the sit and not the heeling. So in my mind and probably my mind only this brings me full circle to Joshua's heeling and his readiness for the upcoming trial. We are heeling along beautifully and he looks away at the delicious hotdog someone is holding on the side of the ring. I want to build the behavior of his focus on me, but I also want to eliminate his looking longly at the hotdog. If I follow Mary Ann correctly the key here is am I praising or not praising his behavior. I definitely am not praising his behavior when he looks longingly at the hotdog. This is where I get stuck. Logic would tell me to correct the looking away. But my heart says I am trying to build the behavior so give him the benefit of the doubt. And with patience and practice he will learn to focus on me. She did discuss in our lecture that the quadrants can be fluid and it can be a very line in which quadrant one is. Here is where the rubber meets the road. If I am very honest with myself, my trainer in the most kindest way refers to me as a weenie. My default is to encourage Joshua with a click of my tongue, telling him whoops, or some other benign action to encourage his focus back on me. But do these really communicate to him that he is wrong? Do these just muddy the water for him? Is this essentially a wasted training time? I am back to my original quandary would I be better more fair trainer to my dogs if I gave a more clear expectations of what is right and what is wrong? Most important to me is I want to be the best trainer to my dogs. Could not giving a clear right or wrong be undermining our relationship and negatively impacting their response to what I consider our cherished time training together? Mary Ann also said something in her lecture that I find very convicting. She defined ring wise in a dog as we are removing something that the dog wants- possibly our praise, our relaxed training attitude and that the dog views this is as negative punishment. Something I still have to think about. If Julie and Laura ask me to write for the next newsletter I will update

you on our foray into the obedience ring. I think this article has solidified my position as a very unbalance person overly obsessed with dog obedience. Instead of writing this article what I would love is to do is sit down with everyone reading the article and learn about your struggles, your successes, your trial and errors, your use of corrections or not using them, and just hear your stories with training your dogs. In closing I do want to try and put myself on more solid footing in my readers minds and not some out there dog person. I really don't become so confused as I do with heeling when teaching the other exercises. I actually have a fairly clear picture in my mind of how to teach the exercises, some guiding principles, and what I do when things skid off the rails. I learned most of this from Connie Cleveland. She said there are two types of errors a dog makes. They are a lack of effort error which means the dog is disinterested in the activity at hand and an effort error in which the dog does not understand the task at hand. When in doubt she says always err on the side of an effort error. With my limited amount of training experience, I always assume my dog's mistake is an effort error. I then follow her advice to help the dog be right. To do this I will take the dog back to where he was last right, simplify the task for him, possibly show him what I want, and start again. One thing of which I am very cognizant and I noticed this on my own training the dogs is if I see my dog is about to make a mistake or is thinking about the command I am quiet and wait it out. Often times the dog can figure it out on their own. An example of this a few weeks ago I sent Moses, my Clumber out on his go out from a farther distance than was normal so he was going between the jumps. This is a new exercise he is learning. When he got between the jumps, I could see he was a bit confused. I waited and then saw a light bulb go off in his mind and he speedily continued out to his beloved stanchion. His love of the stanchion is a story for another day that may come back to haunt me. I have read since this that when a dog problem solves on its own the behavior is more lasting. That could probably work for or against the trainer. To apply what I would have done had he not figured it out. I would have calmly set him up where he was last right which was when he was between the jumps and sent him again. Then reward him for being right- assuming he went to the stanchion. So we moved closer to his go out point making the exercise a bit simpler. This all assumes he has the foundation work for a mark and to work away from me. As always, I have only been training my dogs for eight years. I am obsessed with learning about and trying new ideas in dog training. I am a dog obedience hobbyist at best. I am envious of people who have decades of experience to lean on as they train their dogs or are much younger than me and will have the opportunity to garner all that experience. I love to learn from them. There is nothing better than taking knowledge coupled with getting out there and training your dog. I am solely responsible for the interpretation of Mary Ann and Connie's work and the errors are mine.
