



Empowering First Nations Police Governance: A Way Forward Together, Opportunities Through Challenges

Our First Nations communities need First Nations police governance and services to be safe, secure, and successful. First Nations Police governance is crucial to community success and can transform them. First Nation governments and governance are distinctive in perspective and understanding. Our mechanisms ensure we comprehend natural law and share responsibility for our lands and resources while benefiting the collective. The Treaties with the Crown, currently represented by the Canadian government, are essential to nation-building, which requires a strong and adequate public safety system for First Nations. First Nations have specific concerns rooted in systemic disruption, bias, and barriers. We work together to find innovative solutions to challenging problems despite limited capability.

The First Nations Police Governance Council gathering in 2026 will be a continuum of the work we accomplished collectively at the gathering in 2025. In 2025 we identified many challenges we face regarding, but not limited to, *women in police governance and policing, our Treaty rights and policing governance, capacity and community building, and the challenges faced under the First Nations Inuit Policing Program (FNIPP)*. At this year's gathering, we intend to focus a conversation on successes, innovations, opportunities, and how we can move forward together.
